TO SYDNEY AND RETURN

On Tuesday Aug. 19th, a party of twelve left Kentville en route to Sydney. Ten were delegates to the Maritime Board of Trade and two of these were accompanied by their wives. At Wolfville we were joined by an able contingent of five in number, men who were well able to maintain the dignity of that ambitious town. We had members of various professions, different branches of business, representative farmers etc.

We carried with us from Kentville one of our worthy physicians, so that if our stomachs got out of order in our endeavor to take in too much of the beauty, bustle etc., of a new town like Sydney, we could be properly cared for. The Wolfville contingent was similarly provided.

At Windsor the party divided and five of us took the short trip over the Midland Ry. We enjoyed this ride very much, as it was the first time for most of us. Manager H. V. Harris was on board and furnished us with the information we required about the different sections through which we passed. The road bed is very smooth and the line follows the St. Croix, Kennetcook, Five Mile and other rivers and branches all the way to Truro. Numerous were the mills along the way and the railway has opened up an easy way for marketing a great quantity of lumber. The soil along the way looked fertile and with railway facilities for marketing products the whole district we believe, will advance rapidly. We cast admiring glances at the big bridge constructed on this line. It is said to be one of the best constructed.

At Truro we lunched and found the rest of our party there who went via Windsor Junction. We had our "observation" car placed in the rear of the Sydney flyer and from it we all had an excellent opportunity of witnessing the beautiful changes in scenery as we passed along. At New Glasgow Mrs. J. H. Goucher came to the train to see us. Antigonish was passed and we backed down the slope to Mulgrave before sunset and after a while our whole train of seven long cars was placed on the ferry and soon landed in Point Tupper on the opposite side of the strait. This boat is a large one and can carry twenty-one cars at once.

The evening was an ideal one. The moon was shining with unusual brightness, as we passed along through that never-to-be-forgotten spot, Grand Narrows. There was not a harsh sound upon the earth, or in the air, as we looked out over the water, except the rattle of our train. Overhead was bending the deep blue sky, dewy and soft, and radiant with unnumerable stars, like the inverted bill of some blue flower, sprinkled with golden dust and breathing fragrance. Selah! (We don't know what the last word means, but it makes a good ending to our sentence.)

Sydney was reached at 10.45 p. m., and then was the grand rush to the Sydney Hotel to obtain accommodations. Such a mass of living beings from the Maritime Provinces was more than the best hotel could arrange for in a short time. Four of our Kentville delegates were sent out in a carriage to a private residence nearly a mile away, and thereafter were obliged to walk to the hotel for each meal. We believe they got even with the proprietor, for their extra walk gave them a double appetite. Some of the Wolfville delegates to whom money was no temptation—having sufficient of their own—were given rooms in the Bank over the vaults of gold.

However we all found accommodations and our Kentville and Wolfville delegates were prominent in the business of the Maritime Board

Put cream, butter and sugar together, then add milk, acids, flour, baking powder; whites of eggs, beaten stiff, to be added last. A. C. J.

SOFT GINGER BREAD. One and a half cups molasses, one egg, one lump of butter size of egg, teaspoonful each of ginger and salt, three cups of sifted flour, mix well together. Add one teaspoonful of soda, dissolved in cup of boiling water. E. D. T.

OUR APPLE PROSPECTS,
Mr. Fred Pritchard, of Fred Pritchard & Co., of Liverpool, is in Kentville, and has during the last week been visiting various sections of the valley, looking at the apple crop. He has visited many fruit districts in different countries, and with his reports received from various places, he is in a position to give reliable information concerning fruit. We give below some notes which he has furnished us at our request.
Aug. 27th, 1902.
The crop of apples in Nova Scotia although very small in quantity, compares very favorably with that of Ontario, inasmuch as a much larger percentage of No. 1 Fruit is evident in this province than in Upper Canada. As I have already advised, I do not consider Ontario has 15 per cent. No. 1 Fruit in accordance with the requirements of the Act, whereas here the quality in the heavily loaded sections which make up the crop is fairly good and in my opinion will make up 50 p. c. of good fruit in the Valley as a whole.
I am of the opinion that the large quantity of spotted fruit in Ontario will have a very short life as it will certainly not pay to export. With this spotted fruit out of the way, there will be very few apples for the winter months, and I recommend the holding of no. 1 winter stock for disposal in the English markets from Christmas on.
It is certain that for some time during the Fall months spotted fruit will be shipped and it is impossible to sell good stock for its true value in competition with it, hence, my suggestion to hold it over.
