Flowers were thrown in the path of the king as the procession made its way along boulevards lined for miles with dense throngs. Succumbed To Old Trouble BRITISH PRISONERS RECEIVED BRUTAL TREATMENT FROM GERMANS; MEN STARVING AND OCEAN'S GREATEST IN RAGS RELEASED BY HUNS

Enemy Appeared To Treat British More Violently Than Others-Weakened Soldi ers Forced To Do Heavy Labor In Mines As Punishment.

Lordon, Nov. 23.—Pitiable conditions among British prisoners of war who have been liberated by the Germans since the signing of the armistice are described by Reuter's correspondent at French headquarters. Thousands of these men, mostly British, are entering France daily. The correspondent writes: "I have never seen human beings in such a state of raggedness, hunger and misery. When the camp at Forbach, 38 miles east of Metz, as well as those elsewhere, were broken up, the prisoners, some of whom were captured during the March offensive, were told to clear out and seek help from their allies. They started to walk the fifty or sixty miles to the allied lines, but were given no food and had no money. They were in shameful rags, the soles dropping off their boots. Some wore clogs and no socks.

"They left the prison camps in droves of hundreds in charge of German officers and soldiers who had deserted. The weather was very cold, and many died by the roadside within a few miles from

## **GREYHOUNDS SUNK DURING THE WAR**

Fifteen Liners Were Lost by the Cunard Steamship Company.

New York, Nov. 23.—Fifteen steamships aggregating 206,769 gross tons were lost by the Cunard Line during the period of the war, it was learned here today. Of these, all except two were classed as war losses, having been sunk by torpedoes or mines. The Campania and the Ascania were lost through accidents. The tonnage sunk represents approximately one-half of that possessed by the line at the outbreak of the war in 1914. Nearly all of the Cunard liners were well-known Atlantic greyhounds, the largest of which was the Lusitania, torpedoed on May 7, 1915.



Otherwise you will be required to turn in the above-mentioned articles and equipment before receiving the \$45.

2. No. The \$10 is your own property, provided that you are not deficient in kit, and the \$35 is given to all soldiers on discharge, irrespective of period of service, to enable them to obtain a civilian outfit.

When the whole future international development of the world was in the crucible it was both a blunder and a calamity that the country should be plunged into the tumult of a general

"He said his case against holding an election was greatly strengthened by the fact that the men most entitled to express an opinion on the reconstitution of affairs-the soldiers in the field-would be unable to vote. The House of Commons which will be brought into existence, he said, will be of such a nature as to lack the right authority.

"He said he was prepared to give fullest support to any government which grappled with the problems of reconstruction on progressive lines.

"Mr. Asquith contended that the country was as much agreed on peace aims as it had previously been in accord on war aims, and the present government could enter into the international council chamber with the indisputable mandate of a united people. Moreover, he said, there was no vital divergence about needful transitional measures at home necessitating immediate elections.

"We must get back as soon as possible to the old atmosphere of freedom. There is no government and no parliament but will benefit thereby. I advise the Liberals to take a straightforward course, to keep their eyes open and their hands clean.

This appears to be the correct view to take. This seems a ridiculous stand to take considering the manner in which President Wilson has laid out the future of a large section of middle Europe and the extent to which the United States has become involved in the financial affairs of the Entente powers.

As the United States is going to have a big say as to what form the reconstruction of the old world shall take, she must share some of the burdens and responsibility, and policing is one of these. There is no doubt, however, but that the American people as a whole recognize the responsibility and are willing and anxious to carry on with men and money during the ticklish transi tional period and after if necessary. America's magnificent contribution to the cause of the Allies can't beat Beatty. has made her a participant in "Europe's quarrel." and she cannot escape a sharing of the tasks that peace brings. The liberation of the world from the bondage of militarism and the removal of the Prussian menace has been accomplished, but the task of making this hard-won freedom secure will be a titanic one. The United States' "interference" in the affairs of the old world is logical and right. Any view that would have the United States back out now is wrong, and casts a reflection on the intelligence and honor of the people of the great republic. To withdraw the entire American army from Europe at this time might be of little military importance, but it would be construed by those influences hostile to liberty as an indication of discord amongst the Entente nations and the Entente peoples would be inclined to consider Washington as a deserter.

#### **SOLDIER-STUDENTS** AT WESTERN PUT ON "CIVIES" ONCE MORE

In accordance with demobilization orders received from Ottawa recently, the military authorities have granted all medical students in khaki at Western University the option of accepting their discharge from the service in order to continue their medical course, or to give up their studies and report back to their respective units for training

Practically all soldier-students at Western University, medical department, numbering about 25, have accepted the former course, and are now in civilian clothing. One or two members of the first-year class who were allowed to enter Western as matriculants, having been given leave from their military units with pay to attend, have discontinued their medical studies owing to financial circumstances, the army pay having now been discontinued.


