Organ Recital Enjoyed.

MR. ALEX. ZEMER GIVES MASTERLY PERFORMANCE ON NEW INSTRUMENT. In a season in which there have already been many fine musical offerings the organ recital at St. Paul's church last evening by Alex. Zemer, the New York organist, must be given a prominent place.

The audience was large, representative and appreciative. The program was well chosen and finely interpreted, making an appeal to the musician and layman alike, for in the hands of such an artist the organ becomes an educator and reveals the power and beauty of compositions which many amateurs fail to discover, and which cannot present to their hearers.

Art standards have become so high that nowadays those who would become eminent in music must bring to bear in their interpretations a scholarly intelligence and cultivated mind, without which a permanent success is impossible.

The program included a number of old German chorales, two seldom heard, and Mr. Zemer interpreted them in the traditional style of the Lutheran Church, strictly legato with long holds or pauses at the end of each line, and modulated to suit the text. This was particularly true of the chorale in the Mendelssohn Sonata, wherein some magnificent effects were produced.

Other heavy numbers on the program were the Overture to 'Carnaval' and 'Lohengrin,' their rendition producing startling orchestral effects, the noble instrument responding to the finished touch of the master.

There were many numbers cast in a similar mould, notably the 'Spring Song' of Mendelssohn, with interestingly and artistically arranged 'Ave Maria' by one of the old French Kings, in which the solo part was brought into prominence, and then the 'British Chorus' from 'Lohengrin,' reviving memories of the numerous events of the war and the many happy moments in the life of the young generation present. Also the 'Pavane' of Chopin with its majestic air, and the 'Close of the Pomp and Circumstances.'

St. Paul's congregation is to be congratulated on the possession of such a fine instrument and to be thanked for providing such a pleasant evening to so many people.

The above which we copy from a recent issue of the News and Courier, at Charlottetown, N. C., will be of interest to many of our readers. Mr. Zemer made many friends during his sojourn in Wolfville who will be glad to know of his doings.

Privileges vs. Principles.

Not being a citizen of your town I am not directly interested in the matter under discussion in Dr. Cullen's letters. But I am concerned with the general question of exemptions, taxation and exemptions therefrom and wish to make some suggestions on the subject.

Dr. Cullen has not appealed to the law in the case but has based his arguments on the propriety of exemption considered as an industry and entitled, as such, to the privileges so frequently accorded to strictly mechanical industries.

If we accept the principle of exemptions for beneficial industries we may well admit that the President of Acadia has made out a good case for his institution as an educational plant; but as I understand the case in conversation with Wolfville citizens, the point not yet considered by Dr. Cullen is that the plant on 'the Hill' is not wholly an educational one; and as it grows in wealth or endowment it threatens to abuse those privileges granted by legislators who did not foresee that a poor struggling institution might some day become strong enough to abuse its powers.

I am informed that our Nova Scotia law, as affecting the churches exempt from taxation only the property actually used for religious purposes; but in the case of educational institutions all property owned by them is exempt.

As I listen to some of your citizens whose remarks are hardly printable and hence not widely circulated, I wonder that they would like to know to what extent the College has availed itself of its privileges in the past, and in view of its recent purchases of Wolfville real estate, how much it is going to ask for in the future.

Some fall to see why a town farm should be heavily taxed and the farm on the 'Hill' exempt. Why a hotel, boarding house, property to let, or a public hall in the town should pay for all benefits received while similar parts of an educational plant, receiving equal benefits and giving as high returns financially, should be exempt from the obligations to pay their share. I am well aware that there is not so far as there has any right to be in not to grant exemptions from taxation and that practically all large and privileged industries receive these benefits at the direct expense of their smaller competitors. These educational institutions engaged in other businesses are really no worse than their commercial counterparts.

The rule for exemptions would seem to be—if you can exert influence enough to get it, you do, if you don't. So I hold that all exemptions are morally wrong. As in the case of a neighboring town cited by Dr. Cullen, those who try to live by the exemption shall die by the same device if perhaps another place bids higher.

As a result of our wide spread system of free this and free that, industries are not established where they ought to be but where the highest bidder lives. Exemptions of all kinds, on church, college or factory, are at bottom nothing more than legalized graft and as such are the real progenitors, aiders and abettors of illegal grafting, the remarkable extent of which among our unprivileged classes has so lately been uncovered to the horrified public.

Take any respectable business man and point out to him that his competitor has legal privileges which he does not enjoy, remind him that while the opera house which he attends is both taxed and licensed, the church to which he and the majority of his fellow probably do not belong, in property to such an extent in many parts of our country that it has become a public scandal. Show him that the scheme of state education which he has a right to believe is indefinitely delayed because the field is already full of small institutions, each tax free, dispensing education, Catholic, Baptist or Methodist as the case may be. Explain to one friend all the illegal variations in the system of assessment as practiced in this Christian country in the year of our Lord 1913, and if that formerly respectable business man does not himself become a conscientious objector at the first opportunity, then I say he is not fully qualified as a town councillor and as such is morally entitled to all exemptions in sight.

The right way for our privileged classes to attack graft among the unprivileged classes is to renounce their legal rights before they renounce their legal claims.

Not being insensible to the great benefits bestowed on Wolfville and vicinity by the presence of Acadia College (and vice versa) do not wish to appear ungrateful by advocating new burdens for an already overburdened and struggling (like the rest of us) institution. I simply wish to clear the ground of all those corrupting privileges, legal and illegal, and would therefore that relief be offered to all honest citizens alike in the shape of the 'Single Tax' now being rapidly adopted all over Western Canada and five political questions as far east as Ontario.

With all taxes on the last—none on improvements or personal property, no good though poor citizens, church, factory or educational institutions would be asked to bear burdensome taxes. The operator alone would be hit and hard hit so he deserves, though I do say it myself, being in some small degree a non-willing member of that detestable fraternity.
