MINERS' STRIKE TIES UP RAND

White Workmen Quit, Rioting Ensues and Troops Are Called Out.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Johannesburg, May 23.—The new Transvaal Government has met with its first serious trouble in connection with a big strike of the white mineral on the Rand. The workers in 46 of the leading mines are out, and the work is with difficulty being carried on by poor Dutch, who, however, may in the long run benefit at the expense of the strikers, whom the magnates declare will not be reinstated. Rioting, arising from the strikers attacking the strike-breakers, has broken out at the Ferriera mine and others. There has been some revolver shooting, but little injury has been done. The situation has become sufficiently serious, however, to induce the Government to

summon regular troops. J. W. Smutz, who is colonial secretary in the new Government, and who held a ministerial position under the Boers, has accordingly had the novel experience of calling British troops into action. Seven hundred cavalry and infantry have arrived. There is much bitterness between the magnates and the miners and their

The trouble began by the British miner refusing to accept a reduction in pay for contract piecework. The owners say that the men were earning an average of \$3,000 each annually, and that a reduction was necessary. The miners and their sympathizers construe the employers' action as an attempt to increase the cheap labor of the Chinese and Dutch, and to augment their own profits. The disputed questions were recently submitted to Government commissioners, and many of the public condemn the miners for not waiting the commissioners' decision before striking. Business here is seriously checked. The eitizens are pervous and disposed to panie.



The Chehalis was sunk, and nine people were drowned.

At the investigation held immediately afterwards the C. P. R. was held responsible for the accident, and Capt. Griffin's certificate canceled for six months. Capt. Griffin was later tried and acquitted on a charge of manslaughter, and the damage actions were then instituted. Instead of trying each action separately, the several actions were consolidated. 



If the fielder had allowed the foul fly to drop out of his hands or had not gone for it, there would have been no trouble, as the runner could not advance on a foul which was not caught. The very fact that he had to run a long way for the ball made it impossible to recover and throw to the plate in



Harriman to compel him to answer certain inquiries that were put to him in the New York investigation before taking action on the genera subject of the investigation. In the opinion of members of the

commission, it may be a year or even more before a final decision can be reached regarding the efforts of the commission to compel Mr. Harriman to answer its questions. The proceedings to that end will be instituted in the courts of the southern district of New York the latter part of this month They will be for the purpose of obtaining an order from the court to compel Mr. Harriman to respond to the inquiries. It it expected that if the court

should issue such an order, Mr. Harriman may carry the case to higher courts and eventually to the supreme court of the United States. Should the lower court's decision be adverse to the commission it is probable that it will carry the matter to the highest tribunal, inasmuch as the question involves a right of the commission which it believes it ought to exercise in an untrammeled way. TEACHERS HOLD OUT FOR EXAM

The East Middlesex Association Favors Continuation of Public School Leaving.

At the meeting of the East Middlesex Teachers' Association yesterday afternoon, a report on the public school leaving examination was presented on behalf of a committee by Miss McKenzie. Letters were read from teachers, all declaring that the fifthclass examination was profitable, and it was agreed to have it next year, and to ask the county council to make a grant to meet the expenses incurred by it. It was also agreed to follow a timetable for work in department regulations.

A committee of teachers was appointed, with Inspector Thompson, to prepare papers and also to examine the written papers of the pupils. Mr. Scott, principal of the Toronto Normal, gave an address on "Some new pedagogic theories and their application." He said there are really no new theories, but teachers understood the old theoriest better. Most of these theories originate in a book on child study, which made the teacher wish to know the child, as well as the subject taught. Modern pedagogy has revealed (1) that the attitude of teacher to child has been entirely changed, and the teacher studies the child so that the abstract child has ceased to exist; (2) that the so-called stupid children have troubles which cause them not to hear or see or talk well, and there should be a surgical examination to ascertain what is wrong; (3) there is no development without the fuctioning of the nervous system; the fundamental principles should lead to the accessory; (4) the strongest potential faculty in the child is that for action; repetition is necessary in teachnot be neglected; (5) that each organ

ing, and simultaneous teaching should has its growing period, and neglect of this is attended with serious consequences. The mind wearies if the body is tired. Play is necessary to dispel mental fatigue. The time of physical growth is the time of mental growth, and this is the time of most rapid progress, and all progress is an advance from the definite and the indefinite.
