Around Town.

PRESENTATION.—The friends of Rev. Mr. Pickles purpose meeting in the School Room of the Church, Point de Bute, Tuesday evening Dec. 27th at 7 o'clock to present him with a substantial token of their esteem. Arrangements for music, speeches, etc. are being made. Time for conversation will be given.

MR. ALLISON NOTES.—The fall term closed yesterday and the students have nearly all gone to their homes to spend the Christmas vacation. In the Ladies' College the term just closed has been marked by complete freedom from the prevailing epidemics and unusual good health among the students has prevailed.

The attendance in this department has been the highest at any like term in its history; namely, 90 resident students and 54 day pupils. Last year the numbers were 81 resident and 49 day students. The prospects are good for a still larger increase next term.

The examinations for the term have been during the term. There is a favorable increase among those who are taking the fall B. A. and M. L. A. course.

The old time idea, which considered that a term or a year's work in higher branches was all that was necessary for young women is happily breaking away before the more modern one of higher and more thorough education. The results in the college and academy will be published until Thursday or Friday.

The work in the new department of physical culture has progressed most favorably. These exercises which consist of muscular movements, are calculated to strengthen the voice, and to give ease and gracefulness of movement. A half hour drill is given every morning, the motions being accompanied by music. This drill is compulsory to all students who are resident in the college. The faculty is inclined to attribute the universal good health which has prevailed during the term to the regular and healthful character of the exercise.

Miss Alice Anderson, the talented daughter of Josiah Anderson, Esq., will attend the Ladies College next term for study in the literary department, and arrangements have been made whereby her expenses will be paid for the first year.

Miss Anderson was a highly successful graduate of Mt. Allison of '91 and has since distinguished herself by her course at the New England Conservatory of Music as a pupil of Carl Faelton, the present director of the N. E. Conservatory and one of the ablest musicians in Boston.

James Pickard, Esq. of Gibson, N. B. was at the College on Tuesday. His daughter, Miss Mills, accompanied him home for the vacation.

Mumps have visited the College and Academy. In the former department one case appeared which was promptly isolated.

A meeting to further arrangements for the coming Semi-Centennial will be held this evening.

In response to invitations issued by the musical faculty over 300 attended the closing concert in Beethoven Hall on Monday evening. The lengthy program of eighteen numbers was carried out in a uniformly creditable manner and it is feared that much of the able progress had been made in the musical and education departments.

In the former a string orchestra has been organized which not only gives a wider training in music to the students but adds greatly to the success of the recitals. The vocal selections were well given. In the education department much advancement is noticeable. The program was as follows:

Around Town.

PERSOONAL.—J. D. Phinney Esq., M. P. P., Kent Co., was in town on Tuesday.

HIGH TEA.—Posters are out announcing a High Tea to be held in the hall, Midgic, on Friday 29th inst. Supper will be served in ample time to allow parties from Sackville to return on the train.

NEW MONUMENTS.—Another New Monument has just been erected in the Sackville Cemetery on the Humphrey family lot.

It is a massive grey granite sarcophagus and the style entirely distinct from anything else. The workmanship and lettering are perfect and does credit to Mr. Huntley who has secured so many fine monuments in our cemetery.

COUNTY COURT.—The county court adjourned sine die on Wednesday 14th.

The appeal case of Norman Dobson applicant and C. W. Raworth respondent was taken up. The conviction before Justice Welling of Baie Verte was quashed on the ground that the information was defective. In the appeal case Dobson vs Raworth the conviction was quashed.

SHIPPING.—Capt. Wm. Egan has been awarded the contract for building the new hull for the Crown Prince. She will be ready for delivery early in the year.

Masts, rigging, etc. have been taken out of the old hull.

The Btgn. Herbert arrived at Barbados on the 7th. Reported all well.

The Siddhartha was at Natal on Nov. 19th ready to sail for Philadelphia.

A TUNNEL ARGUMENT.—The rate of traveling in clear water on the steamer Stanley is said to be six cents a mile which is the highest rate charged in any country, civilized or uncivilized, in the world. The next rate is four cents per mile which is charged on a little railroad somewhere in Asia. Oh, for a tunnel at any price.—[Charlottetown Guardian.]

CONDUCTOR.—An exchange cautions it readers to keep a lookout for counterfeit American notes, which may find their way into Canada before long. They are of the 1889 series and are numbered A 224,445,700. They have the vignette of Jackson and are a very bad imitation. "The paper and engraving of the front are bad. The silk threads are imitated by creases in the paper. The reverse is very good."

TO ANALYZE THE NORTH.—Mr. F. E. Bain, Geologist of St. John, N. B., has been in town for the past two weeks. He is here at the instance of the city of Toronto, to make analyses of the stone of the New York Free-trade quarry and to ascertain its properties as building material. He is working in the chemical laboratory of the Mt. Allison college. The new city buildings at Toronto are being built of this stone and the city is anxious to ascertain its weathering properties and friability.

BOOMING DORCHESTER.—Says the Frederickton Farmer: "Mr. Harry J. McGrath of Dorchester, is at the Queen's resting for a day or two. Mr. McGrath has been in the city for some time of several years. He entertained a select circle last night with a dramatic recital of the Book and Jim convicts, and the former's execution. Mr. McGrath thinks that Dorchester is the hub of the universe, and that what pointers in law, justice and politics cannot be obtained at the devil's hall here, are not worth enquiring for."

KNOWLEDGE AND WISDOM.—The Sermon of Dr. Allison in the Methodist Church last Sabbath morning was delivered before a large congregation and was of more than ordinary interest. Taking as the ground of discourse "Wisdom and Knowledge shall be the Stability of thy times and strength of Salvation" (Isaiah XXXIII—6) the preacher after some explanatory remarks as to the meaning of the Book and Jim convicts, the particular period of Jewish history in which they found utterance and application, proceeded in a very clear and forcible manner to show how knowledge in its deepest and broadest sense and its proper application, had been and was today one of the most powerful and beneficial forces in the progress and stability of the race. The highest welfare of society and of nations, was largely secured and maintained by the intellectual and moral improvements of those who were responsible for the development and destiny of both. The special works of the various Educational Institutions in this and other lands were referred to and some of the far-reaching results already achieved were enumerated. Appropriate and impressive allusions were made to Mr. Allison the founder of Mount Allison Institution, and to the work accomplished by this educational centre during the past fifty years. As a preparation for the jubilee services in January next the sermon was a timely and admirable deliverance and the fair and generous spirit which it commended the various utterances was highly commendable.

Around Town.

The Methodists of Port Elgin have secured the services of Mrs. Harrison of Sackville, and Miss Ayer, violinist, of the Conservatory of Music, for a grand concert on the evening of Monday, January 2nd, in Copp's Hall, Port Elgin. Several other of Sackville's musicians will take part in the program. Further particulars will be given in the next issue of the Post.

TO THE ASYLUM.—On Monday last Harvey Treholm, of Cape Tormentine, conveyed to the P. S. Asylum Lavinia Milton of Emigrant Road. The unfortunate girl has been detained for some time but was not thought dangerous. About 10 days ago she arose one morning earlier than usual, procured a razor and cut a terrible gash in her throat. When found she was bleeding profusely. She was made as comfortable as possible during the journey and was kept under the influence of opiates.

THE EXAMINATION of the classes in the Central School takes place to-day. The enrollment in the two departments during the term has been ninety-one, and the average attendance sixty-two. The attendance in the Advanced Department has been larger than that of any other year, at times both boys and girls have been present. Miss Phinney who has the name of being an excellent teacher, has engaged to teach in Dorchester next term.

DEATH OF MRS. CHUTE.—Mrs. Gilbert Chute, mother of Harvey Phinney, Esq., died at her residence on Thursday last of paralysis. For some days previous to her decease Mrs. Chute was given up by her friends and her death came not unexpected. The deceased lady came of an old family in Annapolis county where she was born in 1812. For the past 20 years her home has been with Mr. Phinney. She was twice married. By the second marriage one son, William F. Chute, and one daughter, Mrs. Mary Chute, and her death will be keenly felt by a large circle of friends. The funeral took place on Saturday to the cemetery. She is the fourth bereavement in Mr. Phinney's home in three years; first wife and mother, then son, then daughter, and lastly Mrs. Chute.

WINTER RECREATION.—The sports of Sackville have devised a new game for the cold weather which may not become popular. The requirements for the game are neither many nor expensive and for return from capital invested it is said to tempt anything of the kind yet at hand. A large room is provided and cleared of everything. The contest is a rough and tumble one, the wilder and more ferocious the better is to be lost among them. The trick is to catch the cat and put his head in a long hole in the wall. The winner is the one who secures the pile. The other night one of the gladiators while upon the brink of success was badly bitten in the face by the cat. This is one of the features which will not make the game popular.

Upper Cape.

A public temperance meeting was held at the Methodist church on Tuesday evening 18th inst. The speakers of the evening were Grand Secretary Robinson of Newmarket, Rev. Mr. Crabbe of Sackville, and Rev. Mr. Robinson of Sackville. The subject was "The Temperance Cause." The meeting was well attended and the speakers were well received.
