TAXATION REEORM.

Alderman Macrae Advocates Single Tax on Land as the Settlement of All

night's meeting of the Fabian League. The lecturer at the outset referred to the canons of taxation laid down by David Ricardo, the great political economist. These are:-First, the taxes should not retard production; second, they should bear equally on the community; third, they should be readily collected and at small cost; fourth, the benefits conferred should be a consideration in levying civio taxes, and not the ability of those taxed to pay the assessment. The lecturer then endeavored to apply these to the question of taxation in this city. In regard to the first, wages should not be taxed, as it is oneof the factors in production. All taxes upon capital engaged in production and im-provements in land looking toward production should also be exempt. The wage earner and the manufacturer should not be taxed; nor improvements on such manufactories. The theory that the person best able should pay the tax is false, so is the one that






