Chatham's Railway Interests. It has been understood for some time that Mr. Gibson is desirous of selling the Canada Eastern Railway.

When the Canada Eastern was first opened, there was a movement for its transfer to the C. P. R., and President Van Horn took a run over it from Fredericton.

People outside of Chatham, who have had experience of the C. P. R.'s railway service where there was no competition, are wondering what infatuation is prompting our Board of Trade to throw obstacles in the way of the Dominion Government.

Moreover, it is said that the Government was willing to pay a better price for the road than that offered by the C. P. R., one that would leave Mr. Gibson free from the large obligations he has incurred.

With such reasons and incentives as these for encouraging the gentlemen of the legislature who are in opposition to it, it is not to be wondered at that the latter are somewhat set, and that the general sentiment of the public is in favor of the proposed transfer.

Another canvass was in Chatham in the C. P. R. interest is that it is the intention of the Government, should it acquire the Canada Eastern, to close the portion of the line between Blackville and Chatham Junction.
