FLOGGED. Sheady Leader and Turnbull Receive the Cat o' Nine Tails.

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—At the Central prison this morning Patrick Sheedy, William Turnbull and William Leader received the first instalment of ten lashes of the thirty lashes to which County Judge Drew sentenced them to receive, at Guelph, on the 3rd instant, in addition to undergoing a term of imprisonment of one year and 360 days for committing an indecent assault on Elizabeth The flogging took place in the upper corridor of the north wing. Turnbull was the first of the trio brought to the triangle. A sturdy guard dealt the convict the punishment with determination and will. Turnbull howled incessantly until the guards released him from the triangle. Leader then emerged from his cell. He walked up to the triangle with a dogged look of determination on his face. He had resolved to brave it out, and never evinced any distress after the first blow, which forced a suppressed moan from him. After the flogging he quickly donned his shirt and walked off to the tailor shop. Sheedy was the last to face the music! He wiggled and twisted as the though spread on his back, and as each blow fell he howled louder until finally he was bellowing with great energy. 




