One of these children is a girl of his own about 11 and the other is an adopted boy of about 13, the son of his wife's deceased sister. In the twenty years that Chapleau lived in Plattsburg his reputation for gentlemanly conduct, sobriety and industry was firmly established, and so far as his family was concerned all accounts agree that he was devoting itself.

The Recorder of Montreal Lectures

The Recorder of Montreal Lectures a Young Couple on its Immorality.

Ottawa, July 16.—Last week there came before the Recorder of Montreal a very peculiar case. There happens to be in that city on a visit to one of its most respectable and well-connected citizens some ladies who belong to good English families, one of whom is engaged to a young Englishmen, who is also on a visit from South America. After dinner a walk was suggested in the park. They walked up McTavish street, where the engaged couple wandered away from the others, and the remainder of the party, supposing they had gone home, returned. What was their surprise on reaching home to receive a message from the police station that the young couple had been arrested and were prisoners in the cells. Their friends went to the station and bailed them out, when they discovered that the couple, when quietly sitting on some iron pipes at the head of McTavish street, saw two men approaching who really were park rangers, but it being dark the young Englishman did not notice the uniform, and being afraid that they were suspicious characters he told his companion to run home, and, in his own words, "tackled them." He got the worst of it, and he and the lady were arrested and marched off to the station.

The Recorder fined the young Englishman \$15 and treated him to a lecture on the immorality of kissing in public places, the defendant having admitted on the trial that he had kissed his intended while sitting on the iron pipes. The Recorder said that the English people must live up to their own standard of morality, of which they braged so much. FRIGHTFUL DISASTER. Explosion of 1,800 Kegs of Gunpowder.

CINCINNATI, July 15.—A terrible explosion occurred here yesterday at King's powder mills, on the Little Miami Railvoad, 29 miles east of this city. Two empty freight cars were being rolled on to a side track, where a car containing 500 kegs of guppowder was standing. As the cars struck there was a terrific explosion, and immediately another car containing 800 kegs of powder exploded, making 1,300 altogether, or about sixteen tons. Wm. Fraula, a brakeman in the service of the Little Miami, was blown to atoms and not trace of his body has yet been found. Several others, supposed to be employes of the powder company, were killed. The King Powder Company and the Peters' Cartridge Works have works on both sides of the river along the railway. The explosion occurred on the south side and THE DESTRICTION WAS ENGRMOUS.

There are a number of cottages occupied by workmen in the powder factory, and situated close to the track. These were shattered by the explosion and their immates in jured. Twelve or fifteen girls at work in the cartridge factory were crippled by the explosion. TEN RODIES FOUND.

News from King's Mills at 9 o'clock tonight is that ten dead bodies have been taken from the ruins, and 30 are known to be wounded.

The Panhandle train due here at 6:30 this evening arrived at 11:45, a delay of five and a quarter hours being caused by the accident at King's station. The passengers say the wrecked district presents a seene of utter desolation. In a dwelling shattered by the explosion an unknown woman had her back broken by the shock and an infant was killed. The reports of 10 killed and 30 or 40 wounded are also confirmed.

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THE WORST REPORTS CONFIRMED.

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CINCINNATI, July 16—12:45 a.m.—A messenger of the Adams Express Company arrived from King's station at 12:45 this morning. He says that at King's station at 11:30 all was bright as day. Everything combustible was burning. The roadmaster of the Little Miami road informed him there were three families living in cottage near the place of the explosion, but six hours search failed to find any trace of them. He says more than ten were killed.

Storm on Lake Michigan.

Benton Hardor, Mich., July 16.—The heaviest rainstorm ever known here struck this vicinity at 12:15 Monday, lasting half an hour. A high wind accompanied the rain and much damage was done. Two houses in the suburbs were blown over, the occupants receiving severe injuries. The raspberry fields were severely damaged.

St. Joseph, Mich., July 16.—The excursion steamer Puritan, plying between this city and Chicago, encountered the full force of Monday afternoon's storm while in mid lake. Captain Sterns reports it the worst he ever experienced and thinks it utterly impossible that the two yachts from St. Joseph could have weathered the storm. They had a dozen people on board.

BEET ROOT SUGAR. Why cannot beet root sugar be made in Intario? So far as growth of the roots is concerned, there is no question. We have the soil, the length of season and all the climatic conditions for the maturing of roots of the best quality, and although our farmers may have something to learn as to time of planting and style of cultivating, mation which they may need is easily acquired. The main secret is to thin out the roots to a proper space in the rows, and to keep them well covered with earth up to the crown of leaves. The tendency of the beet root, like that of the common table beet and the mangel-wurzel, is to grow out of the ground, but it is a fact not generally known that all the portion of the generally known that all the portion of the root growing above ground is of little value for sugar-making purposes, the exposure causing a loss of its saccharine properties. Special cultivation is there-

properties. Special currivation fore necessary, but with a suitable plow or done, and it does not cost more of time or labor than the common cultivation of corn and potatoes. The beet root grown in Germany contains about 14 per cent. of sugar, and the pulp which remains after it is manufactured is highly prized as a fodder for cattle, especially for milch cows. Experimental plots grown in various parts of Ontariolast year from seeds distributed for the purpose proved that roots of equally good quality could be raised here, even although in several cases the farmers did not know the secret of covering up. The average of a number of analyses gave 14 per cent. of sugar, and in the case of a lot grown at the Guelph Experimental Farm the average was 17 per cent. Of course it is not to be supposed that the whole of the sugar in the roots can be extracted. One or two per cent.
