There was a mistrial in the case of the other three, the jury standing, 9 to 3 favor of the conviction of Scaffidi and 6 to 6 regarding Monasterio and Polietz. The jurymen explained that they did not elieve most of the witnesses for the tate, and that the failure of the prosection to put on the stand the two policeen who were the first persons to arrive at the seen of the murder made a bad impression. The men who were acquitted were not at once discharged, because there was another accusation hanging over them. It will be noticed that five of the men lynched were among the accused who had been tried.

THE WAR IN CHILI.

THE WAR IN CHILI.

Serious Reverse for the Government Troops—Murderous Methods of the Insurgents.

London, March 16.—The Times has a dispatch from Santiago giving an official version of the recent battle in Chili. From this it appears that Col. Robles, who commanded the Government troops on March 6, being short of provisions, rashly abandoned a strong position on Mount Sebastopol, and, with 1,200 infantry, 25 cavalry and a few guns, attacked a force of 2,500 rebels. At a critical movement the enemy, by a decoy truce for a parley, opened a fearful fire at close quarters, killing or wounding two-thirds of the Government troops. A general massacre of wounded officers, including Col. Robles, ensued. The loss of the insurgents is estimated at 300 killed and 400 wounded. This places the Province of Tarapaca entirely in the hands of the insurgents. the insurgents.

The establishment of a bect root sugar industry in Ontario is being pushed again. A deputation waited upon the Attorney-General, Hon. Mr. Dryden and Hon. J. M. Gibson this afternoon to get the assistance of the Government in setting the manufacture going. The deputation representing the capitalists who are interested in the scheme was composed of Messrs. W. H. Howland, W. Skaife and R. A. Lawder. Mr. Skaife has been running a bect root sugar factory in the Province of Quebec, but the results have been discouraging. The conditions of the manufacture down there, he says, are not favorable, while in The conditions of the manufacture down there, he says, are not favorable, while in Ontario it has been, in his opinion, proved that the climate, soil and farmers insure the successful operation and the great extension of the industry. All the members of the deputation addressed the ministers. No matter how sure the profit of the scheme could be made to appear on paper it was an experiment and capital was timid, so that what the deputation wanted was that the Prøvincial Government guarantee bonds for one-half of the cost of putwas that the Previncial Government guarantee bonds for one-half of the cost of putiting the first factory into operation. The idea was to build and equip a 300-ton factory, and it would cost about \$250,000. If the Province would promise to aid it in the way desired capitalists would be found to put the factory in operation. Then with everything complete the company would issue bonds for one-half of the cost, and if the thing proved a success the Province would not be called upon to redeem the bonds. In the event of the failure of the industry the shareholders would atand to lose the whole of their \$125,000, while the Government for their \$125,000 would have the factory and its plant. 
