The Lords and Home Rule. London, Sept. 7 .- The House of Lords Was crowded this evening with people eager to hear Lord Rosebery, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, speak on the Home

Rule Bill.

The first spenker was the Earl of Selborne, Liberal-Unionist, who made a bitter attack upon the bill.

Lord Rosebery followed Lord Selborne. He said that the arguments in which parases about "capitulation" and "rash and uncertain experiment" had been need by opponents of home rule were exactly the acet that had been amplied against sort that had been applied against the sort that had been applied against every great reform of the present entury. The same arguments had been made against the Catholic Emancipation Bill, the first Reform Bill, and also the bill for the repeal of the corn laws. Members of the Opposition had said that the present bill ought to be carefully considered, because it was legislation not for to-day, but for an uncertain to-morrew. The House of Lords, having decided before the debate opened to reject the Home Rule Bill, could not be called a dissecting room so justly as it called a dissecting room so justly as it could be called a chamber of death. Detate, therefore, was unreal and academic.
There was no equal division of the parties
in the House of Lords. It was only one
there, only with a slight percentage of an-

hands to welcome the Unionist proposals. The House of Commons had lingered over the Home Rule Bill with solicitude. The House of Lords gave the bill short shrift. This summary disposal of a great measure entailed upon the House of Lords a tremendous responsibility. There were 113 Irish peers sitting in the House of Lords, and he wanted to know, for it was an important factor in fighting five-sixths of the popular representatives of Ireland, how many of those peers in any sense whatever represented any part of Ireland except Ulster. Did the House of Lords mean to fight the Irish people with representatives of only one small class? (Irish shouts of "Hear, hear.") In 1886 Lord Hartington (now the Duke of Devonshire) and Mr. Chamberlain had said that home rule was mainly a question of degree, and they had succinctly and definitely laid down the limitations they were prepared to grant. Were they of the same opinion now? If so, the Duke of Devonshire had been singularly ill-advised in moving the rejection of the present bill. He might have allowed the second reading to pass sub silento, and then got the bill in committee, manipulated it to his liking, and, amended, returned it to the House of Commons, where, though the amendments might be stoutly resisted, a subsequent conference of the two Houses might have led to some agreement. Even if this course could have had no fruitful result it was a clear and patriotic line of action for the House of Lords to take. He was no enthusiast for home rule. He supported it simply as the best of the three courses open to the Opposition—to adopt modified home rule, continue the policy of coercion or disfranchies Ireland.

In concluding, Lord, Rosebery said that the present bill (was undoubtedly an experiment, but most legislation was necessarily so. CONTINENTAL UNION.

Mr. John Jacob Astor's Views Upon Unification.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—John Jacob Astor as been giving his views on political

union.
"I thoroughly believe in the annexation of Canada," Mr. Astor replied, "and should like to see an 'ocean bound republic,' under one government, extending from the Arctic

to the Caribbean Sea. "This would forever prevent such wars and armaments here as have blighted Europe, and would give a large area abso-lute free trade. The absorption of Canada would be a great step toward this achieve-ment. The demand for it should, however, most preperly come from the Canadians, since in the event of hard times, which the union would do much to ameliorate, they would then have nothing with which to re-pressely as the state of the state of the state of the state of the preach us.

"The next point would be for the "The next point would be for the united countries to assume the combined national debts, or the union might be hastened by purchase, as in the cases of Louisiana and Alaska.
"Our resources and development permit us to assert the belief that if there is one

us to assert the belief that if there is one government it should be ours, though we could well make some such change as to appear in Congress to defend their measures, as is done in the English Parliament. Circumstances have favored the United States and not Canada. This is apparent to the Canadians, and they naturally desire the advantages of commercial union, which I think we can in all fairness condition upon its being also political.

think we can in all farness condition upon its being also political.

"Though both countries would be greatly benefited materially, there would be a political advantage for Canada, for, in the event of a war between England and Russia, she would be safe under the Stars and Stripes, while dependence on England will entail enormous loss."

"No The French were in Louisians, the Spaniards in California and Florida. How is it now? Both the French and Spanish languages, being based on Latin, are similar to English, while the people are easily absorbed."

"It would be no larger than the Russian empire and not as large as the British, while, of course, far more compact. Both contain more inhabitants than we should have for a long time, while the population of China is four times as great. The Canahave for a long time, while the population of China is four times as great. The Cana-dian resources need development, while

dian resources need development, while almost any temperate zone product can be raised on the high plateaus of Mexico.

"Central America and the Nicaragua Canal should, of course, be ours. There is no natural barrier in North America. Geographically, the continent is one. Means of transportation will not stay where they are. It should soon take less time to go from Alaska to Progresso than it took Gen. Washington to move from New York to Baltimore.

"The unification of North America is, of



regard to church matters will be taken up. Process of Making Postage Stamps. Process of Making Postage Stamps.
Every part of postage-stamp making is done by hand. The designs are engraved on steel, 200 stamps on a single plate. These plates are inked by two men, and then are printed by a girl and a man on a large hand press. They are dried as fast as printed and then gummed with a starch paste made from potatoes. This paste is dried by placing the sheets in a steam fanning machine, and then the stamps are subjected to a pressure of 2,000 tons in a hydraulic press. Next the sheets are cut so that each one contains 100 stamps, after which the paper between the stamps is perforated, and after being pressed the sheets are tiled away. If a single stamp is injured the whole sheet is burned.—[St. Pau Pioneer Press.
