

A London despatch of 28th August says: The latest advices from Batavia the Duke Street, - Chatham capital of Java, show that the volcanic eruptions in that island are much more ious than at first indicated. Much of the northern portion of the island, which was covered with tracts of forests, was soon in one great blaze of flame. The red-hot vomitings from the craters had set the trees on fire, and as the giants of the woods fell one after an other like so many sheaves of wheat before a gale, the scene was one of awful grandeur. As the eruptions increaæd in frequency and violence the disturbance of the waters surrounding the barren coast became more and more violent. Here the waves rushed in terrific force up the steep, rocky incline, breaking upon


