### INSURANCE RATES.

The New Brunswick Underwriters have notified the Mayor that unless Newcastle spends more money in improving its already up-to-date and efficient fire protection service the citizens of Newcastle will be held up for an additional fifteen cents flat rate on premiums of insurance on buildings in the town excepting churches and Sunday School build-

While Newcastle has been remarkably free from fire losses for some years the various Insurance companies controlled by the Underwriters claim to have lost money hence the increase.

But if it is necessary to increase the insurance rates for the above reason why did not the underwriters come out honestly and do so, instead of endeavoring to put the responsibility of said increase on the Town Council. The citizens of Newcastle feel that at the present time they have an efficient fire protection service and do not take kindly to the threat that unless certain improvements are made and more money expended an increase will go into effect. We have frequently heard this same threat and have each time submitted, now we think it is time to cry a halt.

Previous to the installation of our Water system one of the strangest arguments in favor of such installation was the pledge of the Underwriters that the rate would be Some of the heaveist policy holders are paying an equal rate today and in some cases more is being paid than six or seven years ago.

As one Alderman said at the time we looked for Municipal insurance. We would suggest that an non tarrif company be asked to figure on risks and are sure that in many cases where risks are rated, individually, much better rates could be secured in companies which are just as sound as tarriff companies controlled by the Underwriters.

Murdered Wood at New Mills-Inquest Being Held.

JUST BREATHE

When Worn Out Don't Take a Stim ulant; Just Breathe.

Don't take a stimulant; just breathe. This is the advice of a doctor who does not believe in the old medical policy of mystery, but who undertakes philosophically to explain to any patient why such and such a ren beneficial, says the Philadelphia Telegraph.

"When you are 'let down,' " continued this physician, "don't take a cock-tail; just breathe. Put your finger on your pulse and get its rhythm. During eight beats draw in the breath, breathing deep and low and forcing the diaphragm down first, then filling the upper lungs. Then exhale this breath during four beats of the pulse.

"Now, if you are working with piece of machinery, say a typewriter, what do you do to make it run more smoothly? You don't put a lot more oil on it and gum and clog it all up. You clean it first. You can best clean the blood by breathing. The blood passes through the lungs, and it needs and expects to find plenty of fresh air with oxygen in it. If it can't find per fectly fresh air it needs more air which s not perfectly fresh. It needs to be cleaned by contact with the air.

"Once in awhile hold the lungs full of breath as long as you can without expulsion. In doing this you are simply cleaning the machine. You are cleaning the blood. At the same time you are giving that little fillip to the action of the heart and the nervous system which you thought you were giving when you took the cocktail. In the latter case you didn't clean the machine. You simply ran it a little faster and gummed it up a little more. You can get the same results, the same feeling of exhilaration and of accomplishment, without taking the cock tail and at the same time the machine will steadily improve in its running quality. Breathe the best air you can get and plenty of it. It is as necessary as food. The heart and lungs act in voluntarily. In hurried business they become too involuntary. that case don't take a cocktail; just




