# SHOT JONES

Burglar Rice Tells the Story of the Desperate Attempt at Escape.

There was a Shot From his Right and Boyd Dropped-Glose of the

Toronto, Oct. 30 .- At to-day's session of the Assize Court; the first witness in the Rice case was Dr. Powell, who made the post-mortem examination upon the prisoner Jones. He was cross-examined at length by Mr. Robinette, who tried to show by him the improbability of Stewart's story. Two bullets had struck Jones, one lodging in the arm, and the other entering at the left side of the groin and passing down the back and across the right side. Mr. Robinette mainained that the bullet could not have taken this course if Jones had been standing up. Dr. Powell replied that it was hard to theorize about the course of a bullet through flesh. He had thought at the time of the examination that Jones has been sitting down when shot, but added that he might have been in some position lower than the man firing. In re-examination, Mr. Guthrie brought out the point that deflection of the bullet might be caused by the tissues. There was nothing in the wounds inconsistent with Stewart having fired from the back, as related in his evidence. Had Jones been shot in the and walked around. However, witness also admitted to Mr. Robinette that Jones might have been dragged by his friends.

Dr. George A. Peters gave evidence saying that nothing in the condition

do on cross-examination was to get Dr. Caven to say that if Boyd had twisted around, so as to face south, he might have been shot by Jones or Rutledge,

Dr. George A. Bingham corroborated Dr. Cavin's evidence. He added that and after death, and that there had been no signs, either, on the clothing or on the skin of powder burns, such as might have been expected had the shooting taken place in the hack.

The court adjourned at 1 p, m.

At this afternoon's session of the trial of Rice for the murder of Constable Boyd, the prisoner himself took the stand. After relating the cir-cumstances of his life, and of his trial, n August last, he told of the shooting affray, in which Boyd was killed. He had no idea that the package of revolvers was to be thrown into the cab, and when it did come, he did not know what it contained. He said there was a scramble between Stewart and Rutledge, and the shoulders of the two mens were pressed against each other, Rutledge using his right and Stewart his left shoulder ,both men facing to the south. Boyd had grabbed my left arm and Jones pressed himself back into the seat, pulling me back with him. Boyd let go of my hand and put his foot against my chest and at the same time drew his revolver and shot Jones. Almost immediately there was was another shot from my right, and I saw that Boyd was killed. When the second shot was fired I turned and Jones handed me the revolver, saying "Take this, I'm hit." Stewart and Rutledge were still struggling, but when Jones handed the gun, Stewart threw up his hands, and said "Get out," Rice then described their leaving the cab. When they were going away he fired the revolver a couple of times, but aimed low down, not at any one. He shot from the natural instinct to escape. He denied having tried to kill any one on

With the exception of his own story no evidence beyond medical testimon, was offered on behalf of Rice.

Dr. Forbes E. Godfrey made a state ment most important to the defence It was that the story of the shooting of the prisoner Jones by Boyd was en-tirely consistent with Jones' wound in the groin. "I think the post-mortem report corroborates that story." he said. He added that the revolver must have been held higher than the point at which they bullet entered the body, or otherwise the ball would not

bave gone down so low.

## STERN LECTURE Warm **READS THEM**

Liberal Machine Organ Says the East Kent Liberals Dare not Place Candidate in Field.

Otherwise the Bye-Election Will be wor by the Conservatives-Past Experiences Recounted.

Yesterday's St. Thomas Journal, as ardent organ of the Liberal machine, undertakes editorially to read the Liberals of East Kent a severe lecture for expressing dissatisfaction with the candidature of John Lee, the machineselected candidate. As a lash to whip them into line the Journal warns the East Kent Liberals that in event of another Liberal candidate being placed in nomination the Conservatives will enter the lists and win out, and makes a pathetic appeal for uni-

ity in the Liberal ranks on Mr. Lee. The Conservatives have decided not to contest the bye-election and, in view of that fact, many of the independent Liberal electors are earnestpendent Liberal electors are earnest-ly advocating a candidate of their own choice rather than the arbitrary selection of the party bosses at Toron-

The St. Thomas Journal in its lecure to the Liberal electors says:-

"Reports are again being industriously circulated that there is dissatisfaction amongst some of the Liberals of East Kent over the nomination of John Lee, of Highgate, for the vacancy in the Local Legislature. It is said back he could scarcely have got up that George Johns, of Bothwell, who was the minority candidate at the convention, or Dr. McCully, Reeve of Harwich, will be nominated by dissat-Harwich, will be nominated by dissat-isfied Liberals in opposition to Mr. Lee. It is altogether probable that saying that nothing in the condition of the wounds was inconsistent with Stewart's story.

## BRITISH GAINS

Twenty-two Prisoners Taken.

London, Oct. 30-Lord Kitchener, in despatch from Pretoria, dated Tuesday, Oct. 29., says Colonel Bygn surprised a Boer commando, Oct. 25, and captured twenty-two prisoners, including Field Cornets Spanneberg and Onisthuisen.

A RUNNING FIGHT

Colonel Fortesque, the despatch adds had a day-long running fight with Muller's Boer commando, October 27 northwards of Balmoral. He killed four Boers and captured 54 prisoners 36 wagons and much stock.

A DUTCH COMPLAINT.

The Hague, Oct. 30—The report of the Dutch Red Cross Society, just pub-lished, deals bitterly with the capture of the Dutch ambulance corps near. Pretoria, July 5, 1900. It declares the British knew before the ambulance left Pretoria that it carried private letters from Boer families to men in the field, and that they did not pro test, but allowed the ambulance to start, captured it outside the town and used the letters, as a pretext for deporting the doctors and nurses, who are still in captivity on the island of Ceylon. The Red Cross committee subsequently appealed to Lord Kitchener to redeem his promise to Mrs. Botha, and allow the doctors and medicines to pass through the British lines for the benefit of the Boers but

## ACQUITTED

Jury at St. Catharines Finds a Verdict of not Guilty in the Murphy Manslaughter Case

St. Catharines, Ont., Oct. 30-At the pening of the assizes this morning, he Murphy manslaughter case was reviewed by the counsel, and at 10.10 was presented to the jury. Before giving it to the jury, his lordship reviewed the evidence. He said the jury would be justified in finding the prisoner guilty of negligence and careless conduct, and causing the death of Pattison. Both the counsel agree that something had passed over the deceased's head, while the medical testimony showed that the fracture of the skull would cause death. He thought the crown should present some reasonable theory to base a conviction. This they had not done. He thought there was no evidence that there was any collision of the wagons, In closing his address he warned the jury that if they were not thoroughly satisfied that there was sufficient evidence to convict the prisoner should

be acquitted. At 11.05 the jury returned and presented a verdict of "not guilty."

In addressing the prisoner, His Lordship stated that the jury had found their verdict right. There had been no evidence to show that there was any criminal guilt on the part of Murphy. Still he thought that a great deal of blame rested on the shoulders of the prisoner. The deceased had came to his death while doing a kindness in bringing home the prisoner, who was in an intoxi-cated condition. His Lordship read Murphy a severe lecture on his drink-ing habits, and warned him to be more careful in future, for should be get into further trouble this trial would

The case of Seymour Smith and his wife, Preciilla Smith, charged with the theft of documents of title, the property of Marion Smith, was the first criminal case, The alleged theft was committed on Oct. 17. Verdict, not guilty. In addressing the prisoners His Lordship stated that the jury had acquitted them, but he still thought them technically guilty.

### WORK FOR THE CHURCH.

Students of social questions have for many years past given a great deal of attention to the disputes arising between capital and labor, in the hope of discovering a method of arbitration which would be equally satisfactory to each of the contending parties, and which consequently could be depended upon in every case, or even in the majority of them, to bring about an amicable settlement of the trouble, removing at the same time latent causes of dissatisfaction which might lead to future strife. Many plans have been suggested, and a few have been tried with more or less success, but no method of mediation has yet been hit upon, so mearly filling the requirements as to warrant its elevation to a permanent institution to which all cases of dispute between employers and employed should be submitted.

The great difficulty is to find arbitrators in whom both parties can place confidence. If such a board is chosen from among employers, the workingmen naturally suspect them of partiality for their own class, and unless the award is clearly in their favor, refuse to be bound by it, pr at all events only await another opportunity to reopen the breach. If workingmen are selected, the employers are bound to entertain the same suspicions. Government arbitration is no better, is worse, indeed, when we consider that politicians are invariably working for their own ends, and would be more apt to make the decision accord with personal interests than with right and justice.

The latest attempt to solve the problem is by the church, and the plan which has been suggested seems to promise better results than anything that has yet been tried. The subject was brought up at the Episcopal Triennian Convention, recently in session at San Francisco, and so much impressed were the delegates with the possibility of the church being able to act as peacemaker in these disastrous labor troubles, that a board of conciliation, composed of men who could not fail to command the confidence of both capital and labor, was straightway appointed, to which all labor questions will be referred, and whose services will be available whenever and wherever they may be required. The example of the Episcopal Church has been followed by the civic federation, among whose members are Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop Ireland, Bishop Potter, Seth Low Charles Francis Adams, who is president of a number of important manu facturing and transportation companies; Carroll D. Wright, United States Commissioner of Labor; Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and the presidents of the powerful trades unions of the country. The movement is bound to spread to other religious bodies, until each church stands in the position of mediator in labor quarrels which occur among its own people. But there must be co-operation, too, and if the organization is to be perfect a great central agency, composed of the wisest and best men of all the denominations, will exercise supreme control.

The feature of this plan which distinguishes it from all previously tried and gives it assurance of success, is the absolute confidence which can be reposed in the impartiality of a body of clergymen. Laymen have interests which are likely to color their judgment, but the clergy ought to be free from such trammels, and could be trusted not only to decide impartially, but from the nature of their calling. to make their decision in accordance with the principles of mortality and

Moreover, the influence of the church, which is more powerful than that of any other single institution, would be directed towards the betterment of the relations between the employers and the workingmen, and the nelioration of the condition of the



BIG WHALE.

Montreal, Oct. 30 .- The Montreal harbor has a unique visitor in the shape of a monster whale, which is stranded on a rock near the Victoria Bridge. The whale was discovered today by some of the harbor workingmen. It is about 40 feet long. It is very rare when a whale works itself up the St. Lawrence from the sea as far as Montreal. The only previous case of the kind happened in 1836, when a whale was caught in the harbor of whale was caught in the harbor of Montreal. The skin of this whale, which weighed 800 pounds, has since been preserved in the Montreal Natural History Museum. An effort was made this evening to kill the whale. 

## SERVANTS IN GERMANY

### The Whole Subject Is Under the Con-

trol of the Police. A group of bright women sat discussing their travels abroad. All had made something more than a tour of European hotels and all had observed something of interest to women outside the beaten tracks.

"The methods by which they eliminate the 'servant girl question' in Germany, said one-the wife of a professor in an important American university very interesting. They go at it with the same thoroughness with which the German attacks everything, whether a rare species of beetle or the organization of

the army.
"The whole subject is under the control of the police. They have every servant girl listed. If a housewife requires help in her kitchen, but is unable to pay much for it, by application to the proper authorities she can secure a young girl without experience. A contract is made for a year. The employer agrees to feed and clothe the girl and to teach her certain specified things in housekeeping, but no wages are paid. At the end of the year the housewife can retain the girl by paying her small wages and agreeing to continue her education in housework to a certain specified extent.

"The things she is to teach are nominated in the bond,' and she is expected to rigidly carry out her end of the agree-ment in consideration of the fact that she pays little or no wages. In this way, to rigidly carry out her end of the you see, the servant serves an apprenticeship. It is much superior, I think, to our way, in which we take ignorant girls, teach them everything they know, even to speak English, and pay them nearly or quite as much as a well trained serv-

ant. "If you want a thoroughly competent servant in Germany you can get one at a specified price. And you can examine the record of every girl at the police sta-tion. If she has ever been discharged, you will find the fact there, with the rea-sons therefor, and thus can tell her character at a glance without resort to the farcical letter of recommendation

given by a former employer.

"As the system implies, every German woman is an absolutely competent house-wife. She knows the business of run-ning a house thoroughly. Young girls of good family after they leave school often go to some particularly competent house-wife, whom they pay to put the finishing touches upon their education in this respect. I knew one such woman who brought up three sons by means of taking boarders and of teaching young women of good families in the manner described."







Arthur J. Eddy has returned Chicago, after having completed what is probably the longest automobile trip ever made in America. For sixty days he has been travelthroughout the East, and in that time he has covered more than miles. Mrs. Eddy accom-2,600 panied him on more than two-thirds of the journey, including the run from the East to Flint, Mich., way of the Canadian route. Mr Eddy said:

"The Canadian roads are far and away the best that we encountered. They are long stretches of 50 aad 100 miles of hard macadam roadbeds, kept in admirable condition. They are even better than our Chicago boulevards, and kept better. The Michigan roads are a disgrace to the State, so are those of Ohio. In the Eastern States the roads are

PRETTY WALL POCKETS

They Do Nicely For Presents, or You Can Use Them Yourself. Of course we all know the wall pocket something less well known is the vide poche, manufactured out of a champagne ottle casing of the ordinary straw kind. bottle casing of the ordinary straw kind. The straw case is not tampered with as regards shape. It remains precisely as it is, but it is gilded with metallic paint and trimmed with diagonal bands of ribbon, tied into a bow at the top right or left hand corner and the opposite lower corner. The ribbon is further continued as a suspender. A stiff lining of canvas, covered with green, gold or other colored Japanese silk, should be inserted in the vide poche, the silk being stitched to the straw to keep it in place. Without the straw to keep it in place. Without the stiff lining the straw would, of course, fall flat and limp. A wall pocket of this description looks very pretty as a holder for flowers, an ordinary bottle being in-serted and filled with water should nothing lighter for the purpose be at hand. The notion is sketched in No. 1 wall

Another novel vide poche is the "Pierrot" (No. 2). It resembles a Pierrot's cap and can be made of white cloth or, if something smarter is preferred, white silk or satin. It is trimmed with white pompoms and suspended by white rib-bons. This wall pocket is easily made by twisting the cloth or whatever material is selected into sugar loaf form, previously rolling over the top edge. The join should be neatly stitched and occur at the back of the wall pocket, which, like the straw model, should have a stiffened lining to keep it in shape, though



A TRIO OF DESIGNS. this is not absolutely necessary if cloth be used, as the material is sufficiently firm in itself. A paper lining, however, would be advisable. The stiffish white paper known as "jam paper" answers admirably. The pompoms should be sewed round the front of the rolled over edge and here and there on the cap it-self, a bunch of pompoms finishing off

the tip of the cap.

A different variety of wall pocket is suggested in No. 3 model illustrated, a larger type than the pockets alluded to. Here we have a flat vide poche, which has for its background a piece of stiff cardboard with a curved top piece. This cardboard must be covered with art serge on brocade and the top part be strapped across with narrow ribbon, etitched down wherever it cross upper part thus forms a letter rack, the being tucked into the ribbons. A pocket is then added, and this can be stitched down to the background in the center and thus divide itself into two

Fair Maple City Guest was one of the Passengers on Wrecked New York Train.

Chats of the Collision to The Planet-Ladies Maintained Wonderful

Miss Nellie Barrie, of St. Louis, who has been wisiting in New York for some tome, was the guest of Mrs. Geo. Witherspoon, Wellington street, yesterday. She left last evening to visit at her home in Sarnia.

While coming from New York to Buffalo on the Boston Express, New York Central Line, Miss Barrie had very narrow escape from death. The train, which was made up of four sleepers and a number of coaches, was running at the rate of 59 miles an hour and, at one o'clock yesterday morning, when about 40 miles east of Buffalo, crashed into a freight car which was deft standing on the main

The engine and two coaches were badly smashed and the rest of the train was derailed and some of the coaches turned over on their sides in

the ditch.

### DOVER TAXES

To the ratepayers of the Township

of Dover: Having been asked by some of the ratepayers about their taxes being a

ratepayers about their taxes being a little higher this year than last, I thought it my duty to give the following explanation:

In the first place, the amount of county rate levied by the County Council on Dover for this year is \$236.11 more than for last year; to raise this difference requires one-tenth of a will on the dollar more tenth of a will on the dollar more tenth of a mill on the dollar more

than last year.

Again, the amount required for township rate was put at \$7,551.50, and to raise this amount would require 4 3-10 mills on the dollar. But it has been found that in taking the items which make up the township rate, a clerical error was made by in-cluding an item which did not belong to this rate, and on correcting this error it reduced the rate from 4 3-10 mills to 3 3-10 mills on the dollar, which is the rate now imposed, being three-tenths of a mill more than last year for the same purpo son for this is that the township rate is more than was required last year; the only increase the Council made this year over last year is \$50.00 for roads and bridges, the balance being made up of \$109.62, which is the increase in Dover's portion for the House of Refuge over last year's rate, which rate is levied by the County Council, and of the township's proporion of the assessments on roads for drains. So that the only increase over last year for County, Township and General School Rates, is 4-10 of

mall on the dollar. We carefully looked over the several drain accounts and found they owed the township \$ \$4,094.44, and thought it best to collect \$3,339.14 of it this year, and to refund the surplus to the ratepayers on other drains, amounting to \$1,824.70.

We thought it would be to the best interest of the township to have these

matters squared up at once.

No doubt we will get a certain amount of blame for thus, but it must fall to the lot of some Council, and I fully believe the ratepayers on get-ting this explanation, will think that
