



AGO RECALLED

Old-Timers to Interview Their Diaries.

The extreme mildness of the weather has prompted some of our readers to recall the winters of long ago, says the Toronto News. One gentleman has been looking up his diary and sends a record of the mild winter of 1887-8. Another pioneer is moved to recall severe weather of by-gone days, and by consulting his diary finds that the winter of 1867-8 was the severest in the last 40 years. Both letters are

given below. Sleighs Not Used All Winter.

Subscriber West Gwillembury, says: It is not necessary to go further back than the winter of 1877 and 1878 to find a parallel to the present mild winter. I give a few extracts from a diary of that date:

December - Plowing practicable throughout the month. January-Light frosts and snow-

Feb. 13-Beautiful mild weather. Feb. 22-Rain all day.

Feb. 27-Very warm; the month throughout very mild and pleasant. March-First week mud very deep on roads. March 8-9-Very warm, sun rising

March 16-Rain; continues mild throughout the month. Sleighs were not used at all during the winter. Fall wheat was green the entire sea-

The Sultan's authority has been unequal to the task of preserving law and order, and France been compelled to interfere for

the protection of her contiguous colony of Algeria from the depredations of Moroccan bandits. The French have already established a frontier police force on account of these irruptions, and are undoubtedly in a more advantageous position than any other power to effect reforms in the Sultan's dominions. France's paramountcy in Morocco has been conceded by Great Britain unreservedly, but the German Government, while disposed to admit this special interest in a restricted sense, takes the ground that French police control virtually means a French protectorate over Morocco. demands some form of international control, and to this France has so far refused her consent. The Kaiser, in his ostentatious speech at Tangiers, which was a direct challenge of the Anglo-French agreement, declared that Germany would uphold the integrity of Morocco, and it is upon this declaration that his Government takes its stand. France disclaims any design upon Moroccan independence, and enters a plea of self-defense.

If the conference proves fruitless, as it probably will, the situation will revert to the status quo, France will be obliged to maintain her frontier police force and the Sultan will be under no compulsion to improve his administration. The worst result will be a further estrangement between France and the place originally intended for your Germany, introducing a new source of friction in the relations of the powers



SNAP-SHOTS AT VARIOUS SPORTS

The Globe seems to be taking Justice Falconbridge's decision on the Rowe case very much to heart, in fact it almost loses its temper in the matter. It says: "The belief that the Ontario Hockey Association has met with a serious setback in its efforts to keep its inclosures clear of those not entitled to admission is largely a delusion, but the delusion is a source of great glee in some quarters. The idea that a body which has a record by its impartiality, its activity and its fearlessness will be ered in the performance of its duties, strikes the "crabs" as someing to be relished mightily. That feeling and its active demonstration are counted on by any body exercising disciplinary powers. The O. H. A., er, in its judicial relations with its players, is a court of equity, and petty-larceny technicalities that largely determine what is known as law have no place there. The sole question considered in passing on the eligibility of a player is whether he meets the requirements of the rules and practice of the association. If, in the opinion of the executive, he does not, "all the King's horses and all the King's men" can't qualify him to participate in the association's games. And it is a satisfactory record in this respect that the executive can look back on. In no single instance in all the history of the O. H. A. has a player been excluded who was really entitled to play in the association series."

Whoever the writer means by "crabs" is hard to find out, but we fancy it refers to any persons who has the temerity to criticise the actions of Star Chamber of the O. H. A .- the sub committee. We thought their action in this case high-handed and illegal to a degree, and that opinion has been borne out by the recent decision. The unseemly haste of the committee to suspend Rowe before the Barrie-Argo game, led us to the belief that it was not so much justice as the desire for a Toronto team to win the district. That others took the same view is very apparent. Nothing was to be lost by delay. No harm could possibly be done by waiting. But the sub-committee acted just as its critics expected it would, and a cry of "Hogtown" has been the result. Toronto evidently does not care three hurrahs who runs the executive as long as it runs the sub-committee. This is no time for whining and calling names. Play the game squarely and then there will be no such difficulty. The O. H. A. certainly has not done itself proud

Swimmer Daniels is breaking all the swimming records at New York, but has not tackled those made at the last Berlin-Argo game.

The practically unanimous decision of the Ontario Association of Fairs A Exhibitions for a repeal of the Ontario act prohibiting horse racing at e fairs is the concrete expression of the fact that the law instead of reresenting public sentiment, was quite contrary to it. The prohibition has never been regarded, though the directors of some fairs made a poor pretense, by altering the wording of the conditions of the harness races, and abandoning those for the runners. The State Association of Fair Managers of Chio have just put themselves on necord with a declaration that their strongest attraction was in the racing department. Winnipeg has the same experience to relate, and so also the Minnesota State Fair, probably the most important and extensive annual fair in the whole United States. The horse industry in Ontario has never been dealt with by the agricultural department of the Government from a national, not to say equitable, standpoint. The race course is the show ring of the breeder of light harness and thoroughbred horses, and all that has ever teen done for him has been to discourage and restrict or abolish his field of operations.-Globe,

Jockey Herman Radtke, by winning four races on Friday, smashed the world's record for winning mounts during a week. The record first belonged to Ted Sloan, who rode eighteen winners in one week: then to Eugene Hildebrand, who rode twenty. By Friday's victories Radtke brought his record for one week up to twenty-one mounts.

The ancient sport of falconry is being followed with renewed interest in the old countries, and the talk of falcons, tiercels, and merline is frequently heard in the smart sporting set, while the relative merits of the sparrow hawk, the peregrine and the goshawk are gravely discussed. The best birds come from France and Sweden, and there is a growing importation of them. The art of breeding and training is now being taken up by a number of enthusiasts in England.

When Borghesi beat Wire In in the two-mile race at Los Angeles on Thursday he came close to the time record for the distance, and surpassed the best previous record at that track by 51/4 seconds. The world's record is still teld by Judge Denny, who ran in 3:261/2, at San Francisco, eight years ago. Ten Broeck, running against time, made a record of 3 271/2, nearly twenty years ago. Borghesi's time on Thursday was 3:27%, and the racing report says he won pretty easily.

There was more criticism among turfmen yesterday for the Lansing-Cassidy anti-racetrack betting bill, which has just been introduced in the senate at Albany. "The bill has been looked over by eminent counsel," said a leading turfman, "and it has been pronounced too drastic. It discriminates against betting between individuals on the results of horse races, and should it become a law similar legislation could be enacted that would make betting on poker, football and baseball games a felony which would land guilty persons in jell for sentence. How are the crusaders who are behind this bill going to prove to the Legislature that the gambling laws are violated at the racetracks? Can any one produce tangible evidence that bets are made at the track in violation of the law when not a scrap of paper passes between the layers and the players? If the law is not infringed upon, then Why put up a crusade against something that has been pronounced legal by the court of appeals?

"The American people like to speculate. They play stocks and the races for amusement and profit. They bet on elections, boat races, prize fights, bicycle rices, football games, baseball contest, bowling and billiard matches. They are prohibited by law from playing roulette, faro, klondike and other gambling games in which the paraphernalia cannot always be depended upon. Poker, craps, fan tan and other games of chance in which the passng of money between winners and losers is in evidence are also illegal, all

which may be proper. But if betting on one sport is to be made a felny, then all such forms of speculation should be treated in the same way. There should be no favors and no discrimination. Racetrack betting is a fad. It is not gambling, in the strictest sense of the word, and cannot be suppressed. The racing game in this state, should it be prohibited, would be the means of throwing thousands of persons out of employment and would kill the American breeding industry in which millions of dollars are invested. The fact that such men as William K. Vanderbilt. August Belpont, H. P. Whitney, Clarence H. Mackay and James R. Keene are in practical control of the sport in the east and especially in this state should prove beyond peradventure that the turf is in good hands and that attempts to hill it are not sanctioned by the general public."-New York Sun.

The Church of England will continue to control the university, but the senate will be thrown open to the representatives of all those, of no matter what denomination, who contribute towards the support of the insti-

This means that the Church of England, in the scheme which the bishop refers to in case the university is not made undenominational, does not propose to make the university in any sense a theological institution, or as simply an annex of Huron College. On, the contrary, the aim will be to make it a thorough teaching institution, with a senate board enough to take in all denominations, to allow all denominations to have a vote on its policy, but, of course, with the control in the hands of the Church of England.

What will this mean? As far as can be seen from this distance, it will mean that the 180 parishes of the Church of England in the maintenance of the university.

ANNIVERSARY DAY

Rev. J. J. Teasdall Conducts Services at Hamilton Road.

Rev. J. J. Teasdall conducted both morning and evening anniversary services in the Hamilton Road Methodist Church yesterday, and on both occasions the church was crowded. In the course of his morning address Mr. Teasdall dwelt emphatically upon the boy's influence on the man. He cautioned his hearers not to imagine that God had not a place for even the halfwitted boy or man. Though he admired grand men of speech and thought, he looked back to the days when, as a boy, he was influenced so strongly by good men.

The speaker said that men often denounce the church even while they owed nearly everything to it. It was at the church's altars where many were married; in her alsles many bowed in prayer: from her doors many friends were carried out to their last resting place. The church's position was stated strongly, and the speaker advised the making of the places of worship more attractive. He then spoke of the one great church of God, at which altar every Christian must kneel and worship. The address was most interesting and held the attention of all throughout.


