

NO PREFERENCE TO WINNIPEGERS

C. P. R. Not Distributing Cars In Their Favor Declare Officials.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 6 .- The Do minion Millers' Association, through Mr. C. B. Watts, presented to the Railway Commission this morning a series of complaints of delay in shipping grain from Fort William and Owen Sound. He read the correspondence which had passed between the association, the Canadian Pacific Railway and the commissioners relative to these delays. Mr. Charles Hudson, car distributor for the C. P. R., admitted that there was a shortage of cars all over, and that Owen Sound could not always get as many cars as it asked for. He said many of the company's cars were held in the States, and on other roads. He admitted, however, that they had cars

Mr. Hudson and Mr. Osborne, the uperintendent, both emphatically denied that a certain firm of merchants were allowed to retain cars as long as they chose. In closing the millers' ase, Mr. Watts asked that an order be made to supply the necessary cars at the various points, that the cars be distributed in proportion to the various demands from each point, and that no preference be given to flour or other shipments, and no prefernce given to Winnipeg millers.

THE WATER PROBLEM. The water commissioners have de cided to place meters in the city schools, and in some of the large establishments.

There are nearly 300 meters in use Buenos Ayres 1,026,000 in the city, and they give satisfaction all round. The water commissioners admit that an extension of the system is good civic policy, but they do not go far enough. There is no city in which a better case can be made out for th installation of meters on a large scale. The water supply can be increased only by large expenditures while nearly one-third of the water actually pumped into the mains is wasted through carelessness.

Many cities with unlimited wate supplies have resorted to meters to keep the cost of pumpage within reasonable bounds. It is the only businesslike system for a municipality which must pay heavily to augment its water supply. The argument for meters in London is further strengthened by the fact that the quantity of spring water available is limited, and that the only alternative is a resort to a river which drains a long stretch of coun-

The experience of municipalities which have adopted the meter system is uniformly favorable to it. Berlin, Ont., is a recent example. About 65 per cent of the services are metered. which includes nearly all having more than a kitchen faucet. Superintendent Hymmen states (Nov. 4, 1907) that "Commissioners and consumers are well pleased." This is the testimony of other communities.

A gradual extension of the meter system and the adoption of an independent high-pressure service, using water problem for some years at very little expense to the public, and prewater for domestic purposes.

Several other different religious bodies are contemplating a formal organization of the movement within their own limits, in addition to securing as many of their members as posrecent development has been the action taken by whole cities, with reference to the missionary question. Ten days ago a meeting was held in Topeka, Kansas, with 100 carefully selected representatives of all the churches. It was found that last year they had contributed only about \$7,000 to foreign missionary work, an average of 61 cents per member for all the Christians in the city. A resolution was offered proposing to increase this amount this year to \$25,000. After a full discussion, this proposal was ratified enthusiastically by the whole assembly, and the canvas is now in progress for the securing of this amount. In St. Joseph, Mo., this last week sim-

ilar action was taken which was in ome respects even more remarkable. The city with a population of 100,000 has 12,000 Protestant church members. Last year they gave \$12,000 to foreign missions, while they spent \$127,000 for religious purposes at home. MANGLED BY MACHINERY

Montreal Workmen Meet Ter rible Death in Factory.

Montreal, Nov. 6 .- Two horrible accidents occurred today in Montreal factories. In the first, Henri Bourassa, employed in the Thomas Davidson Manufacturing Company, was instantly killed. Bourassa went to speak to the engineer, and on his way became entangled between two spokes of the fly wheel of the big engine driving the machinery. The first known of the accident was when the engineer heard a snapping noise, and, supposing something had gone wrong with the engine, stopped it. On examination he was horrifled to find Bourassa's body battered almost out of recognition between the spokes. Dennis McCaffrey lost his life in the second accident. He worked in the Canada Sugar Refinery. Falling, he landed on a belt, and, catching it with both hands, was drawn into a pulley and mangled to death in an instant.
