MR. LABILLIOL'S CRITICISES GOVERNMENT'S ACTS IN BRILLIANT SPEECH

Was Listened to With Close Attention by Whole House

---Colonization Subject Urged by

Our Representative.

MR. BYRNE SPEAKS.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 24.—(Re-
sponding to the call of the House on
Monday afternoon, when Hon. Mr. La-
billiol was heard. Mr. Labilliol was
in excellent form and did credit not
only to the party with which he is
affiliated but to the House as a whole.

In his speech Mr. Labilliol was
moderate and in that very fact lay
the strength of his criticism. He
was heard with close attention as he
exposed the weaknesses of the govern-
ment's policy and administration.

The Resignation man was particu-
larly strong in his reference to the
importance of colonization. He ex-
pressed his keen disappointment that
the speech from the throne, placed
in the hands of the Governor by the
cabinet, had nothing whatever to say
on this most important subject. Im-
migration may be a subject for con-
sideration, he said, but surely it is
of far more importance to the welfare
of the province that something be
done to encourage our own people,
particularly our young people, to stay
in the home land and aid in its de-
velopment. This matter has been em-
phasized before, he continued, during
these times of distress, but the govern-
ment, our own young people have
been demanding that something be
done. Quebec people have shown their
willingness to settle in large num-
bers along the line of the International
and on the Blue-shed tract. In
spite of these facts, the government
has ignored this question of vital im-
portance. In so doing they have in-
jured the reputation of the province
and the recommendations of the Farmers'
and Dairyman's Association.

It is all very well to have an im-
migration bureau, he said, but it is
play, \$2,000 for an advertisement in a
London paper but surely the northern
districts of the province should not be
closed. Up in Redoubt, he said, there
are many acres of land awaiting
settlement. True, they are under lease
in many cases but I have confidence
in the spirit of the men who have
these leases and I am sure that look-
ing to the future development of the
province of which we are all proud, they
will be glad to assist in any way
that will assist in their power
the work of encouraging our people
to stay home and work for the ad-
vancement of our native land.

Mr. Labilliol went on to point out
that the minister may say that he
ready they have set aside some acres
of land for colonization. This, he
said, is quite true but the land is such
that it is not suitable for its intended
purpose and young men who have craved
it for the purpose of seeing whether
or not it is suitable for them to
settle upon have gone away from it
disgusted.

Recently, he said, the government
has been asked for 30,000 acres along
the line of the International and
some 20,000 acres in the Blue-shed
tract. The men who came before the
government did not ask that the land
be given them, but they were willing
to pay for it. For a long time the
government gave them no answer
whatever and since notice has been
asked of the request really nothing
has been done. Thus, men interested
in an undertaking which might yield
most beneficial results to the province
have been given no encouragement,
but the very reverse. Moreover, the
provincial treasury is the poorer by
\$50,000 which these men were willing
to pay for the desired land.

Mr. Labilliol was also very out-
spoken in regard to another matter of
importance in many rural districts.
This is the control of automobiles.
The government boasts of its High-
way Act, with its increased taxation,
but it does nothing to safeguard the
interests of the farmers and their fam-
ilies in the sections where automob-
iles are used. The man of means
may have his auto but surely in sim-
ple justice farmers should not be sub-
jected to danger and loss through the
frightening of their horses by the ma-
jor vehicle. There should be some re-
strictions on the running of these cars
—certain days should be set aside for
their use of the highways. If this
were done farmers and their wives
and children would not be liable to
danger through the frightening of
their horses; they could do their busi-
ness more comfortably and mer-
chant.

Other matters which Mr. Tweeddale
touched upon were those of the Glas-
gow Iron Mines and the Grand Falls
Power Co. In regard to the iron
mines he pointed out how remark-
ably generous had been the treatment
given the Drummond Co. For eighty
years this great corporation is do-
ing the right of operating those mi-
nes and paying to the treasury of the
people only the paltry sum of five

cents per ton. They talk about the
mineral discoveries in New Brunswick,
said Mr. Tweeddale, it will be unfor-
tunate if more of these discoveries are
made if the interests of the province
are to be sacrificed as they have been
by the Hazen government in the case
of the Gloucester mines.

By the maintenance of his present
methods Dr. Landry, Commissioner of
Agriculture, promises to become more
consistent in his continued inconsis-
tency. He made his bow to the
House as an apostle of consistency.
The quality is the consummation, he de-
clared, most devoutly to be wished.
Another piece of his doctrine was
that politics should be kept out of the
Agricultural Department and the
discussion of agricultural affairs.

Last Tuesday a number of mem-
bers of the Farmers and Dairyman's
Association were in Fredericton. In
the afternoon they attended the ses-
sion of the House, report has it by
the invitation of none other than the

should have been increased. Of
course more stumps are to be tem-
porarily collected; but the reduction
in the size of the log must inevitably
be disastrous to the forestry. The op-
inion of Hon. Mr. Sweeney, it may be
noted, is that if the present regula-
tions are adhered to, direct taxation
will be inevitable in the comparatively
few years when our forests will have
been almost exhausted.

Mr. Byrne's speech, by the way, was
a most effective one, to which fur-
ther reference will be made.

NEW BRUNSWICK EDITORS WILL MEET AT ST. JOHN

Winter Port Board of Trade Sends
Out Invitations to Meet and
Discuss Important Matters

It has been suggested to the St.
John Board of Trade that the inter-
ests of this province might be ad-
vanced by a free and informal inter-
change of views among the editors of New
Brunswick newspapers. The time
seems ripe for a consistent and
concerted effort to bring the general
public into closer contact with the
public offices which New Brunswick
affords.

The business men and the press of
St. John, like those of other commu-
nities, are liable to regard matters from
a local point of view, and there is no
doubt that it would be helpful to all
if leaders of opinion in each district of
the province could frankly discuss
together matters of general and local
concern.

The editors of newspapers are in
direct contact with the people, their
problems, possibilities and difficulties
of the districts where they live and
work. They should be able to discuss
to such a conference much informa-
tion and many useful suggestions. The
result of such a conference as is
proposed would be a closer under-
standing of the provincial situation
from many points of view, and a prac-
tical co-operation for political pro-
gress.

Among the purposes in view are the
discovery of means whereby the peo-
ple of this Province may be kept at
home, settings obtained, life in the
provinces be made more attractive and
prosperous, natural resources devel-
oped, new industries established, old
ones assisted, tourist travel increased,
public sentiment encouraged to come
here, and a spirit of provincial loyalty
to be promoted, consistent with and
helpful to the larger national spirit.

WOULD FAVOR A
STRICT MEASURE

Forestry Convention Seems to be in
Favor of Prohibition of
Pulp Wood

FREDERICTON, Feb. 24.—A deter-
mined attempt to have conven-
tion place itself on record as favoring
the prohibition of the export of pulp
wood characterized the first day of the
eventual annual convention of the Cana-
dian Forestry Association. EX-
President Snowball of Chatham led in
a way that brought about the adop-
tion of the measure. The attack followed
a paper by C. E. Oak, manager of the
New Brunswick Lumber Co., entitled
"The Pulp Wood Question in New
Brunswick." He received the support
of a majority of the delegates.
Senator Edwards, chairman of the
committee on the cause of free export.
This motion was carried by a vote of
10 to 5. It was decided to wait until
after Mr. Beveridge's paper is read to-
morrow. There is little doubt that
the resolution will be carried.

WHERE IS IT?

Hon. Mr. Hazen has stated that the lumber cut of 1909 was 90 per cent. of that of 1908.

The Surveyor General's report says that \$246,742.77 was collected in 1909 and \$191,414.63 was collected in 1908. If the 1909 cut yielded an amount of \$246,742.77 the 1908 cut, much greater according to the official statement, should have yielded much more than the \$191,414.63 collected.

In other words the stumpage collection of 1908 should have been \$411,237.96. Therefore \$219,823.32 has been lost to the province.

The people need that \$219,823.32.

Senator McMillen in the debate on the Intercolonial branch lines bill said that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy expressed a willingness to pay a rental of a million dollars a year for the lease of the Intercolonial. But, as the Ottawa Free Press aptly remarks, if that day ever came the competing factor would be eliminating from Canadian transportation; and it is worth more than a million dollars to the producers of the east and the farmers of the west. Keep the Intercolonial out of the clutch of the C. P. R.

Although the country is represented by two opposition members, there is very general satisfaction with the policy of the government. The selection of Mr. W. R. Montgomery and Mr. Arthur Culligan as the government candidates is admitted by opponents to have been a wise one and the prospects are that we will still further stabilize what was formerly a solid North Shore for the government. You can count on Restigouche, concluded Mr. Mott, to return two government men in the next election.

UNITED STATES WANTS CANADA TO SHOW CAUSE

WASHINGTON.—No steps have yet been taken by the British or Canadian governments looking to a determination of the question of whether Canada in view of her tariff treaties with other countries, is entitled to the minimum tariff rates of the United States under the Payne Aldrich Act. The maximum rates under this act will automatically apply to Canada on March 21st next, only four weeks hence unless it is shown in the meantime, that Canada is entitled to the low rates. The state department, therefore, has sent a communication to the Canadian government, expressing its regret that no steps have been taken either by Canada or Great Britain, to place the United States in possession of facts which might prove that the decision was entitled to the most favorable rates.

OTTAWA.—As far as the Canadian government is concerned no steps are being taken with respect to the possibility of the maximum clause of the American tariff being invoked against Canada on March 21 next. The government here believes that there is nothing in Canada's tariff policy which would warrant President Taft in finding that the United States is unduly discriminated against and consequently there seems no reason for Canada to advance any arguments with the Washington authorities at the present juncture.
