

It was probably designed to enrage the feet of the first unwary worshipper that left the church, but the trap was sprung by a young man, who intended reaching the church in time to pay for, who put them to bed about nine o'clock, and then looked up the house, and retired to spend the night at the bedside of a sick neighbor.

At five o'clock flames were seen issuing from a few minutes the entire house was in ashes. Both children perished, though Mrs. Eager made a heroic effort to rescue them.

THE FINANCIAL WORLD. The Bank of Hamilton has purchased property for an office in Windsor.

THANKSGIVING DAY. November 25 will be observed as Thanksgiving Day in the United States and in Canada.

COLLECTIVE FOREIGN. It is currently reported that Prince Hohenzollern, the German Chancellor, has resigned.

PURELY PERSONAL. Mr. Paul Duns, son of the late Chas. A. Duns, has been appointed editor of The New York Sun.

THE AGRICULTURAL WORLD. A further examination has revealed the fact that out of a herd of 52 cattle are infected with tuberculosis.

THE LABOR WORLD. FOR MEN OF WAR. The British forces in India have captured Simonsa Pasa.

ONFARIO ELECTION CANDIDATES. Mr. D. C. McEneaney is the Liberal candidate for the Legislative Assembly in Glengarry.

Mr. J. D. Morgan was nominated for the Legislative Assembly by the Liberals of South Grey.

Mr. C. A. Brower, M.L.A., is the Conservative nominee for the Legislative Assembly in East Elgin.

West Middlesex Conservatives have nominated Mr. G. B. Campbell of Appin to oppose Hon. Geo. W. Ross.

At a meeting of the Liberal-Conservatives of East Elgin at Alymer, Mr. A. Brower, the present member, was nominated as the candidate of the party at the coming Provincial elections.

RAILROADS AND RAILROADS. It is expected that the Ottawa and New York Railway will be open for traffic on Dec. 1.

The Thompson, Erie & Pacific R.R. is constructing a connection at Tilburg with the M.C. & N.W. and will build a \$2,000,000 steel bridge across Otter Creek.

Mr. Chasney M. Dwyer, one of the presidents of the New York Central Railway, is decidedly of opinion that the wreck at Garrison was caused by the rate placed upon the track with criminal intent.

The St. Thomas City Council has decided to submit a bill to the ratepayers on Nov. 20 to guarantee the amount of \$30,000 and pay the first year's interest in consideration of the railway being electrified.

TRADE AND COMMERCE. A crusade against departmental stores has commenced in Chicago.

It is announced that an agreement has been entered into between the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada for a regular monthly service between Hamilton and Portland.

In different quarters the unusually mild weather has acted as a deterrent to the ordinary progress of trade, and the demand for certain lines of seasonal goods has been checked. There is no decided increase in any direction. The demand for woolen goods continues good, as it is expected the cost of manufacture will increase.

The fair demand for woolen goods at steady prices, but cotton goods are weak and stocks heavy. The commercial rates in the United States for the week just ended are 2 1/2 per cent. and the corresponding week a year ago.

CASE REPORTS. Alfred Zavis, a Gatesboro farmer, killed himself while temporarily insane.

Two Grand Trunk freight trains collided at Stony Creek and a number of cars were smashed.

Wm. White, a sixteen-year-old Oakville boy, lost his life by being dragged into a grain chute at Mr. Wales' warehouse.

Mrs. Georgia Wilson of Pinedon died at Winnipeg from the effects of an overdose of morphine tablets taken for illness.

Bert Ledham, aged 16, son of the foreman of the Withrow, died in the machinery, and instantly killed.

George Lightfoot, aged 13, son of a Toronto doctor, was shot and killed in the accidental discharge of a revolver in the hands of his chum, a student of P.O.F. Clark.

Hector St. Pierre, the motorman on one of the cars, was killed, and Motorman Leprohon was injured by a collision with the Montreal, St. Line Electric Railway.

John Patterson, 11 years of age, was struck by a savage sow on the farm of Mr. William Cameron, Herwick, and died while being taken to the hospital at Chatham.

Big Tannery Burned. Bradford, Pa., Nov. 1.—A special from Bradford, Pa., says that the large tannery of John J. Curtis, together with a large quantity of bark, has been totally destroyed by fire. The loss will not be less than \$150,000.

It is stated that the Dominion Government proposes next session to introduce legislation to increase the number of two-thirds to four-fifths of their salary. Hon. H. R. Emmerson is Premier of New Brunswick, a reconstruction of the Local Government having been effected.

The Hon. Mr. Mackenzie Bowden, James Mitchell resigned the Premiership. The Hon. Mr. Mackenzie Bowden, Premier of Ontario, has decided to ask the Legislature to radically change the present electioneering laws, and all the municipal parties throughout Ontario will be asked to join in this action.

Sir Whittell Laurier assured a deputation from Montreal that if direct communication were established between Canada and France, in compliance with the terms proposed, the subsidy of fifty thousand dollars a year will be granted.
