Food Supplies Destroyed and Travel

Impeded-Advent of the Monsoon.

Calcutta. June 18.-Almost the whole coast yesterday by the fierce gales, will province of Assam has been devastated by the earthquakes. Melton Veal-Take one pound of any cold veal, chop it fine and season with one-half saltspoon of salt, one saltspoon of pepper and a teaspoonful lemon juice. Add two or three tableone-third as much finely-chopped ham as of veal, season with mustard and cavenne, add one tablespoonful of cracker crumbs and moisten wth hot stock or water. Butter a mold and line it with slices of hard-boiled egg. Put in the two mixtures irregularly, so that when cut it will have a mottled appearance; press in closely and steam three-quarters of an hour. Set away Rice Croquettes-One pint of cold

boiled rice warmed in a double boiler with two or three tablespoonfuls of milk. When soft add one egg, well beaten. spoonful of salt, a little pepper and one heaping tablespoonful of fine chopped parsley. Shape, roll in fine dry crumbs, then in beaten eggs and again in crumbs, and fry in smoking-hot fat, the same as for fishballs.

Entire-Wheat Buns-Scald one large cupful of milk. Pour it hot over one-half cup of sugar and one-half teaspoonful salt. Add one-quarter cup of melted butter. When lukewarm add one-half cake compressed yeast disolved in a cup lukewarm water. Stir in about three cups and a half of en--wheat flour, adding a well-beaten egg and one-half cup dried currants. Let it rise until light. If too soft to handle, add a little white flour. Knead a few minutes, roll out, cut into bis-cuits, and let them rise again until very light. Bake about twenty biscuits.

Potato Puff-Prepare one pint of hot mashed potatoes seasoned with one-half teaspoon salt, one-quarter saltspoon pepper, one-half teaspoon celery salt, and butter size of walnut, making it quite moist with hot milk. Beat yolks and whites of two eggs separately, and stir them into the potatoes
