## Four Fresh Cerman Divisions on Aisne Front Used to Replace Fallen Troops, Which Exceed all Estimates--Progress Made in Chevreux Region

By Courier Leased Wire

Paris, May 11.—Four fresh German divisions have been observed on the Aisne front since May 7, says an official summary of the operations on May 4 to 6. The statement adds:

"This is irrefutable proof of how rapidly these effectives are being used up. German losses in these three days exceeded all estimates."

Bulletin, Paris, May 11.—French troops captured a German position in the region of Chevreux yesterday evening, according to an official statement issued by the war office this morning. Heavy counter-attacks by the Germans were repulsed.

Along the entire front in Macedonia, from Monastir to Lake Doiran, a distance of about 100 miles, the allies have opened a great offensive. On every section of the line General Sarrail's artillery is roaring day and night, but the campaign is in its initial phase and there is little to indicate as yet where the main attempt at an advance

## NEED BE NO FEAR OF STARVATION

Judicious Economy Is All Necessary, Says Premier Lloyd George

THE SECRET SESSION Official Report of Reply to Questions Asked by Churchill

London, May 11 .- Parliamentary circles were greatly interested in today's secret session of the House of Commons, at which many questions uppermost in the public mind were Col. Winston Spencer Churchill, formerly first lord of the admiralty, was the first speaker, as he was the most distinguished member of the Liberal War Committee, which first demanded the secret ses-It is assumed that Col. Churchill raised all the principal sublects under discussion, asking many questions and giving Premier Lloyd George opportunity to reply immedi-

The secret session probably will continue over Friday.

The secret session was begun after the question had been asked, the galleries being cleared. There is a simple rule under which the House may be cleared of strangers. A member of the government rises in his place and utters the formula; "I spy strangers," whereupon officials clear the galleries and seal the doors. Strangers also are asked to leave the lobbies and precincts of the House Members do not take any oath of secrecy, but could be proceeded against under the Defence of the Realm Act should they disclose

.The attendance of members at today's session was very large.

Official Report of Session The official report of the secret session issued last night says that Winston Sepncer Churchill opened the discussion and dealt with the general military situation, with several references to the position in Russia, the development of the struggle on the western front, the strength of the United States and the questions arising out of the submarine attacks.

"The losses of personal and material," the statement continues "was commented on and the general diplomatic situation in the Balkins discussed. Suggestions were made for meeting the submarine danger and further information was asked concerning marine losses and food

"General Henry Page Croft and George James Wardle continued the

"The Premier dealt seriatim and fully with the points Mr. Churchill raised. He commented upon the in--ternal situation in Austria, and the military position of Germany, in respect to her reserves, contrasting it unfavorably with our own. He cited opinions of the British and French military chiefs in satisfaction at the results of the recent combined operations on the western front.

No Danger of Starvation "The Premier then explained how it was proposed to satisfy the War Office demands for further reserves and also gave figures of the British tonnage sunk month by month since last August, and gave an encouragto meet the submarine attacks. He announced the figures of the new tonnage, which could and would be

built during the next twelve months "Upon the food question the Premier nointed out that with judicious economy in consumption and increased productivity in home supplies there need be no alarm as to starvation, and that in 1918 we should be self-supporting. There appeared to him no necessity to restate the allies war aims, which were well known peatedly stated during the last two

"Herbert H. Asquith (the former Premier), who followed Mr. Lloyd leorge, expressed his full agreement with the premier, but depreciated the secrecy of the sitting, in which, he affirmed, hardly anything had been said which could not have been said openly. He concluded by inviting the premier to publish to the country the greater part of his speech.


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

THE SITUATION. Haig's forces still continue to successfully repulse the constant counter-attacks of the enemy, and there has been an advance reported to the East of Bullecourt, where the British have established themselves, a scant two miles from the outskirts of Queant. Around Fresnoy the struggle is still of the fiercest character. The Germans apparently still hold the village, but the Canadian and other troops are holding ten-

aciously to vantage points. The French just now are chiefly

concerned in artillery duels. A new offensive has been recorded in Macedonia, British, Serbian and Russian forces meeting with success. The British attacked on a front of about four miles and carried and held two miles of trenches. Other trenches had to be abandoned under ressure of severe counter attacks.

At the Cerna bend the Russians also took trenches, and the Serbians occupied two points of support, also taking a few prisoners.

Severe aerial fighting is reported on the Western front, and Sir Douglas Haig reports that on Wednesday six German machines were trought down and five others driven down out of control. The British loss was five machines. Perry Robinson, a well known correspondent at the front, describes one battle wherein five British planes engaged twenty-seven German planes and wrecked eight of the latter ..

Col. Repington, the well-known military expert, in a review of matters after well on to three years of fighting, says that he does not consider the end of the war in sight, and no conclusive military reason why it should end soon. He criticises the British authorities for failure to utilize the full manhood resources.

The news from Russia is again of a disquieting nature and opposition to the Provisional Government would seem to be irreconcilable. The spectacle of two warring factions resorting to force may yet be in order.

Pork Cake One cup chopped pork, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup mo-lasses, 4 1-2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda. 1-2 pound raisins and currants, 2 eggs, teaspoon each cinnamon

Bake about an hour, or perhaps a little more, in a moderate oven. This makes two loaves baked in common bread tins. Christmas Fruit Cake

Five pounds raisins, 3 pounds urrants, 1 pound citren, 1 pound figs, 1 pound butter, 1 pound flour. 1 1-4 pounds granulated sugar, 1 eggs, 1 tablespoon ground mace, 1

Wash all salt from butter and cream with the flour. Beat whites of sugar together very light; to this **CANADIAN** add first a spoonful of the creamed butter and flour, next a spoonful of whites of eggs, alternating. Beat until well mixed. Now add the fruit which has been cut up and well mixed with flour until it will not stick together. Last of all stir in the brandy and mace. The longer this cake is kept the better it gets up and kept in a closed tin box.







### THE CRISIS

France, England and Italy in peace times did not depend upon America, but on Russia, Roumania and Bulgaria for most of their breadstuffs. With these sources closed, the crisis of the hour demands that we see that our soldiers and the Motherland

Everyone in Great Britain has been put on limited rations! Meat is prohibited one day a week, and the making of cakes and pastry has been stopped. Further restrictions are antici-

Bread has gone to 28c per four-pound loaf in England, for the first time since the Crimean War.

Lord Devonport, British Food Comptroller, proposes taking authority to search the houses of Great Britain to prevent food

Forty million men, less the casualties, are now on active ser-Twenty million men and women are supporting them by

service in other war activities.

In the last analysis the land is bearing this burden.

One million tons of food-carrying ships have been torpedoed since February 1st, 1917. Germany's hope for victory is in the starvation of Britain

through the submarine. Canada's sons will have died in vain if hunger compels the

Motherland's surrender. The land is waiting—the plough is ready—will we make

the plough mightier than the sword?

Will we help the acres to save the flag?

### World-Hunger Stares Us in the Face

David Lubin, representative of the United States to the International Institute of Agriculture-maintained by forty Governments-reports officially to Washington that the food grains of the world on March 31st, 1917, showed a shortage of 150,000,000 bushels below the amount necessary to feed the world until August, 1917. He declares it is beyond question that unless a greater acreage is put to crop in 1917 there will be WORLD-HUNGER before the 1918 crop is harvested.

The failure of the grain crop, in the Argentine Republic which is ordinarily a great grain-exporting nation, resulted in an embargo being placed, in March, 1917, upon the export of grains from that country to avert local famine.

The United States Department of Agriculture, in its official report, announces the condition of the fall wheat crop (which is two-thirds of their total wheat crop), on April 1st, 1917, to be the poorest ever recorded, and predicts a yield of 244,000,000 bushels below the crop of 1915. The 1916 crop was poor. Even with favorable weather, the wheat crop of the United States is ikely to be the smallest in thirty-five years, not more than 64% of the normal crop.

Under date of April 10th, Ogden Armour, executive head of Armour & Company, one of the world's largest dealers in food products, stated that unless the United States wishes to walk deliberately into a catastrophe, the best brains of the country, under Government supervision, must immediately devise means of increasing and conserving food supplies. Armour urged the cultivation of every available acre. The food shortage, he said, is world-wide. European production is cut in half, the Argentine Republic has suffered droughts. Canada and the United States must wake up!



Hunger Tightening His Grip

People are starving to-day in Belgium, in Serbia, in Poland, in Armenia, in many quarters of the globe.

Famine conditions are becoming more widespread every day. On these alarming food conditions becoming known, President Wilson immediately appointed a Food Comptroller for the United States. He selected Herbert C. Hoover, to whom the world is indebted, as Chairman of the International Belgium Relief Commission, for his personal direction of the distribution of food among the starving Belgians.

Mr. Hoover is already urging sacrifice and food restrictions, for, as he states, "The war will probably last another year, and we shall have all we can do to supply the necessary food to carry our Allies through with their full fighting stamina.

### Food Production is the Greatest Problem the World Faces To-day

Owing to destruction by submarines, ocean ships are scarce. It is much easier to protect shipping between Canada and England than on the longer voyages from India or Australia.

One vessel can make twice as many trips from Canada to Britain as from India, and four times as many as from Australia. Therefore, every ton of food stuffs grown in Canada is worth to the Motherland two tons grown in India or four tons grown in

### Why the Call to Canada is So Urgent

If this country does not raise a big crop this year, not only will the people of Canada suffer, but the Motherand and her Allies will suffer, and their military power will be weakened if . not paralyzed. Therefore, the right solution of the present war problem comes back to the farm, as to a foundation upon which our whole national and international structure must be built and

The farmers know that they are the last reserve, and that the soil on which crops are grown is the strategic ground on which wars are decided. To their care is entrusted the base of

To enable the farm to do the work two factors are essential. The first is Time. Whatever we are to do must be done at once. Nature waits for no man. The second is Labor. Many farmers cannot plant the acres they would because they cannot get the necessary help. Many are afraid to increase their acreage because they fear they would not be able to cultivate and harvest an unusual crop after they had raised it. If they are to do the work that is essential for them to do, the last man in each city, town and village must be mobilized at

Every man not on Active Service can help. In every city, town and vilage are men who, by their training on the farm, or by their present occupation, can readily adapt themselves to farm work. These can render no greater service to the Empire at the present time than by answering the call of the farm. Capable men and boys willing to learn should not allow their lack of farm experience to stand in the way.

Can the employer render a more signal service in this crisis than by encouraging these men to help the farmer to cultivate every available acre, and by making it easy for them to go?

Ontario's farm lands are waiting—the implements are ready —the equipment is complete—the farmer is willing—all he needs

So short is the world's food supply that without increased production many in Canada must go hungry, and even with enormously increased production we cannot expect cheap food. The world is waiting for our harvest.

If peace should be declared within a year, the food conditions will be no better, for the accumulated hunger of the Central Empires must be met. This will absorb a large part of the world's

We do not know when this war shall cease. It is endless—its lengthening out has paralyzed the thought and conception of all men who thought about it and its possible time of conclusion. Three months—six months, we said; nine months, a year, we said; and yet two years and eight months have passed their long, dreary and sanguinary length, and there is no man who can tell how long this gigantic struggle may yet last.

Lloyd George, in a letter addressed to farmers throughout the

Empire, said:

"The line which the British Empire holds against "the Germans is held by those who WORK ON THE "LAND as well as by those who fight on land and sea. If "it breaks at any point it breaks everywhere. In the face "of the enemy the seamen of our Royal naval and mer-"cantile marine and the soldiers gathered from every part "of our Empire hold our line firstly. You workers on land "must hold your part of our line as strongly. Every full "day's labor you do helps to shorten the struggle and "brings us nearer victory. Every idle day, all loitering, "lengthens the struggle and makes defeat more possible. "Therefore, in the nation's honor, heed! Acquit your-"selves like men, and as workers on land do your duty "with all your strength!"

So, for the honor of Canada's soldiers in France—and for the glory of our New-born Nationhood—let it be said of Ontario's citizens that, in the hour of our greatest need, their response was worthy of their sons.

We owe a great debt to those who are fighting for us.
