Our Water Service.

For a few weeks back those who are immediately interested in matters pertaining to our water service have been uneasy. Although the season has been a dry one and the amount of water used has increased greatly year by year, this did not appear sufficient reason for the apparent shortage in the water supply. For a fortnight the town had been drawing from the lower reservoir, and such was the water in that was going down. Several theories were presented to explain the decrease, and fear was beginning to be felt that after all our service was not adequate to the demand upon it. At this juncture Mr D. R. Munro, the former superintendent of the service, undertook to locate the trouble; and after some time spent finally discovered a large leak in the main on the top of Church Hill. The opening in the pipe was a large one, estimated by Mr Munro to be capable of venting 75,000 gallons of water per day. For about a week the amount of water used was not used by the town. The rocky nature of the soil at the place of the break allowed this immense amount of water to escape without being detected, and the soil two feet above the pipe is said to have been perfectly dry. Mr Munro was led to look for the leak at this place from noticing the increased amount of water at "Barns' Spring" which he knew to drain from that direction. The leak has now been repaired, and our service is again safe. It will probably take a month to fill the reservoir again, but from now on the supply is assured. It is very fortunate that the leak was discovered when it was, and to Mr Munro is due the thanks of all. A great load of anxiety has been lifted from the shoulders of the water committee, and the town people generally feel greatly relieved to know that the water service is ample for every need. The leak has probably existed for a long time, and the fact that the source of our supply has been able to withstand the large drain upon it proves its efficiency. Wolfville people can feel safe in boasting of one of the best water supplies in the province, the value of which will be seen more and more as the years go by.

The Chinese War Cloud.

China and Japan are likely to come to blows over their rival interests in Corea. England will permit them to do so. Nations should not logically go to war on account of old scores, but such things invariably breed regular crops of mischief. This particular Chinese-Japanese affair seems to be more than twelve centuries in dispute, and contains an extraordinary accumulation of trouble. England, to put it mildly, has, therefore, undertaken no small task in arranging or undertaking to arrange, the long-standing hostilities for good and all at this late date. The case is vaguely suggestive of the two disputants for the possession of the oyster, who handed it over to the practical lawyer for disposal according to his sound judgement. Since the middle of the seventh century Corea has been unwilling to accept the rule of either of the two quarrelsome rivals. A great battle was fought about 600 A. D. when 400 Japanese junk were destroyed. In 1861 the Coreans went to war with the Chinese and wiped out their army. Three centuries later the Japanese, relying on their superior naval strength essayed to fight the Chinese and Coreans together, and it was a drawn battle, each power retaining its hold upon what it had grasped during the campaign. The chances against war at this stage rest with the European powers, who naturally will not like to see their commerce in the East convulsed by the reopening of this old feud. England is especially concerned, and as a reward for her mediation she should exact such a smart price that both the disputants would prefer to let go their holds than settle the account of the third party. In this way Anglo-Saxon influence would bear good fruit for all concerned.

Acquiring New Territory.

Within the past two weeks considerable activity has been apparent among the directors of The Valley Telephone Company, and as a result of the recent deliberations of the Board a valuable acquisition to its already large territory has been effected by the purchase from F. W. Forsythe, Esq., of a line running from Port Williams station on the V. & A. Railway to the town bearing that name, thence to Stars Point, with one branch to Belcher street and another to Canada a circuit of about fourteen miles, and having at the present time some twenty odd instruments scattered along its route. Another very important move on the part of the company is the extension of their lines as far westward as the town of Digby, with toll offices at Moose and Bear River, Smith's Cove, and other sections of the country through which it will pass. That this will be at once constructed is now a foregone conclusion, as Manager Morrison, acting on the instruction of the directors, visited the above-named places during the latter part of the past week, and met with such encouragement as to lead him to believe that the Digby circuit will be as large, if not larger, than any now in operation on the line. We stated some weeks ago that, judging from the outlook at that date the instruments in use on the circuit would number three hundred before the end of the year, and it now looks as if our predictions would be more than realized.

The Masonic Grand Lodge.

By request of St. George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., we publish the following report of their proxy, Mr A. M. Hoare, at the recent meeting of the Grand Lodge at New Glasgow:

To The Worshipful Master and Brethren, St. George's Lodge No. 20, R. N. S., Wolfville, N. S.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHERS,—Your proxy to Grand Lodge at its late session begs leave to report as follows:—

On Tuesday, June 12th, at 5 o'clock P. M., your proxy started for New Glasgow to attend Grand Lodge. The journey up was as pleasant as could be expected considering that the major portion of it was after dark. Our stop at Truro was one long to be remembered for there we dined and our good Brother Rockwell of Kentville Lodge, who sat next me at table, showed that his appetite had not been injured by his early rising to catch the morning train from Kentville. Under his example we all did justice to the good things before us, and we arose with our appetites completely gone and a satisfied feeling within us which nothing could disturb.

We arrived at New Glasgow about 7 P. M., tired but cheerful, and after locating at our respective hotels, started to hunt up those who had come before me. This occupied our time till after midnight, when we retired to rest.

The session of Grand Lodge opened at 10 sharp next morning, and shortly after, we went to church in full regalia. The procession was said to be one of the largest and best ever taken part in by Grand Lodge. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr Carruthers of New Glasgow, and was a telling and effective and notable short discourse from the text "In understanding be men." I am not just clear about the wording of the text, but that was the idea any way. It was a very thoughtful and clear sermon and evoked great commendation from those who had the pleasure of hearing it.

On our return to the Lodge room, a very little routine business was got through and then we adjourned for dinner. After dinner, at the invitation of Albion Lodge, we all went on board the steamer which plies between New Glasgow and Pictou, and after a delightful sail down the river, we landed at Pictou and spent a couple of hours inspecting that town.

In the evening we again met in Grand Lodge, and the business was proceeded with.

I shall not attempt to give you the debate in detail for even were it possible you would find much of it uninteresting. I will content myself therefore with a brief synopsis. I may say that I was able to carry out your instructions, as embodied in your resolutions forwarded to me "win-my-argument" so the text. But right here let me say that, I am entirely opposed to the principle of giving proxies arbitrary instructions. Cases frequently occur where the proxy goes to the Grand Lodge meeting firmly convinced that things are in a certain condition and either in the course of the debate or from private sources of information, finds that he and his Lodge were laboring under an utter misconception, either of the facts or of the details affecting the case. By giving your proxy fixed instructions he is prevented from exercising his judgment or correcting any erroneous idea he may have had. I may say further that so firm am I in this opinion that had I not been personally entirely of one mind with the Lodge and that there was little or no probability of my changing my opinions I should have felt bound to decline the honor of being its proxy.

The resolution to raise the per capita was a very ill advised one and I think was put forward without careful consideration. The discussion on the affirmative side was weak, and ended in an attempt to withdraw, this was opposed, and the motion went to vote, where it was practically unanimously defeated.

The resolution re Past Masters of other jurisdictions was withdrawn with the statement that it had inadvertently appeared on the Agenda paper.

The charity due resolution was the subject of a good deal of debate and was referred to a committee for consideration and amendment. I have not the exact text of the resolution as it passed, but it was to the effect that each Lodge be requested to send every year with its dues to Grand Lodge, a voluntary contribution in such amounts as its members individually feel disposed to give for the purpose of increasing the charity fund and decreasing the debt on Masonic Temple, the capital to be devoted to the latter and the interest on the amount to the former purpose.

On Bro. McLeod's (of Westville) motion to change the reading of Chap. 22, Sec. 28 was on a point raised by the proxy for your Lodge ruled by the M. W. G. M. to be not necessary as the present law gives just what was called for in the motion. It was decided by the M. W. Grand Master, that members of subordinate Lodges who were Past Masters in their own right having earned the honor and who were afterwards excused from paying the Lodge dues, were not honorary members within the meaning of this Section and could not be delinquent from a seat and vote in Grand Lodge. "Honorary members" as alluded to in this Section, means members of other Lodges or jurisdictions, who have never passed the Chair in a Lodge in this jurisdiction.

The case of Bro. Slaughter of Moncton was cited, but it was held that he had never been in the Chair of a Lodge in this jurisdiction.
