ESTIMATES FIXED FOR THIS YEAR

Slightly Lower Than Last Year—Other Business Of Council.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Fire Hall last Friday evening. In the absence of His Worship Deputy Mayor St. Onge took the chair.

Coun. Belle-Ile, Gilker, Graham, Duncan, Moores and Marquis were present.

On motion the reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

A communication was read from Rev. Father Melanson making application for a two inch water service, also for sewer connection for the new Covent School. On motion request was granted.

A communication was read from Isaac Peters of Halifax making application for the position of foreman on water and sewerage construction work. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A communication was read from Peter P. LeBlanc making application to lease a lot of land belonging to the town. Town clerk instructed to notify him that lot was not for lease.

Seven applications were received for the position of town engineer—Geo. Rakes, salary \$250 per month; D. F. Melasac, salary \$250 per month; M. J. O'Dell, salary 2,400; R. J. Parker, salary \$1,000; R. Palmer, salary \$2,400; R. B. Beebe, salary \$200 per month; R. J. Sandover Sly, salary \$1,650 he to have privilege of doing outside work.

Councillor Duncan moved that R. J. Sandover Sly be appointed town engineer. This was seconded by Councillor Marquis.

Councillor Moores moved in amendment that R. B. Beebe be appointed town engineer. This was seconded by Councillor Gilker.

After considerable discussion Coun. Belle-Ile moved that the matter of the appointment be laid over for two weeks.—Carried.

A petition was read from the town physicians asking that a grant of \$1,000 yearly be made to assist in the payment of the salary of the Public Health Nurse.

On motion of Coun. Moores, seconded by Coun. Belle-Ile it was ordered that \$1,000 be added to the estimates for the ensuing year.

AT ROYAL VICTORIA HOSPITAL. A telegram received from the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, states that venerable Archbishop Forsyth, who is undergoing treatment at that institution, was "resting comfortably but conditions not materially improved." The reverend gentleman's many friends hope for his speedy recovery.

The usual departmental accounts were submitted and ordered paid.

Coun. Graham from the Police and License Committee reported recommending the issuing of licenses to the applicants upon the payment of the usual license fee.—Report received and adopted.

He also reported recommending that Chas. Goss be permitted to install a gasoline tank opposite his store, same to comply with the fire underwriter's rules and regulations. Report received and adopted.

Coun. Graham submitted the report of the Police Department for the months of March and April.

Coun. Duncan read a lengthy monthly report of the Finance department. Among other things this showed that the revenue for March 31st had climbed to \$78,197.25.

Coun. Duncan said that His Worship had requested, as Mr. Luby had so well conducted the work of laying sidewalks that he be reappointed for this season. Therefore he moved that the town clerk write Mr. Luby and engage him for this work.—Carried.

Coun. Belle-Ile said that the Town Solicitor had informed him that a resolution would be necessary authorizing him to collect certain taxes. He therefore moved that the town solicitor be authorized to take the necessary steps to collect the taxes due on the town by the Shives Lumber Co., and the J. & D. A. Harquail Co.—Carried.

On motion of Coun. Belle-Ile the manager of the Electric Light Department was authorized to purchase an oil filter and a registering oil tank.

Coun. Belle-Ile moved, pursuant to notice given at the previous meeting that the following rates be adopted for electric current for cooking purposes.—For less than 100 K.W.H. per mo. 6c. For 100 to 200 K.W.H. per mo. 4c. For 200 or over K.W.H. per mo. 3½c. That each service be charged a minimum of \$1.00 per month with 25 cents per month meter rent.—Carried.

Councillor Belle-Ile gave notice of motion that he would move at the next meeting of the council that no milk be permitted to be sold in Campbellton without it was pasteurized.

Councillor Moores gave notice of motion that he would move at the next meeting of the council that gas, in large quantities than fifteen gallons be not allowed to be stored in town unless same was stored underground.

On motion Council went into Committee of the Whole to consider the assessment.

On returning to the regular order of business the Chairman of the Committee, Councillor Gilker, reported the finding of the committee as follows:—

Moved by Councillor Gilker seconded by Councillor Belle-Ile that the report of the Committee of the Whole be received and adopted.—Carried.

On motion of Councillor Duncan, seconded by Councillor Belle-Ile the salary of the town clerk was increased to \$1,200 dating from May 1st.

On motion of Councillor Belle-Ile, seconded by Councillor Marquis the Fire Protection Committee was authorized to purchase a Lightning Protector. The Council then adjourned.

PRICE FIXED FOR CARAQUET & G. S. R.

Dominion Will Pay \$287,205 For Important Feeder to Intercolonial.

Ottawa, May 8.—The price agreed upon by the Dominion Government for the Caraque and Gulf Shore Railway, is \$287,205. Of this \$87,705 is in the form of the cancelled of moneys due to Canadian Government Railways. The balance is cash. Payment was made by the Dominion Government of \$150,000 on January 13.

Four claims have been filed with the Government against the purchase price. The claimants are W. S. Loggie Company, no amount stated; estate P. H. Melvin, services as superintendent, \$6,500; G. and H. Duguay, parcel of land at Caraque, no value given; W. G. Pugsley, legal services \$4,971.54; no claim has been filed with the Department of Railways and Canals by or for Hon. P. J. Veniot. This information was given by the Hon. A. B. Copp in the House of Commons this afternoon in a reply to a question by E. B. Hanson, Conservative member for York-Sunbury. Mr. Copp added that the delay in completing the purchase of the railway was due to the fact that the company was unable to offer in acceptable title until the Lieutenant Governor in Council of New Brunswick passes a vesting order, which he agreed to pass but withhold.

SHIVES SHINGLE SAWYERS STRIKE

About One Hundred Men Thrown Out of Employment Here.

The Shives Lumber Co's shingle mill which was saving two weeks and which was down Friday, Saturday and Monday to change from sawing pine logs to take from the boom, is idle because the sawyers refuse to work for the scale offered.

The whistle blew at the appointed hour Tuesday morning, as machinery started up with every man at his post. Several of the sawyers approached the superintendent and asked what rate the company intended to pay. They were informed that 18 cents, at which rate they had been paid for the previous two weeks' work, would be the rate for the immediate future. But were informed that, should the shingle market improve this rate would be advanced.

They were also shown figures which proved that at the present market price of shingles, every thousand manufactured showed a loss of 53c.

Notwithstanding that the shingle sawyers walked out and of course the mill had to be closed down. About one hundred men, including the sawyers are thus out of work.

The men said that if the company will pay them 20 cents per thousand they will agree to work the season for this amount.

The superintendent put it up strongly to the sawyers that they were responsible for the mill ceasing operations and thus depriving others from work. Not all the sawyers are involved, some being willing to work at the figure offered, but were induced to strike with the others. The manager has also had requests from outside sawyers for the vacant positions, but in letting matters stand with the hope that the men will return to work. It was also pointed out that the company did not have to operate the mill. In fact it might be better if it remained idle until the market improved.

The Shives Lumber Co's mill here is the largest shingle mill in the Maritime Provinces. It has eighteen shingle machines, and turns out a very superior grade of shingles.

We understand that the W. H. Miller Co. Ltd. and Frasers Limited are paying that sawyers at the above rate, 18 cents for the sawyers and 14 cents for bunchers.

At this rate of pay a sawyer makes from three to four dollars a day, according to the ability of the man.

This shut down is a serious matter to Campbellton after a winter such as we have just passed through and we trust the matter will be promptly settled.

BIG INCREASE IN MOTOR LICENSES

Revenue From This Source Continues to Grow Each Year.

Fredericton, N. B., May 6.—Receipts from licenses for motor vehicles in New Brunswick are practically \$50,000 ahead of this time last year, '21 was learned to-day.

So far licenses have been issued for approximately 4,800 cars and 350 trucks, bringing the receipts to today from this source this year to over \$12,500.

The early rush for licenses this year is believed to be due to the roads having dried up at a much earlier date than usual and the opening of the trunk roads to-day finds plenty of motorists ready to take advantage of the permission given by the minister of public works. The last year with receipts of \$276,232, the department issued licenses for 12,585 touring cars, 875 trucks and 165 motor cycles, as well as a number of dealers tags and 1,600 chauffeurs licenses. Police and provincial constables throughout the province have been requested to hold up all unlicensed cars and to arrest unlicensed persons operating motor vehicles, and especially minors.

Enclosed find report for the month of April. I am pleased to be able to report that quite a great deal of corrective work has been done during the month.

We started our Baby Clinic in March, four babies have been operated on successfully and the parents report a great improvement in the physical condition of the child. One father insists that the child be brought to Clinic each week. He says, "the baby is so much better in every way, since he attended Clinic, that I do not want him to miss a week." He is a wise father, would there were more like him.

One baby was operated upon at the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, April 15th, no charge being made by surgeons or hospital.

On April 29th, four tonsils and adenoid cases were operated upon at the Hotel Dieu, these cases were all free.

Two Saturday mornings during the month Dr. Brennan extracted teeth, free of charge for those unable to pay. 30 cases were treated, 75 extractions, 2 fillings. Mr. Wran supplied us with six dozen tooth brushes and each child was given a brush and taught how to use it.

The corrective work is to be continued by the hospitals and dentist, and we hope for much good resulting therefrom.

MAKE \$700,000
CUT IN ESTIMATES
Militia Expenditures Deal With in
Canadian Commons—Franchise
Bill in the Senate.
Ottawa, May 10.—Yesterday in the
Commons Hon. George Graham, minis-
ter of militia, announced an amend-
ment of Major C. G. Power, member
for Quebec South, when the militia
estimates came before the house in
committee of supply.
Major Power's amendment, intro-
duced some days ago, called for a re-
duction some days ago, called for a re-
duction of \$1,100,000 in the vote of
\$1,400,000.
The amendment which was later in-
troduced by the Hon. Ernest Lapointe
today provided for a reduction of
\$400,000 in this vote. Mr. Graham said
that the government would accept a
reduction of \$700,000 in the total es-
timate of the militia department.

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



**NEW BRUNSWICK
BONDS SOLD WELL**

\$2,300,000 Worth Disposed of Last Week at High Price.

Fredericton, N. B., May 8.—Tenders were opened on Saturday afternoon for the sale of \$2,300,000 Province of New Brunswick debentures to be issued under the date of May 15th. On this amount \$1,200,000 is for the purpose of permanent roads and bridges, \$1,000,000 for the refunding of the three year issue due May 15th for permanent roads and bridges, while the remaining \$900,000 will be devoted to permanent bridges. The issue of \$800,000 is to defray floating indebtedness.

The highest bids were made by the Dominion Securities Corporation, together with Dillon, Read Company. Their bid for the 5 percent \$800,000 bonds of the Province was 99.25, equivalent to 5.07 percent. The bid made by these two companies for the issue of \$1,500,000 five and a half percent seventeen year bonds, New York funds, was 102.11, equivalent to 5.32 percent. Altogether fifteen tenders were received, the bids running high. The bonds of each issue are of \$1,000 denominations, interest payable half yearly.

MANY SHINGLES DESTROYED BY FIRE

Fire At Cookhouse of Restigouche Lumber Co's Mill—Considerable Damage.

About four o'clock Tuesday afternoon word was telephoned to the Richards Manufacturing Co's office here that a fire had broken out in the cookhouse of the Restigouche Lumber Co. at Dalhousie Junction. Immediately autos were despatched with crews of men and fire-fighting appliances. The wind was blowing a gale from the west, and soon the fire spread to the shingles piled along the south side of the highway. These burned with a terrific blaze and soon members were flying about endangering other property, but by hard work the fire was prevented from spreading, except that a barn owned by Robert Good was destroyed. His loss will be about \$1500 partly covered by insurance. His house, which was in the direct path of the burning embers, was saved through hard and efficient work.

Between seven and eight million shingles were destroyed.

Mr. Hicks, manager of the company stated that the loss was fairly well covered by insurance.

ANTICOSTI MILLS TO REMAIN SHUT

Not Expected to Operate This Year—Canning Factories May Open.

Anticosti spent a very quiet winter, and it is not yet known when the mills and lumber mills which closed down in 1917 will re-open, according to Mr. A. D. Dion, Agent for Anticosti in Quebec. About 1,000,000 feet of lumber was cut for local building purposes and there was a considerable number of furs which were shipped to France.

The lobster and canning factories which have also been closed for five years are expected to re-open this year and with renewed operations fishing will be given an impetus. The pulp mills will not likely be operated this season.

A number of rivers have been leased to Americans for the salmon season, this being the second year in that this has been done. The S. S. Savoy left on Monday for her second trip with 35 passengers, and a full cargo of supplies for Ellis Bay. Mr. Martin Zele, general manager of Anticosti, is expected to arrive in Quebec June 1st and Senator Gaston Menier, "Chocolate King of France," and owner of the Island, some time in July.


