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Training in Thankfulness

A Primary teacher was telling her class the Christmas story as given in Luke's Gospel. She had come to the verse which tells us how, after the angels had gone into heaven, the shepherds said one to another: "Let us now go.. and see this thing which has come to pass;" but, instead of giving the words of the shepherds, she said to her children:

"Now, what would you say if angels came to you with such a wonderful message?"

One little hand went up eagerly.

"Yes, Jackie," she asked, "what would you say?"

"I'd say, 'Thank you,'" said Jackie.

It was not the expected answer, but oh! how the teacher treasured that reply which

indicated in the little child a real appreciation of God's goodness.

A little child is not born with a deep sense of gratitude, as he is born with the power to imitate and imagine; it is a quality which needs cultivation and its cultivation will take time. We carry the baby until he can walk. We do much for him without looking for any expression of thankfulness, until he is old enough to understand, to a slight extent at least, the efforts we make for his comfort and happiness. He must first be made to realize the source of his happiness and benefits if he is to be thankful for them. He loves the nodding flowers and the golden sunshine, the blue sky and the twinkling stars; he enjoys the warmth of his woolen clothes in winter and the coolness of his cotton suits in summer; he relishes his food with a keen delight and refreshes himself eagerly with drinks of water and milk. Here is one great opportunity for training. He may grow up a selfish little fellow with never a thought as to who provided all these things, but, on the other hand, he may be filled with wonder and love for the Creator who gave them, and out of that wonder and love will spring gratitude to a heavenly Father who cares so much for him, and to an earthly father and mother and all others who are God's helpers in making him comfortable and happy. At every meal he can learn to bow his little head and say:

> "God is great, and God is good, And we thank him for our food."

At bed time he can express his thanks by telling God how glad he is that he cares for him:

"I've had a very happy day
And now, I bow my head to pray,

Dear Father, I am glad you keep Awake when little children sleep."

But thankfulness must be shown not only in word, but also in deed. The words of that hymn which every child should know, aptly express this idea:

"Can a little child like me,
Thank the Father fittingly?
Yes, oh yes! be good and true,
Patient, kind in all you do;
Love the Lord and do your part;
Learn to say with all your heart,
Father, we thank Thee!

Father in heaven we thank Thee !" We must give the child opportunity to show his thanks in tangible form. For example, at Thanksgiving or Christmas by a little self-denial, there can be a giving as well as a receiving that some child less fortunate may have a glad Thanksgiving Day, or a happy Christmas. There is an inward glow that comes with such little sacrifices, which will make the child eager to show his thankfulness again by sharing with others. Thus, the habit of thankfulness is formed, for thankfulness like other things, is increased through practice. It is a habit which a few people seem to have deep-rooted and instead of going about grumbling about the hardships of life, they overflow with gratitude for the joys allotted them-and they are not usually those people whose paths have fallen in most pleasant places. Let us help our children to acquire this habit.

Thankfulness is increased by example. Let us always remember to say "thank you" for the little gifts and sacrifices on the part of our children. We cannot expect them to be grateful to us unless we show gratitude to them.

Stories furnish examples of gratitude. If we confine ourselves to the Bible alone we find considerable choice. There is the story of the thanksgiving of the Israelites upon crossing the Red Sea, that of the healing of the ten lepers, that of the children singing their glad hosannas at the triumphal entry of our Lord, and Mary's beautiful song: "My soul doth magnify the Lord." Let our children learn such passages as this and The Shepherd's Psalm, as well as their more simple praise songs, that they may know the

joy of singing with their whole hearts in gratitude to God, their Creator and Father.

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Rainy Day Occupations

"Rain, rain, go away; Come again some other day, For little Johnnie wants to play."

The old nursery rhyme well illustrates the spirit in which most rainy days are met by the little ones. What then may be done to make the outwardly gloomy weather sunny and bright within doors?

A little lad of three summers, as active and fond of outdoor sports as a healthy boy should be, having recently planned a delightful picnic in which wading in the water, and a boat ride held prominent place, awoke to find the rain pouring down upon the long anticipated day.

Disappointment was plainly written upon every feature of the little face, but he bravely pushed back the tears as mama told of the thirsty little flowers and grass that were thankful for the nice drink of water, only remarking: "But mama, seems to me they are drefful thirsty, for it rains most all the time."

Later in the day he had his picnic dinner served upon toy dishes on his little table, with sandwiches, lady-fingers, and a bit of candy to complete the feast. "It is 'most as nice as outdoors," was his satisfied comment, and mama felt amply paid for the trouble.

We have found in our own experience that it is well to have certain "rainy-day" toys and occupations reserved for stormy days when the little people are storm-bound.

Ofttimes the more simple the equipment, the greater the pleasure to the child, for the imagination is brought more strongly into play and the interest thus more deeply enlisted.

We sometimes see an odd little "grinder man" about our house. Strapped to his back is the carrier from papa's bicycle (to represent the grinder's stand), in his hand the small table bell, and he marches up and down occasionally stopping to "grind scissors" (always his blunt ones), as happy and busy a boy as one wishes to see!

This same small boy finds endless pleasure in a collection of Perry pictures I keep only for rainy days. They have been carefully selected both with an idea of artistic merit, and with the idea of interest from the child's standpoint.

These may seem simple suggestions, as they indeed are, but they have developed from the actual needs of one little lad who, being an only child, has been thrown upon his own resources for amusement.

For children of six years or older, who have passed the purely imaginative age, and wish to do something of real use, the little hand looms now used in many Kindergarten and Primary rooms offer much pleasure. There is a fascination in the threading in and out of the needle as the little rug takes shape, that holds the interest of the child, while the variety of colors and the patterns of the rugs thus made is limited only by the amount of material furnished and the ingenuity of the child in forming the fancy borders.—Exchange

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Going to Sleep

"I don't want to go to bed," said Bess.
"Everything except children can stay awake
till it's dark,—real night,—and I don't see
why children have to go to sleep so early. I
want to watch the flowers and the leaves.
They don't have to go to bed!"

"Oh, don't they?" answered grandfather, in a surprised voice. And then he added, "The clover and the wood-sorrel and the nasturtiums have been asleep for more than an hour. They don't have to be sent to bed, because they go quietly without making a fuss."

Bess looked at her grandfather with very wide-open eyes. "Sure enough, grandpa? Do flowers go to sleep, or are you just beginning a new story?"

All the crossness was gone from the little girl's voice. She was very much in earnest.

"A true story," answered her grandfather.
"You see, the flowers and leaves—that is, a great many of them—go to sleep with much more regularity and good sense than a great

many children, and grown-ups, too, for that matter. After they have kept house for the bees all day, and danced with the wind, and played hide-and-go-seek with the leaves, they are as tired as little girls are, and are quite ready to go to bed."

"But how did you find out, grandpa?"

"Bless me, child, I didn't make the discovery! A wise man by the name of Pliny—"

"I know about him a little. Go on, grandpa."

"I will if you won't interrupt, my dear. Yes, a wise man named Pliny observed the habits of certain plants, and two thousand years later a very learned man, Linnæus, wrote a good deal about the sleep of plants. But I have not only read what Linnæus wrote. I myself have watched them go to sleep, and they do it sweetly and gently without a murmur, and right on time."

"How do they, grandpa? They haven't any beds to go to sleep in, you know."

"Of course not. They just hang out on their stems, which are like hammocks for them, I dare say, and they 'turn in' by turning the outside of their leaves downward."

"To shut out the moonlight?" asked Bess.
"No, to keep from getting too cold. The outside of the leaves is thinner, more delicate, than the under surface, so they turn the under side up and protect the tender faces of the petals, just as we humans put screens up to keep drafts from our heads at night."

"What time do they go to sleep?" Bess asked the question quite seriously.

"The pretty, pale-green wood-sorrel is an early-to-bed-early-to-rise plant. The leaves begin to sink before five o'clock, and by half past five of a summer afternoon they have dropped down until they form a charming little tent, which keeps off the chill and night dew from their faces. The tiny tents are unfurled at a quarter of seven in the morning, when they awake. The leaves of the common clover, which you see every day, Bess, go to bed quite differently. Instead of falling down, the clover leaves rise and fold over each other, so that the under surface is exposed. Then as evening draws on, the two little side leaves twist themselves and move toward each other, until their faces come together. At the same time they bend downward, and the middle

leaflet rises and forms a nice little roof over the edge of the closed side leaves. The clover begins to get ready for bed at four o'clock in the afternoon, and wakes up—that is to say, straightens its leaves out flat—at an early hour in the morning. You see, the flowers and plants need as much sleep as children, and they never have to be reminded or—"

"I know what you are going to say, grandpa, but you needn't say it, for I am going to be as sensible as the clover and the woodsorrel and the nasturtiums. Isn't it wonderful to think of the dear little things actually going to sleep and waking up? Good night, grandpa! I am going to bed now, so I can get up early to-morrow morning and watch them waken and wash their faces. Won't it be fun, though? I'm always going to bed with the flowers after this."

And Bess went to bed quite happily, and never again did she complain when bedtime hour came.—Youth's Companion



Fan Fu Lin

Fan Fu Lin lived in the main street of a little Chinese city. His father was a silver-smith and made curiously carved finger rings and earrings for women. His mother was busy all day making clothing and shoes for her family and helping to prepare the food. She seldom went out except to buy a few feet of cloth or some thread in a nearby shop.

Fu Lin was not often lonely. He had so many cousins living in the same yard to play with. There are very few toys in a Chinese home, but Fu Lin's mother had made some pretty balls of cotton and colored wool, and the little children played with these. At New Year's season many little presents were given to the children such as whistles, clay animals or men, and little trinkets of various kinds. The little girls also played "jacks" with small round stones.

But Fu Lin used to spend much of the time in his father's shop. At meal time he would take his bowl of food and chop-sticks and sit on a little stool watching the people go by, as he ate. There is no wall at the front of a Chinese shop, so the people on the street would often speak to him as they passed.

One day a stranger wearing foreign clothing passed by and spoke to the bright faced lad, inviting him to come into the little church nearby where the people learned about Jesus. Little Fu Lin went the following Sunday and became much interested in the stories he heard. He brought a New Testament and learned to read parts of it. Soon after this, the strange foreigner, who was a missionary, called at the Fan home. He was taken into the guest room and politely compelled to sit in the seat of honor, one of the two chairs placed on either side of the small guest table. Tea was served in little bowls, but no cream or sugar was brought in. The Chinese think it a very strange custom to mix these things up in tea.

A few weeks after this a school was opened by the missionary, and Fan Fu Lin was one of the first to enter as a pupil. There he learned not only such subjects as are taught to boys and girls in Canada, but also about the Bible. After school was closed for the day, all the pupils would enjoy a game of football on the playground in front of the school. It was very funny to see these boys, and the teacher too, holding up the skirts of their long, coat like garments as they ran to kick the ball.

Many of the boys lived at the school and slept, as do most Chinese, on a sort of brick platform, covered with straw matting. Several boys can sleep on one of these brick beds, and sleep well, too, each rolled in his quilt.

One large iron pot, almost as big as a small wash tub, contained all the food for one meal, and when the thick wooden cover was removed the hungry lads thought their dinner of millet and vegetables smelled very good.

Fu Lin made such good progress at school that soon his little brother was also sent. Both these boys are still at school and may some day be preachers, and perhaps some boy who is reading this may be working with them in China. Who knows?



THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus wanted his disciples to know how willing God is to answer prayer, so he told them a story about a man who was not at all willing to do what his friend asked him to do.

A man heard a knock at his door in the middle of the night. When he opened the door, there stood a friend who had come on a long journey and was tired and hungry. "Come in, come in, my friend, and rest and have some food," the man said. But when he looked, there was not a loaf of bread in the house, so he ran to a neighbor and knocked at the door. "Who's there?" cried the neighbor. "Friend, will you lend me three loaves of bread, for a friend of mine on a

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journey has come to see me and I have nothing to give him to eat."

The surly neighbor would not take the trouble to come to the door. "Do not trouble me," he said. "The door is locked and my children are with me in bed. I cannot get up and give you bread at this hour of the night." But the man kept on knocking till at last the surly neighbor got up unwillingly and gave him the bread.

Jesus said, "If this surly neighbor gave the man what he asked for because he kept on asking, surely God also, so willing to give all we need, will give us what we ask. "Ask, and ye shall receive; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you," Jesus said.

Jesus told them to think how willing they are to give good things to their children. If you fathers are willing to give good things to your children, how much more willing your heavenly Father is to give the best gift of all—the Holy Spirit—to those who ask him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day Jesus was walking along the shore beside the Sea of Galilee. He saw two fishermen standing in the water near the shore. These were the very men he was looking for. They were brothers, named Peter and Andrew. They were getting their nets ready to catch fish. Look at our picture, and you will see them turning around when they heard Jesus' voice calling to them.

Jesus stood on the shore, and beckoned to them. "Follow me," he said, "and I will make you fishers of men." They did not know then what he meant, but they left their nets and followed him, and afterwards they knew that he wanted to teach them to bring other people to him, so that they might become his followers also.

A little farther along, Jesus saw two other brothers whom he wanted. Their names were James and John. They were in a fishing boat with their father Zebedee. They were mending their nets. Jesus called them as he had called Peter and Andrew, and at once they left their boat and their father, and followed

These men did not say, "We are busy, we cannot come just now." No, they left their work and followed Jesus as soon as he called them. These four men were the first of Jesus' band of twelve disciples.

When Jesus was saying good-by to his disciples, before he went back to heaven, he told them that he would come to them, even when they could not see him. They wondered

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very much what Jesus could mean. One of them asked him why he would not come to everybody in the world. Jesus told them that he would only come to those who love him and obey his words.

Jesus told them that the words which he spoke were not his own words. They were the words of his heavenly Father. So you see if you disobey Jesus' words you are disobeying God's words, and Jesus will not come to you if you are disobedient to God.

A great many boys and girls all over the world hear God's Word every Sunday. The Bible tells us we must be doers of God's Word and not hearers only. God has promised to bless all who do the things he tells us to do.

There is one thing you must be very careful to use in a right way, if you love Jesus. That is your tongue. You must "keep a bridle" on your tongue and not let it say any bad or untrue or unkind words. The way to be doers of God's Word is to obey what he tells us to do.

Jesus has told us two things, he wants us to do. We must love God and love one another. One way to show our love to God is to be kind to any one who is in trouble, and you should love others so much that you will want to be just as kind to them as you would be to yourself. Jesus says, "If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments," and this is our Golden Text.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus was twelve years of age. It was the time of the Passover Feast, and all the families in the village of Nazareth where Jesus lived were going up to Jerusalem to worship in the temple.

They heard the wonderful story about the way in which God had brought his people out of the land of Egypt long, long ago, when they were slaves to the cruel king Pharaoh. God caused the death angel to pass over their homes and to take the eldest child in each of the homes of the Egyptians as a punishment upon the king and his people. God's people of Israel kept this Passover Feast every year to thank God for his goodness to them.

The last day of the Passover Feast had come, and the people all started back to their homes. The children were away ahead, laughing and talking about all they had seen and heard. Mary and Joseph supposed that the boy Jesus was with the others. But when night came and they gathered around the tents, he was no place to be seen. They searched everywhere but could not find him. So Mary and Joseph started away back to the city to find him, and where do you think they found him? Our picture shows us. It was in the temple. There Jesus was sitting in the midst of the wise teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And these wise men

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were astonished at the questions he asked and the answers he gave them.

When Jesus saw that his father and mother had come to look for him, we may be sure he was very sorry that he had caused them so much trouble, but he told them that it was time now that he should be beginning to attend to the business of his Father in heaven. They did not know at the time what Jesus meant, but they understood it all afterwards.

However, Jesus went home with them and was very obedient to them in all things. But Mary could not forget the things that had happened, and she felt in her heart that God had some wonderful work for the boy Jesus to do. His parents were only taking care of him till he should be ready to begin that work.

Day after day the boy Jesus worked and played and studied, and made his home very happy by his loving obedience and his joyous spirit. THE LESSON RETOLD

We often see pictures of our Red Cross nurses and doctors binding up the wounds of our soldiers who have been fighting for us. Look at our picture. This man is binding up the wounds of a poor man who looks as if he had been very badly hurt. Would you like to hear how he got hurt?

Jesus had been telling the people that they must love God with all their heart and mind and soul and strength, and they must love their neighbor as much as they loved themselves. One of them asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus answered by telling this story.

A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho. While he was passing through a wild, rocky place, some robbers pounced upon him and knocked him down and hurt him very badly. They took his coat and all the money he had. Then they ran away as fast as they could and left the poor man lying there alone, Lurt and bleeding.

Now it happened that one of the proud priests of the Jews happened to come along that way. He saw the poor man lying there, but he would not go near him to help him. He coldly passed by on the other side of the road and left the man to suffer. Then another

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man came along. He stopped and looked at the poor man lying by the roadside, but he also went on his way.

A third man came along. He was a man from Samaria. The proud Jews looked down upon the Samaritans, and would have nothing to do with them. But this Samaritan got off the ass on which he was riding and went to the wounded man. He was very sorry for him, and he bound up his wounds and put oil on them and gave him a refreshing drink. Then he lifted him on the back of the ass and took him to an inn and took care of him and got food for him.

Next day when the good Samaritan left the man, he gave some money to the innkeeper and told him to take good care of the man, saying that if any more money were needed, he would give it when he came back that way again.

When Jesus finished the story, he asked, "Which of these men do you think was 'neighbor' to him that fell among the thieves?" (What do you think about it?) The man to whom Jesus was talking said, "The one who was kind to the poor man and helped him." And Jesus said to this man, "Go thou and do likewise." Jesus wants each of you to be a "neighbor" to anybody who is in trouble of any kind.

Our Golden Text says, "Bear ye one another's burdens." This is the way to obey the law of Christ. We must not be weary in well doing, for we know that God will reward us if we keep on doing what he tells us to do. This is what Paul wrote long ago in a letter to some friends of his. He wanted them to be kind to one another and to help one another in every time of trouble or sorrow. In this way they would be like Jesus who "went about doing good."

THE LESSON RETOLD

But Jesus' followers were willing to help one another, and many of those who had houses or lands sold them and gave the money to the apostles to be used in helping the poor. If one needed food he was supplied with it. If another needed clothing, he got what he needed.

They were all very happy and worshiped God in the temple and from house to house amongst themselves. Every one thought well of these church people. God blessed them, and day by day more were added to the church.

The apostles went about preaching and the Holy Spirit helped them, and God showed great kindness to them. None of those early followers of Jesus were in want of food or anything else they needed, for those who had money gave for those who had none, and the apostles gave to each what things they required.

After a while the church grew so much that the apostles had not time to spend in giving out food and other things to so many people

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and in looking after the widows and children. They needed all their time for preaching and teaching, so they called a big meeting of all the church people and they talked over the work of the church. The apostles told them that they must choose seven of their very best men and make them deacons, who would have charge of all the work of the church, so that the apostles, who were like our minister, would be able to spend all their time in preaching and praying.

This is just what ought to be done in our own church nowadays. The church people, big and little, should help the minister so that he will have time for his preaching. There is much to be done in visiting the poor and sick and helpless ones, and in getting money to carry on the work of the church. One very great work of the church is in sending missionaries to take Jesus' messages to people in other lands who do not know about him, and to people in our own land who need to be told about him. These people need to have churches where they may worship and work.

Look at our picture. You see all these people are going to church. You little people should all go to church and try in some way to help in the work of the church.

Our Golden Text says, "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: give thanks unto him, and bless his name."

THE LESSON RETOLD

Our story to-day tells us about Jesus teaching his disciples to be brave in speaking about him. The Pharisees were very angry at Jesus because he had been telling them how wrong it is to be proud and trying to appear to be very good when in their hearts they were very bad. These enemies would have killed him if they had dared.

Jesus thought maybe the apostles might be afraid to say they belonged to him for fear his enemies might kill them also. So we see him in our picture with his disciples gathered around him. He is telling them they must not be afraid of anybody but God. They must fear God so much that they will be afraid to do anything that will displease him.

Jesus told the disciples that God takes care of everything he has made, even the little sparrows that are thought of so little value

that five of them were sold for two farthings, which was about half as much as one of our cents, and yet Jesus said that not one of these little sparrows was forgotten by God. Surely God would take care of them, for they are of more value than many sparrows.

Then he said, "Every one who shall confess me before men, him shall the Son of man also confess before the angels of God." This is our Golden Text.

Do you think it is very long and hard to understand? It means that if you tell people you are a follower of Jesus, Jesus has promised to tell the angels of God that you are one of his friends, and they will take special care of all who are brave in speaking about him to others. Those who are not his friends need not expect that Jesus will tell the angels of God to take care of them. Jesus told his

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messengers not to be afraid even if their enemies brought them before the rulers of the synagogue or before the judges. The Holy Spirit would tell them what to say.

After Jesus rose from the grave, he showed himself to his disciples many times during the forty days he stayed on earth. He wanted them to be very sure that he was indeed alive again. He told them many things in those few last days. One day he was having supper with them. He told them that they must stay in Jerusalem after he went up to heaven, and wait till God would send the Holy Spirit to them, as he had promised.

These messengers of Jesus were anxious to know when he was going to come again to reign over the world as king, but he told them that was something that they could not know, for only Gcd himself knew when that time would be. He told them that the Holy Spirit would give them power to speak to people about him and to take his message to all parts of the earth. They were to begin in Jerusalem where they were, and then they were to tell his message to people in the country around about and in the very farthest away places of the earth.

Soon after this, Jesus led his disciples out from Jerusalem to the beautiful Mount of Olives. Suddenly, while he was speaking to them, he was taken up, till a bright cloud hid him from their sight. They stood gazing into the sky, wondering, frightened, not knowing what to do. Two men in white,—they were angel messengers from heaven—came to them and said: "This same Jesus, which is taken from you into heaven, shall come just as you have seen him go."

Jesus wants you to speak about him to those near you and perhaps some day you may be a messenger to people in far parts of the earth.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Our Golden Text says: "Remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, It is more blessed to give than to receive."

We like to give to those who give to us, but Jesus tells us we should give to everybody who is in need. We should do to others as we would like them to do to us. This is the Golden Rule which Jesus has given us. He says: "If you love them that love you what credit is that to you for sinners also love those that love them? If you do good to those that do good to you what credit is that to you's for sinners do that also? If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive,

what credit is that to you for sinners also lend to sinners to receive as much again?"

Jesus' followers should be different. He says, "You should love your enemies and do good and lend, not hoping to receive anything in return and your reward shall be great and you shall be the children of the Highest, for he is kind to the unthankful and to the evil." Jesus says you should not find fault with people, and if you forgive others, you shall be forgiven yourself.

You should give kind deeds, kind words and kind thoughts. Jesus promises if we are "givers" we shall also be "getters," but he

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does not mean that we shall get gifts in return for our gifts. We shall get the love and thanks of those we help,—"good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over," Jesus says. However much we give, that much we'll get back again. Those who give very little will get very little blessing in return. All we have comes from God. When we give for Jesus' work and for his sake, we are only giving back what he has given to us to use for him.

One day Jesus was sitting in the temple while the people were coming in to worship God. He watched them as they dropped their money into the "treasury." As he looked, he saw the rich men casting their money into the treasury and he saw also a certain poor widow putting in two mites. Perhaps you do not know what a "mite" is. It was the very smallest copper coin. It was not as much as one of our cents, and yet Jesus turned to his disciples and pointed to the poor woman and said, "This poor widow has put in more than they all." Our picture shows her putting the two mites into the collection box.

Then Jesus told them why he said that. He said the rich people had given out of their full money bags and would never miss it, but the poor widow had given all she had. Jesus knows if you keep back your money to spend on yourselves and only give a very little to your church or Sunday School and to help those in need. He knows when you give what is hard for you to part with. He knows when you give all you can, and that is the kind of gift that pleases him most.



THE LESSON RETOLD

King Ahab was a wicked king who lived in the land of Israel long before Jesus came to the world. Ahab had a very wicked wife named Jezebel. Now it happened that there was a beautiful vineyard next to the palace of King Ahab. It belonged to a poor man named Naboth. Day after day King Ahab looked out of his window and longed to have that vineyard to make a garden for himself. He went to Naboth and offered to give him another vineyard in place of that one or to pay him for it in money. But Naboth would not sell his vineyard for any amount of money, because it had been given to him by his father

and had been owned by his family for many

King Ahab was very angry when he found he could not buy the vineyard, and what do you think he did? He went into the palace and flung himself down on a couch like a cross, petted child and turned his face to the wall and would not touch any food all day. Queen Jezebel came in and found him lying there. "What is the matter?" she asked. Then Ahab told her all about it. "O never mind," she said, "I'll manage it. I'll get the vineyard for you."

So away she went and sat down in her room

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and wrote letters to the chief men in the city where Naboth lived, and she signed the king's name to the letters. In the letters she told those men that they must take Naboth and bring him before the people and call two witnesses who would say that they had heard Naboth curse God and the king, and for this they must have Naboth taken to a place outside the city and stoned to death. Then she waited to see how her wicked plot would turn out.

The men did exactly as the letters told them to do, and they took Naboth outside the city and stoned him to death. Then they sent word to the wicked Queen Jezebel, saying, "Naboth is dead." She went to the king and said, "Go and take the vineyard for your garden, for Naboth is dead." And King Ahab went out into the vineyard and took possession of it.

Do you think God would let this wicked deed go unpunished? No, indeed, as we shall see.

While King Ahab was walking around in the vineyard thinking what a fine garden he would have, he saw Elijah, the prophet of God, coming toward him. Elijah told him that God knew all about the wicked deed that had been done, and God had sent him to tell King Ahab that he would die in the very same place where Naboth had been stoned to death.

THE LESSON RETOLD

They were like candles that were lighted from a great light. They were to show Jesus to others who had not seen him. When a candle is lighted it is not meant to be covered, but put in a candlestick so that it may give light to all that are in the house. They should be like a city that is built on a hill which cannot be hid.

Jesus said his diciples should live so that people near and far might see their good works and glorify their Father in heaven. Jesus longed to let everybody know that he came to save everybody in the world. What if his messengers should grow careless and forget to give his message to others after he should have gone back to heaven!

One day when Jesus appeared to his disciples after he had risen from the grave, he had supper with them and then said some farewell words to them, and almost the very last words he said were, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to the whole creation." This is our Golden Text. He gave them a promise also, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

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Jesus was taken up into heaven and his Holy Spirit was with his messengers always, and they did let their light shine as they went here and there telling people about Jesus.

The apostle Paul was the first of Jesus' messengers to carry the message to lands across the sea. After the had been preaching in many places, he was not quite sure just where God wanted him to go next. He hoped that God would let him know in some way, so he just waited and at last the message came.

As Paul lay on his bed one night he saw a vision of a man standing begging him, "Come over into Macedonia, and help us." So the man said. Paul jumped up. This was a message from God, he was sure. So he at once got ready to go to Macedonia. Our picture shows us what Paul saw. Paul had just chosen a young man named Timothy to be his helper, so they started away in their little ship and at last arrived at the biggest city in Macedonia, which was called Philippi, and there Paul gave Jesus' message to many who prayed to gods of wood and stone.

If those early messengers of Jesus had not been faithful, we should not have heard these messages, for they wrote his messages, and they are now printed in our Bibles so that everybody may read them. And we in turn must be faithful messengers and send on this Bible message to all parts of the world.

Are you not glad that Jesus' messengers are still letting their light shine in our own land and in far away lands? How can you shine for him?

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus told his disciples many stories to teach them lessons he wanted them to learn. These stories were called parables. This one in to-day's lesson is called the Parable of the Talents.

A certain man went on a journey into a far country. When he was getting ready to go away he called his servants to him and gave all the things he owned into their keeping. He expected his servants to carry on his business just as if he were there, and the best servants would be the ones who made the best use of their master's money. He called his servants to him, and to one he gave five talents of silver and to another he gave two talents. Then he started away on his journey.

The servant that had received five talents went and traded with them and made five talents more, and the servant that had received two talents traded with his also and gained two talents more.

After a long time the master of those servants returned and called his servants to him to find out how they had used what he had given them. In our picture we see him seated amongst his treasures. He looks like a very rich man, doesn't he? The first servant came to the room to give his master an account of how he had used the money he had received. "Master" he said, "you gave me

five talents, and I have gained five talents more." His master was pleased, and said, "Well done, good and faithful servant, you have been faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things: enter into the joy of thy lord."

Then the other servant came in, and said, "Master, you gave me two talents, and I have gained two talents more." 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
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
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
