John Bright has desired to be a true

friend to the people of Ireland, and

probably he did intend, when speaking

on the subject of the late elections,

that whenever a Liberal Govern-

ment should be introduced a Bill

which would settle that question to

the entire satisfaction of every reasonable

man in Ireland. He has found the diffi-

culties to be overcome greater than he

anticipated, and he has not been suc-

cessful as he could wish. Perhaps he

would not have remained in the Govern-

ment after the Convention Act had been

proposed if he had not persuaded himself

that only by submitting to this could a

Land Bill be carried. Perhaps he even

feels that he made a great sacrifice for

the Irish tenants in remaining a member

of the Government under such circum-

stances, and that he has been allowed

a much better Bill than he has been

allowed to carry out. But, knowing all the

difficulties made, and all the difficulties in-

posed, he probably thinks that he has

achieved wonderful success in inducing,

or causing, his colleagues to introduce

the Bill, and that he has, in so doing,

done the cause which especially induces his

judgment, it is very apparent that he is

one of those who imagine that the Irish

people accept this Bill with entire thank-

fulness, and who regard the finding of any

fault, or the making of any objection

to it as the greatest misfortune. He has

made almost a personal injury. He made

some days ago what was for him a very

foolish, injudicious speech, in which he

showed an unusual amount of petulance

and ill temper, and told the Irish that

this is at least quite as good a measure as

any he is entitled to, and that his misery

is due to the fact that he is not a member

of the Government, and that he is not a

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is not a member of the Government, and

opposed by those who aim to bring about

revolution and not merely the abolition

of the lot of their countrymen.

to emigration desire neither rebellion nor

any revolution save that which would give

the Irish land to the Irish people on fair
