MAKING PLANS FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

A Joint Parliamentary Committee Investigating Into Their Welfare.

Both the Senate and the House of Commons have appointed committees to inquire into the best thing that is to be done for the returning soldiers, whether they return sick, maimed or in good health. The Senate Committee comprises, Senators Longhead, Belcourt, Mason, Daniels and Beaudin and the Commons Committee Sir Herbert H. Ames, Hon. Charles Murphy, Hon. Charles Maclellan, Hon. F. D. McCurdy, Messrs. R. B. Bennett, Fred Vardee and Vincent Ross.

A limb factory is in operation in Toronto for the manufacture of legs and arms.

A number of new hospitals and convalescent homes are about to be opened up in the various provinces. Among the witnesses heard were the officials of the Militia Department, the Headquarters and District staffs, the officers of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, the Pension Bureau, the Hospitals Commission and the representatives of the various Soldiers Aid Societies, the Patriotic Fund as well as the representatives of the Provinces and cities who find employment for soldiers able to work. All complaints were carefully noted so that a report can be made thereon and remedies secured.

For the present only the case of the sick, wounded and discharged soldiers are being dealt with. Later on the committees will have to grapple with the greater question of returning to civil life the vast army which has gone abroad to fight Canada's part in the great struggle.

When all the information which can be secured has been obtained, reports will be made upon which the Dominion and Provincial Governments will be enabled to take action. This work is one of the most important after-the-war problems which Canada has to face.

While in Toronto the member for Bonaventure was accompanied by Madame Maclellan. The members of the Committee were entertained by the Mayor and Corporation of Toronto and some of the leading citizens of the fashionable clubs of the Queen city. They also visited the sick soldiers at the hospitals.

OBITUARY.

The death occurred at her home in Montreal on March 31st, of Mrs. David Reid, aged thirty-seven years. Besides her husband she survived by one daughter, also her mother Mrs. Angus Campbell of Black Cape and one sister Mrs. Gilbert McKenno of Black Cape, and four brothers, Alexander of Campbellton, John William of Black Cape and Albert and Arthur of New Richmond. Mrs. Reid was formerly Miss Campbell of Black Cape. Much sympathy is expressed for the family in their bereavement.

Mr. Joseph Payne of this town received word Monday that his son Pte. Joe. Henry Payne had been killed in action on March 23rd or 24th. One brother Armand with the 236th Kilties Battalion and one sister and brother at home as well as his father and mother survive.

Pte. Payne worked on the C. G. R. Section here before enlisting with the 132nd Battalion.

Many friends will regret to learn of his death on the field of battle.

E. H. ANDERSON HAS PASSED AWAY

Died at Ogdensburg, N. Y. After Operation. Ill for Several Months.

Word was received here Sunday of the death at Ogdensburg, N. Y. of Mr. E. H. Anderson and caused profound sorrow upon the part of his many friends.

Mr. Anderson who was sixty-two years of age was taken ill a few months ago, and an operation performed at the Hotel Dieu here, which disclosed a more serious ailment than had been thought. He decided to go to Ogdensburg, N. Y. where many of his relatives reside, and in a hospital there underwent an operation which was at first thought successful, but he never recovered.

The late Mr. Anderson had been in the employ of the late Mr. Thos. Malcolm for some thirty-two years, during which time he acted as manager of all the railway work being done by that gentleman. He was therefore engaged in railway work on the C. P. R., Bangor & Aroostook and the Temiscouata Railway, as well as the building of the I. N. R. between Campbellton and St. Leonard.

Arrived here about 1901 he was Mr. Malcolm's right hand man in the building of the I. N. R. When this road was completed he was appointed manager of it, and gave an excellent daily passenger train service between these two points.

As a citizen the late Mr. E. H. Anderson was all that could be desired, and his passing away leaves a blank in this community which will indeed be hard to fill.

He was a honored member of the Masonic Lodge, Independent Order of Foresters, Canadian Order of Foresters, the Campbellton Club, also the Curling Club, while taking a deep interest in all associations in which he was a member, his interest centered largely in the curling club, he being very fond of the game and owing to the winter season being his slack was generally on hand to enjoy his preferred amusement.

The heartfelt sympathy of this community will go out to the bereaved widow in the great loss she has been called upon to bear.

The funeral services which were held at Ottawa on Monday afternoon were large attended.

WOUNDED SOLDIERS ON WAY HOME

Two Hospital Trains Pass Through Campbellton on Sunday

Two trains filled with wounded Canadian soldiers passed through Campbellton Sunday evening enroute to convalescent hospitals in Quebec and Ontario. The first train contained men who had arms or legs, and in some cases both, amputated in English Hospitals as a result of wounds received while on the second train the occupants were invalided soldiers who were not yet able to leave their cots. The former were allowed to leave their train for a few minutes at the station, and while the sight of so many of our brave boys getting around with the aid of canes, crutches, and with arms or hands missing was indeed a pitiful one, spectators state, one could not help being impressed by the splendid spirit that prevailed among the maimed heroes.

Despite their condition they one and all appeared to act out the words of the soldiers' popular song "Are we down-hearted, No!" and apparently were glad to be back on Canadian soil again.

NEW GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCED YESTERDAY

Premier Foster and Colleagues Sworn in at Fredericton and Assume Control

Fredericton, N. B., April 4.—His Honor Lieut.-Governor Wood and Premier W. E. Foster arrived in the city this morning and the latter immediately announced the composition of his new government as follows:

Premier Foster has followed the example of at least three former Premiers, Hon. Messrs. Blair and Robinson, in having nine men in his government which is thoroughly representative of nearly all those sections of the province which returned members supporting the new administration.

Hon. Mr. Foster will run in Victoria, Mr. Burgess resigning in his favor. Wrist by-elections will be issued at once.

IMPERIAL MUNITION BOARD PURCHASES 32 STUDEBAKERS.

After a thorough and most rigid examination by mechanical engineers of the Aviation Department of the Imperial Munitions Board, an order has been signed with the Studebaker Corporation of Walkerville, Ontario, for the immediate delivery of thirty-two, Series 18, Studebaker cars. The order embraces ten six-cylinder, fifty-horse power touring cars and twenty-two six cylinder, fifty horse power combination station and passenger cars. These cars are to be put in service at once, and will be used in connection with the work of the department at Camp Borden and the Toronto headquarters.

To meet the requirements of any branch of the army service, it is vital necessary that a motor car be possessed of unusual stamina and ability to withstand the severe punishment inevitable on the roads of Canada or overseas. First of all the car must have the reserve power to meet all emergencies, yet be perfect balanced and light weight. Then comes the question of road ability. Its ability to go wherever it is needed, and at any speed.

These things were considered carefully by the Aviation Department in the purchase of the thirty-two cars for their branch of service. The Lounsbury Co. have the Studebaker Cars for sale in Restigouche Co.

THE MULES JUST SIMPLY VANISHED

New York, March 27.—The New York World publishes the following London, March 26.—The report of the auditor-general on the British army accounts for 1915-1916, issued to-night, throws an instructive light on the way in which some part at least, of the hundreds of millions of pounds voted for the army has been wasted, owing to negligence and blundering.

The report blandly states that mules worth £1600 (8,000) were picked up on sandy soil at Borden Camp and escaped in the night. They were never recovered.

This candid admission has elicited much ironic comment. The Star remarks: "Where these mules went, whether they were eaten by the troops or exported to Holland for the Germans, the patient auditor-general cannot tell. They simply vanished."

QUEBEC BIG GAME POUCHERS CAUGHT.

Chief Game Warden Makes Long Trip
But is Rewarded for Work

One of the longest trips made by a warden in the Province of Quebec is that just accomplished by W. H. Griffin, Chief Game Warden of the Province of the local Association for the Protection of Fish and Game. He left Montreal seventeen days ago for a district on the south side of the St. Lawrence and bordering upon the Province of New Brunswick, from which complaints had been received of violation of the game laws. During that time, he covered a thousand miles by rail and over 250 by road, most of the latter distance being along the Cascapedia river, which leads up through a reservation of Micmac Indians and into an extensive lumbering country where there are large quantities of moose, the season for which closed on December 31st.

When he struck the Indian village, there was a general scurry of many of the inhabitants who were supposed to have moose meat in their possession, which, it is said, they carried away with them and hid in the swamps of the neighborhood. In the meantime, the chief of the tribe, John Martin, came to see Mr. Griffin and claimed that an Indian had a right to take as many moose as there were members of his family. This view did not accord with the regulations so Mr. Griffin made several arrests, among them being Mike Condy, Tom Benor, Ben Martin, R. Renoit, who all had moose meat in their possession.

They asked that they might be taken before the local priest, the Rev. J. D. Morne, who said that the Indians were actually ignorant of the game law regulations. Upon the priest's guarantee that there would be no more taking of moose during the close season, they were allowed their liberty.

Proceeding farther into the bush country, the warden arrived at Montgomery lumber camp where he arrested Arthur Barton, foreman of the camp, Nap. Cormier and Frank Dumas, for having moose, deer and caribou in their possession. They were taken before Ed. Barton, J. P., at Cascapedia who fined them each \$50 and costs.

The above reminds us of the story of the Indian from Quebec who in the old times sold large quantities of moose meat in Campbellton. When cautioned that the game warden would catch him he said:

Game Warden no catch me. Me game warden.

LUMBERMEN WANTED FOR NEW BATTALION

Another Forestry Battalion Being Raised for Overseas Duty

Exceptional opportunities are offered by the Forestry Battalion to all men who are acquainted with any branch of the lumbering industry. The manifold phases of trench warfare and the other developments of the great struggle in Europe have rendered necessary the quick production of immense quantities of timber. Patriotic owners of forests and timber of great value in England and Scotland have given the timber to the Empire and what is now needed most is skilled lumbermen to cut out that timber and transform it into dimensions most in demand, bridges, road and railway building, to say nothing of the pyramid of other uses of timber in the area behind the firing line. That skilled labor is naturally very scarce in the British Isles and what few are there have joined the colors long ago.

At present there is much activity in this lumbering work in the North of England and the South of Scotland, as well as in France, where all qualified men are in demand. Millmen and loggers are urged to help in the recruiting for this Battalion and transportation will be provided from the point of enlistment to the Head Office at the Armouries, Sussex, N. B., where every courtesy and goodwill is shown every man who offers his services to this great cause.

Millowners, superintendents, assistant superintendents etc., may be given technical commissions depending on their ability and efficiency. Men who are conversant with the woods and can handle crews are offered N. C. O.'s rank such as logging foreman, camp superintendents etc. Men who have worked in the mills such as edgers, sawyers, saw filers, saw hammermen, checkers, invoicers, engineers, firemen etc., are also offered the technical rank of N. C. O.'s with probably technical pay. Bakers, Camp Cooks, assistant cooks, etc., are rated according to their skill and knowledge. Auto drivers, truck drivers and teamsters are necessary for moving portable mills and if suitable they will get special allowances.

Each and every lumberman will find some place that will fit him and he will be doing his bit to the best interests of the Country and himself. As there is an urgent need for all men, every facility will be offered him to qualify, which would be an added attraction to himself.

Experiment Farm. Note

From the experience gained in several Canadian cities and towns during the past few years in utilizing vacant lots for garden purposes, the following methods are suggested for those who have not yet undertaken this work.

1. An organization should be formed, on the executive committee of which are, at least, two men or women, who are enthusiastic and will be willing to devote some time looking after the preparation of the land and the laying out of the plots.

2. Owners of vacant land should be invited to offer such property for garden making.

3. Assuming that a fairly large number of lots have been offered to their owners, it should be widely advertised that one of these is available to any citizen who will be willing to work it, experience having shown that all classes in the community are interested in this work.

4. It has been learned by experience that it is important for the organization to, at least, plough and harrow the land for the plot holders the first year. Few persons who have not done any gardening before can be induced to prepare land for seed sowing on their own initiative.

5. There are four methods by which funds may be raised to prepare the land.

(a) By an appeal to wealthy citizens (b) By a grant from the city or town council, if necessary, on the understanding that the money will be returned by the plot holders when they have harvested their first crop.

(c) The city or town council might appoint a committee to carry out such work, the city to aid in every possible way. In order that a move of this kind may have at least the greater sympathy of the civic officials, it would seem desirable for the organization to have a room in the city hall for its meetings.

Remarks by Judge McLatchy and Others at Meeting of Gloucester County Court

The March meetings of the Gloucester County court opened on Tuesday morning, of last week His Honor Judge McLatchy presiding. No criminal docket was before the court. The civic docket consisted of two non-jury and one jury case.

Judge McLatchy referred to the fact that Mr. Byrne had recently been honored by a call to the ranks of his majesty's counsel learned in the law, and warmly congratulated Mr. Byrne on the honor. The judge continuing, stated that Gloucester county might well be proud of the fact that of her four lawyers, three were king's counsel, and that Mr. Ryan, still a young man in the profession would not as yet be expected to possess the honor.

All the members of the bar present L. A. Landry, K. C., George Gilbert, K. C. and J. L. Ryan, tendered their felicitations to Mr. Byrne and all agreed that the honor was well merited.

Special mention was made of the fact that the call to the inner bar was more coveted than heretofore, as at present politics play no part of its donation, but members of the profession secure the honor on the recommendation of the chief justice of New Brunswick and of the chief justice of the king's bench division.

Mr. Byrne voiced his appreciation of the remarks of Judge McLatchy and of his fellow members of the bar present, stating that he would do his utmost to live up to the dignity and best traditions of a wearer of the silk, and made mention of the pleasant relations that had always existed between the judge and himself and the association with which he had worked with members of the bar during his twenty five years in the noble and honorable profession of law.

The last method is the one which is likely to be the most satisfactory for most cities and towns and is the one recommended here.

For information in regard to rules or by-laws the reader is referred to the minutes of the work of the several organizations in Canada referred to in a bulletin being printed by the Dominion Government, as in it there will no doubt, be found sufficient suggestions to enable by-laws to be drawn up for particular needs.

BOY SCOUTS CAN HELP

Boy Scouts can be made very useful in encouraging garden making and the use of vacant lots. In Ottawa they were employed in 1915 by the Public Health Committee of the Local Council of women delivering vegetable seeds which had been donated for the purpose of encouraging the poorer people to make gardens. Seed can be obtained in bulk at a cheaper rate than in packages and can be put up in packages by the Scouts. The Scouts also delivered pamphlets on Vegetable Gardening. This personal touch did much, it is believed, to decide those to make gardens who had been no doubt before as many would not take the trouble to get them themselves.

Knew His Business.—Mrs. Smith hired a Chinese servant, and tried to teach him how to receive calling-cards. She let herself out the front door, and when the new servant answered the ring she gave him her card.

CIVIC AFFAIRS.

At present writing it looks as if there will be no civic election this year.

It is too bad that our citizens take so little interest in their own town affairs.

That new blood is needed in the council is admitted by all, some say we need an entire new council, but we think there are some members who should be retained because of their experience gained in past years of service.

We still think that the Ward system is a wrong one, and suggest that this section of the incorporation act be amended.

We sincerely trust that between now and Tuesday, which is nomination day that two full tickets will be in the field, so that we may have an expression of public opinion in the matter.

DEMAND FOR SUBWAY.

The matter of a subway at Central Street is again being agitated and a strong demand should be made in an endeavor to have the railway undertake this necessary work.

At intervals trains block the Andrew and Cedar Street crossings at very inopportune times, particularly when the children are going to or returning from school.

Recently a train blocked these two crossings for a half hour and little children were observed running under the cars to avoid being late for school. A watchman is placed at the Andrew Street crossing to prevent this but the

children manage to evade him.

Not until another tragedy occurs will it be possible to bring the attention of the railway authorities to the importance of this work. Andrew Street is our residential thoroughfare and also the Grammar School and churches are located on this street and there are perhaps more pedestrians passing over this crossing from day to day than any other in town.

A subway at Central Street could be built through to Union Street at a reasonable cost for the land necessary.

It is a necessary work and should be undertaken without delay.

DOES PROHIBITION PROHIBIT?

In contradiction of the statement often made that "Prohibition does not prohibit" the Dominion Prohibition Committee with headquarters in Toronto, have issued statistics which seem to prove the contrary.

In a recent pamphlet the claim is made that provincial prohibition is a success and they back up their contention with the following table showing the arrests for the offence of Drunkenness in the five largest cities of Ontario during the first full three months of prohibition, ending December 31st, 1916 as compared with the arrests for the corresponding three

months of 1915 under license:

The situation in Ottawa is, of course readily understood, being caused by the operation of licenses in the City of Hull across the river, resulting in the arrests in Ottawa of not only residents but men who have come from other places and have to be taken charge of by the police after coming back drunk from Hull.

The following table of arrests for

drunkenness in the principal cities of the Province of Alberta for the six months of prohibition compared with the corresponding six months of the preceding year under license, conveys the same lesson as do the Ontario figures.

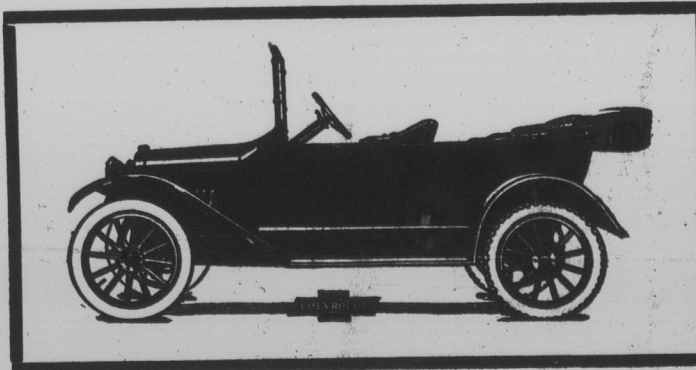

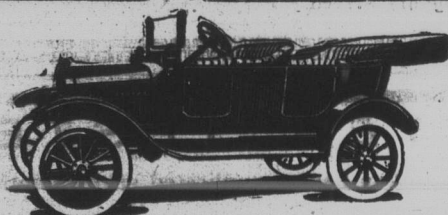

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Forbes that S. M. Adams, Esq., Mayor of St. Laurent of Matapedia, be re-elected Warden of the County of Bonaventure, for the ensuing term.—Adopted.

Mayor Adams expressed his appreciation to the Council for the honour that was again conferred upon him.

Moved by Mayor Daigneau, seconded by Mayor Arseneault, that J. Adhemar Cyr, Esq., Mayor of Maria, be appointed Pro-Warden of the County of Bonaventure, for the ensuing term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Busted, seconded by Mayor Levesque, that F. X. Chapados, Esq., Mayor of Gascons, be appointed one of the County Delegates for the County of Bonaventure for the ensuing term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Cyr, seconded by Mayor Oatman, that John T. Daigneau, Esq., Mayor of St. Omer, be also appointed one of the County Delegates for the County of Bonaventure, for the ensuing term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Daigneau, seconded by Mayor Darche, that the Report of the County Auditors, as presented to the Council, by the Secretary-Treasurer, be duly approved of and passed.—Adopted.

After discussion and deliberation by the Council of the arrears due the County by the Local Municipalities of the County, it was moved by Mayor Arseneault, seconded by Mayor Poirier, that if all arrears due by the said Local Municipalities be not paid in full, to the County Council, on or before the 1st of August of each year, interest on the said arrears will hereafter be charged on all amounts overdue, and further that action to recover same may at any time be taken by the Secretary-Treasurer, without further authorization.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Daigneau, that Mr. C. H. Beaulieu, of New Carlisle, and J. LeBoutillier, of Paspébiac, be re-appointed County Auditors for the ensuing term.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor Arseneault, that G. M. Kempfer, Esq., be re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer of the County Council, for the current year.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Anglerhart, seconded by Mayor Blois, that the Members of this Council consider it their duty to advise the Valuers of their respective Local Municipalities, to value all the immovable property situate in the said municipalities, according to the real value of the same, and that the said Valuers do follow strictly the provisions of the Quebec Municipal Code and of the law, regarding said valuation or valuation rolls.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Blois seconded by Mayor Campbell, that James Edward Mill, Esq., Advocate, of New Carlisle, be appointed Interpreter for this Council, honoris causa.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Blois, seconded by Mayor Busted, Re Bill of the Campbellton Graphic, of \$15.00, for the publishing of the proceedings of this Council, that the Warden be authorized to interview the authorities of the said newspaper to arrange for a settlement of the amount, and further to arrange for the publishing of the Council's future proceedings, in both the English and French languages.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Busted seconded by Mayor Chapados, and unanimously adopted by all the Mayors and members of the Council, nemine contradicente, that the following resolution be adopted and passed by the Council:—

1st.—That the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) be voted and

paid to The Canadian Patriotic Fund, established by the Federal Act 5 George V. Chap. 8.

2nd.—That the County Council borrow the sum of five thousand dollars in order to make said payment.

3rd.—That the sum be borrowed on Promissory Notes signed by the Warden and Secretary-Treasurer, at the lowest possible rate of interest, said notes to be numbered from one to ten both inclusive, and payable as follows:—

Notes number 1 and 2 payable in one year with interest.

Notes numbers 3 and 4 payable in two years with interest.

Notes numbers 5 and 6 payable in three years with interest.

Notes numbers 7 and 8 payable in four years with interest.

Notes numbers 9 and 10 payable in five years with interest.

That to be included in said Notes a clause giving the County Council the right to redeem said Notes, or any of them or part of them, at their option, sooner, on paying the amount of capital and interest then due thereon.

4th.—That in order to redeem said Notes plus the interest, that a tax be levied on all the Municipalities of the County based upon the Valuation Roll now in force, to be collected as follows:—

\$1000.00 in one year, plus the aforesaid interest.

\$1000.00 in two years, plus the aforesaid interest.

\$1000.00 in four years, plus the aforesaid interest.

\$1000.00 in five years, plus the aforesaid interest.

5th.—That if any Municipality wishes to pay the whole or any part of the said tax before it becomes due, it will have the right to do so in order to avoid payment of any future interest.

6th.—That the Government of this Province be requested to pass any legislation that may be necessary, sanctioning the whole of the above, and that the said loan be made, and that the said payment be made as soon as the said Legislation is passed, or as soon as the assurance is given by the Government, that the same will be duly sanctioned.—Unanimously Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Cyr, seconded by Mayor Dugas, that the Bridge or Bridges roads, and approaches thereto crossing the Grand Cascapedia River, and dividing the Municipalities of Maria and New Richmond, be declared to be County Bridges, roads and approaches, under the charges and maintenance, according to their respective valuation Rolls of the said two Municipalities, and that Public Notices be given in the usual way that a resolution to that effect will be adopted and passed by this Council at its next meeting in September.

Moved in Amendment by Mayor Campbell, seconded by Mayor Blois, that the Bridges over the main stream of the Grand Cascapedia River, and the approaches thereto be declared a County Bridge at the maintenance and expense of the Municipalities interested, and of which they form part, and that the proper notices be given for the adoption of a Resolution to that effect by this Council, at its next meeting in September.

And the question on the amendment being put a division arose, and the names being called for, they were taken down as follows:—

Yeas:—Mayors Campbell, Blois and Ross.—3.

Nays:—Mayors Cyr, Dugas, Allard, Poirier, Arseneault, Oatman, Anglerhart, Darche, Chapados, Busted, Daigneau, Levesque, LeBrasseur, Forbes and Martin.—15.

So it passed in the Negative.

The majority being in favor of the Main Motion, it passed in the Affirmative and declared carried.—Adopted.

The Council was given communication by the Secretary-Treasurer of a letter received by him, from Mr. Gagnon, Advocate, of Rimouski, P. Q., relating to the vacant Senatorship for the Gulf Division, the same being duly filed and laid over.

Moved by Mayor Chapados, seconded by Mayor Busted that the Bridge across the Port Daniel River, dividing the Municipalities of Port Daniel West and Port Daniel East, be declared a County Bridge, at the costs and

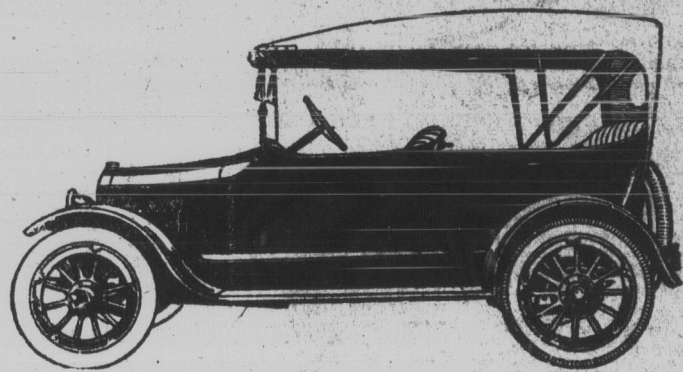
