



FEEDING GREEN OATS TO

HORSES. There is ecarcely any more iaxative food than green oats. They are sometimes cut as soon as ripe, and even before, for feeding working horses, but their effect is generally weaken, rarely, if ever, to strengthen, when fed in the straw. Even after threshing this inxative quality remains, so that if fed it must be with great cere. As the new oats waste in weight by drying out they are not so much cheaper than old oats as they seem, even if hey did no injury.

NO GRAIN RAKINGS.

When the steel horse rakes were first introduced one of their imporscattering grain which would otherw se be wasted under old methods of harvesting. There's no need for this extra work, raking the stubble. The improved harvesting machines gather the grain better and without was e than used to be possible. Raklugs of grein were always poor in quality, being stained by rains. HOW TO KEEP LEMONS.

Some good housekeepers on receiving lemons wash and dry them horoughly and then put those that are not needed soon into the big sugar box, burying the fruit in the sugar. They say that lemons will thus keep fresh a long time.
