Men Refuse To Accept Company's Offer.

3,000 WILL GO OUT

Taxicab Drivers Quit Because of the New City

Cleveland, May 4.—Union motormen and conductors employed by the Cleveland Raflway Company at mass meetings last night and early today rejected the company's maximum offer of 75 cents an hour, an increase of 15 cents, with a minimum six-hour day, and voted overwhelmingly to strike at midnight tomorrow. Approximately 3,000 men will be affected.

When informed of the action of the men John J. Stanley, president of the company, said: "There will be no more proposals from the Cleveland Rallway Company. We have gone the limit. That's final."

More than 100 Cleveland taxicab drivers, comprising one-third of the members of the Livery Chauffeurs' Union, went on strike this morning, following passage by the city council last night of a new taxicab ordinance, providing stricter police regulations of drivers reducing for press and





Anson Best Soon To Be On Trial On Murder Charge.



One of Many Borden Commissions Did Nothing But Spend Money.

DIDN'T WASTE PAPER

Commission On Economic Development Used Thousands of Dollars.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, May 3.—A commission which cost the country the very considerable sum of \$23,200.48 and never made a report, is the latest thing among all the varied delegations of responsibility and executive authority of which the present and the late Borden governments have been guilty.

Since 1911 commissions, committees, boards and controls have been as numerous as blackberries at Kazubazua. Whenever the Government desired to shelve responsibility of to provide jobs for impecunious friends an organization was formed for the purpose of making inquiry into any subject which first came to the mind of the cabinet. They cost the country thousands of dollars, but even if their recommendations were for the most part shelved and the dust of time allowed to accumulate on the bulky and expensive volumes which contained them, they usually made reports.

ports.

Economic Development.

Not so the economic development commission appointed under the chairmanship of Sir James Lougheed several years ago. The commission was appointed to inquire into almost every conceivable question relating to the development of the Dominion. It toured here and there and took evidence. It called witnesses to Ottawa and heard them there. It paid the fees of "experts" called to testify before it. And the members of it apparently put in good heavy expense accounts.

fore it. And the members of it apparently put in good heavy expense accounts.

But it never made a report, excepting of its expenses, which, as has been stated, amounted to over twenty-three thousand dollars.

For many sessions past members have been asking what the results of its deliberations and investigations were. This afternoon John Campbell of Nelson was informed that "no report has been made, but the duties of the commission being largely suggestive and advisory, their views on certain subjects have been discussed informally with the Government for the purpose of advising or assisting the Government touching many subjects upon which it has been necessary to take action either by legislation or otherwise."

Numbered Over Score.

The present Borden Government, before its members commenced to drift away from it and before defections set in, numbered over a score of more or less able-bodied men of average intellect, who pulled down from the public treasury a total of about \$200,000 per year in salaries alone, not including expenses. They were assisted in their labors by the largest army of civil servants which has ever been conscrepted in Ottawa under any government since confederation. And yet it paid twenty-three thousand dollars to the economic develonment commission, so called, for "suggestive and advisory" purposes.

In extenuation there is the comfort that at least the commission did not waste paper on a report.

BLOCKED TEMPORARILY

Amendment Might Prevent the Union Members Getting Conciliation Board.

OTTAWA, May 3.-Keen criticism in the House today resulted in the temporary blocking of a senate bill to amend the industrial disputes investiga. J. F. Reid, MacKenzie. tion act (the Lemieux act). The clause of the bill particularly at issue was one relating to the authority of union leaders to apply for a board of conciliation. Under the present act such authority must be approved by a majority of the members of the union present at a meeting called for that purpose. Under the bill the approval must be given by a majority of all the members of the union. of the union.

Especially critical of the bill were Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal Opposition, who, as deputy minister of labor, drafted the Lemieux act, and Angus McDonald, recently elected Labor-U. F. O. member for Temiskaming. It was Mr. McDonald's maiden speech in the House and was followed with interest from all sides.

Would increase Strikes.

Mr. King argued that if a number of men working in a mine were dissatis-

Mr. King argued that if a number of men working in a mine were dissatisfied they could not, under the bill, obtain a board on their own application. They must wait for the approval of a majority of the whole union. Mr. Mc. Donald declared that the effect of the amendment would be to increase strikes. A section in a mining camp would be unable to secure inquiry into any grievance they might have, and its dissatisfaction might very easily affect the whole industry. The effect of the proposed amendment to the act appeared the reverse of beneficial to labor.

More clauses in the much debated franchise bill were passed, and tomorrow the House is to take up the important amendments touching on the enfranchisement of women of enemy alien birth naturalized by marriage. 

INDUSTRY AND HEALTH. (By Mrs. George Hambleton, M.A., Late Fellow of the Department of Political Economy,

University of Toronto.] Medical science has just been officially united with industry by creation of the health section of the International Labor Office. The union was nated under the aegis of the League of Nations. Foreshadowed in the Treaty of Versailles and recommended by the first International Labor Conference, the creaton of this body is the first step in a far-reaching policy to establish, ultimately, a government service in each country adhering to the League of Nations, especially charged with the the war a proportionately heavier drain on her duty of safeguarding the health of workers; and to link up each of these national services with the health section of the International Labor Office.

> Canada's Position. The position of Canada with regard to the health of the International Labor Office is not yet The labor department, the newly-created federal labor department and the Industrial Re-search Council of Canada each have some claims to affiliation with the labor health office of the league. but none of them was created definitely to protect the health of the workers. There is again that no man's land of vague jurisdiction—not only between various federal authorities, but again be-tween federal and provincial authorities—in which he claims of individual workers often are tragically ost. One function of the newly-established International Health Office will be to clarify the situation, and, before the next International Labor Conference, to induce the various governments to fix responsibility for the workers' health definitely on ome particular department. In the meantime, the correspondence of this office is likely to be an illuminating commentary on the operations of present-day governments; for Canada is but a mino ffender in regard to overlapping of authority vested
