Toronto, June 2.—Senator Cox was again on the stand all day yesterday before the Insurance Commission, except for a short time at the beginning when Co. Macdonald of Confederation Life corrected some incorrect impressions from his evidence about New Zealand insurance. Cox Could Wait.




