FOR GERMANS IN SILESIA

Plebiscite Is Taken As Specified in Peace Treaty.

HEAVY VOTE IS CAST

National Status of Disputed Area Is Decided.

Berlin, March 21.—Germany won an overwhelming victory in the plebiscite held in Upper Silesia yesterday to determine the future national status of that region, according to official returns received here today. Two districts were still missing at 9 a.m. today, but the count showed that 876,000 votes had been cast for Germany and 380,000 for Poland.

Provisional returns published in newspers here show that in Ophein, Geriny received 20,000 votes to 11,000 for land. In Tarnowitz the Germans cast per cent of the ballots and in the nof Beuthen they cast 78 per cent, the Beuthen country districts the a published, stood Germany, 59. Poland, 62,040. A Toronto report credited one of the largest firms in that city with a statement that the price there will drop from \$16.90 to \$15.50 a ton. Mr. Martin said he did not believe this to be correct, although it was possible that companies with a large trade in Toronto might make a reduction of that amount. He considered it more probable that prices would be only 50 cents lower.

The greater part of the coal trade is carried on by six large producing companies in the United States, Mr. Martin explained. Two of these have announced that there will be positively no reduction in prices; two have announced a cut of 50 cents, and the remaining two have made no announce-

London, March 21-The calling by King Constantine of Oronto Prices Will Be \$15.50 Greece of three classes to the national colors, announced at Athens Sunday, in all probability portends a Greek offensive against the Turkish Nationalists, in the opinion of Demetrios Gounaris, the Greek minister of war, expressed in an interview here today.

M. Gounaris, who came to London early this month to attend sessions of the supreme council, thought the offensive move was probable, "as obviously," he said, "we cannot await the completion of the Turkish concentration."

'This decree,' said M. Gounaris, "is a natural consequence of the attitude of Turkey, who has again declared she will not accept the proposals of the London conference, and is demanding the return of Thrace and Smyrna, obtained by Greece as the result of

"It is also being openly declared that the Turkish forces in Cilicia are being withdrawn for use against the Greeks, and we have news of a Kemalist concentration against our army. 'Therefore, the latter has been reinforced, and three classes

BRITISH NAVY HERO SAVES MANY LIVES IN LATEST EXPLOIT

Capt. Evans Goes To Rescue of Chinese Coolies in a Storm Tossed Sea.

PLUNGES OVER SIDE

Noted For Part in Polar Expedition and Fight With German Fleet.

LONDON, March 20. - Capt. E. R. Evans, commander of H. M. S. Carlisle, who was the last man to see Capt. Robert Falcon Scott, the Antarctic explorer, alive, added another chapter to the history of his heroic exploits when he went to the rescue of drowning Chinese coolies from the passenger steamship Hong Moh off Swatow (China) last Thursday, according to dispatches just received here The 200 survivors of the 1.200 persons of board the Hong Moh, the rescued men full of highest praise for what they call the amazing heroism of Capt. Evans, who was personally responsible for saving more than a hundred of them from drowning. Capt. Evans put off from the Carlisle

in a motor boat in a raging sea, and when he found it was impossible for him to get alongside the wrecked Hong Moh he plunged into the water with a life line, upon which many Chinese were carried to safety.
