



Association, a vice-president of Upper Canada College Old Boys' Association and a vice-president for Ontario of the Canadian branch of the British Red Cross Association and one of the executives of the Ontario Bar Association. The Queen Victoria Lyre bird is on of the rarest Australian birds, and is a most wonderful songster and mimic, far surpassing any other in these respects. Never common, it is continually becoming scarcer on account of its peculiar habits. Almost all of its life is spent on the ground, the nests are built on or very near the ground, and to make its continued existence still more uncertain, only one egg is laid. Foxes, which were introduced into Australia to furnish amusement for the early colonists who could not give up their English ideas of sport, have practically exterminated the Lyre birds, of which there are three species.

These birds are of dull, though very beautiful plumage, the tails being especially wonderful. First discovered 115 years ago, they were thought to be birds of paradise but it was soon seen that no bird of paradise had any such peculiar tail and the Lyre bird was recognized as constituting a class by himself. Only the males have the by himself. Only the males have the lyre-shape tail, and it is only fully developed when the bird is four years old.

A Big Incubator.

The largest egg incubator in the United Kingdom, one with a capacity for 3,000 eggs, is now at work on a poultry farm in Kent. The appliance poultry farm in Kent. The appliance is in reality a succession of incubators joined, operated and controlled by one small automatic heater or firepot. The cost of running the incubator is not more than 1s. 3d. a week, as only 15 pounds of anthractic coal is used each day in the fire pot. A well-known authority on poultry culture said that these mammoth incubators should prove a boon to English poultry farmers. As one man can attend satisfactorily to them the labor and capital saved are considerable.

Well Paid Clerk.

"Any clerks underpaid?" asks a British contemporary. There is at least one who is not. Indeed, the suggestion is that he is very much overpaid, and that it is time inquiry was made into his earnings. The clerk in question is a County Council clerk who holds so many appointments that his salary amounts to \$25,000 a year. The Lancashire Insurance Committee proposed to appoint him to a post worth \$2,500 a year, and it was this proposal which drew attention to the gentleman who can boast of being the highest-paid clerk in the world. 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WHAT PREACHERS GET. Archdeacon Cody of Toronte Gets t

The man who is set on making his fortune need not think of entering the ministry? said a Toronto clergyman to The Star Weekly. And a little enquiry into the facts shows that he was quite right. In the Dominion—unlike the Old Country, where (in the Anglican Church) the income of one prelate is \$75,000, and that of two others \$50,000, while a large number of other bishops and pastors receive an annual \$25,000 and overthere are no big pecuniary plums for the preacher. There are not a dosen clergymen. In the whole of Canada whose official stipends are of the amount of \$5,000 annually. The number of those whose incomes are between \$4,000 and \$5,000 a rear does not exceed a score or so, while less than forty-five get anything between three and four thousand dollars a year. That is to say that, of all the clergy of all denominations, in the whole of Canada there are considerably less than eighty who are in receipt of a stipend of three thousand dollars a year or over. There is certainly no other profession or business in the country which does not offer both immensely more numerous and also immensely richer prizes as the result of labor. And, in a day when ministers are not seldom rather unfairly criticized on the ground that their minds are too centred on mundane affairs, it is well to bear in mind the fact that at least, their calling does not afford them the opportunity of heaping up riches.

The clergyman who draws the largest salary of any in Canada is Archdeacon Cody, of St. Paul's, Toronto. His stipend has lately been raised to \$8,000 a year by a congregation which has, for long, found his ministrations markedly acceptable. It, with his great gifts—and, in particular, his faculty of clear thought and clear, speech—he had embraced the profession of the law, he would probably be making an incomes of double or treble that figure. The next highest ministerial stipend is \$5,000 and over. Two of these minister in Toronto, namely, the Rev. John McNeill, the newly-appointed pastor of Cooke's Church, who receives \$5,500 \$639.10.
