WORKMEN AT CHURCH. An Interesting Talk to the Two Guelph Lodges. VARIOUS OTHER SOCIETY NOTES. Ancient Order of United Workmen. Members of Royal and Guelph lodges met on Sunday evening at the Oddfellows' Lodge, 115 York Street, where the sermon was preached by the Rev. G. R. Turk. There were about 300 in attendance. Bro. DEATH AT TORONTO. The Hon. Alexander Morris called Home. (Special to THE HERALD.) Toronto, Oct. 27. L. Q. G. died today, aged 64 years. Hon. Alex. Morris was the eldest son of the late Hon. John Morris, who was a member of the Legislative Assembly and Council of Upper Canada and of the Legislative Council of Canada continuously from the year 1820 until 1863, a period of 39 years. Alexander Morris was born in Perth, on the 17th March, 1825. He was educated at the University of Glasgow, Scotland, and McGill, Montreal. He was married in November, 1851, to Margaret, daughter of Mr. Wm. Clive, of Cornwall. He was called to the bar of Upper Canada in Hilary Term, 1851, and afterwards in July of the same year to Lower Canada Bar. In October, 1852, he was called to the Manitoba Bar. He was appointed a Queen's Counsel by the Ontario Government on the 13th March, 1876, and by the Dominion Government on the 19th August, 1881. In 1884 he was one of the active parties in the negotiation which resulted in the Coalition of that year, and was appointed to the office of Minister of Inland Revenue until the 2nd of July, 1872, when he was appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench of Manitoba, and the first chief justice and judge of that court. He was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba and the North-west Territories on the 1st of December of the same year, and held the former position until 1877. He was also appointed a Commissioner of Indian Affairs in Hilary Term, 1881, and took part as Commissioner in the negotiating treaties with the Sault Ste. Marie and Lake Umbagog, at the north-west angle of the Lake of the Woods, and at the Lakes of Qu'Appelle, in the years 1874 and 1874, whereby the title to a large area in the North-west Territories was acquired by the Crown. He also acted as commissioner for treaties with the Indians of the Lake Winnipeg region in 1875, and with the Plain Cross, Fort Carleton and Pitt in the year 1876. In 1876 he acted in securing a revision of the terms of treaties Nos. 1 and 2. He acted for East Toronto in the Legislative Assembly from December, 1878, to March, 1884. He was a staunch Conservative, and a faithful supporter of the Right Hon. Sir John McMillan.

VOTERS' LISTS.

Some time ago we pointed out that the London Advertiser had become unnecessarily alarmed over the revision of the Dominion voters' lists in that city. Our remarks in full were:

"The London Advertiser became hysterical last week over the Dominion voters' list for that city, and proclaimed in a column of double-length columns that the poor Brits were being abominably treated. These prominent Liberals were said to be disgraced in the manner in which the lists were prepared."

"The London Free Press lost no time in investigating the charges made by its local contemporary, and points out that the 'outrage,' which was said to have been committed, only existed in the biased mind of the editor of the Advertiser. The names were properly entered on the list. Such is a sample of the malicious accusations from time to time disseminated by the Reform press."

"The Advertiser endeavored to show that both the Free Press and the Herald were mistaken in the position that they assumed, but made a very poor job of the undertaking. The Mercury, takes a hand in the controversy, and shouts about an 'imaginary' 'outrage' which the Advertiser is alleged to have discovered. The Free Press is charged with 'retiring from the defence of the untenable position it had assumed,' and the Herald is said by our contemporary to know nothing about the matter. The Mercury and the Advertiser, of course, know all about it!"

"So far as we are concerned, there is ample justification for our position. When we penned the extract which is so offensive to our contemporaries, and which is published at the outset of this article, we believed the Advertiser had gone into hysterics over an imaginary wrong, and we yet believe such to be the case. The Free Press receding from its first position, such is a malicious falsehood, and could only be uttered by one who is totally ignorant of the true state of affairs, or by one who is desirous of economizing the truth. The Free Press pointed out at last late as Friday last that there was no attempt being made to disfranchise Liberals who were duly qualified, and that the three men which were alleged to have been marked for denunciation were properly entered upon the Advertiser raised its cry of indignation. Here are the words used by the Free Press:

"We stated that the names in question were regularly and properly on the list at the time the article was written, and so far from any attempt having been made to exclude them, that special care had been taken to have them set right. 'Oh, but,' screams the shrieking brother, 'although their names have been on the main list all right enough, they also were put on a separate list of those not qualified,' and were therefore marked down for disfranchisement. Now, it is easy to show how these or any other names may have got on this special list without any purpose whatever looking to their exclusion, but hard to give those excited press writers the ability to comprehend the full nature of the case. Let us say for instance, that an elector, having property in two city divisions, has previously qualified as a voter in one of them, but within the past year disposed of his business interest in that property to another. He goes down on the preliminary Voters' List for 1889 as before, the voters' list being a fair transcription, so far as possible, of the old assessment roll. But it occurs to the Revising Officer, that the voter may wish to qualify in his other property, that in which he carries on his own active business, and he writes to that gentleman inquiring as to his electoral position, desiring instructions thereon. And the voter replies to the Revising Officer, and a good understanding is arrived at. This we understand, is what actually took place in the case of Mr. Hyman. And his and the other names quoted by the Advertiser were in this manner properly and regularly entered, before that journal made its outcry. Any change made in these cases was not due to the fiery sent out by the press warrior, but as a part of the previous candid procedure of the Revising Officer. And the same can be said of each one on the reserve list."

"Will the Mercury now show itself to possess sufficient honor to admit that it was in error when it stated that the London Free Press had abandoned the position which it at first assumed and which this journal supported?"

THEY MUST DO THEIR DUTY.

CHOICE OF THE CONVENTION

East Huron Conservatives Select A Standard Bearer

FOR THE LOCAL HOUSE

Mr. A. Mosgrove Secures the Nomination

GUELPH, Oct. 26.—The Liberal Conservatives of East Huron met in the afternoon of the 26th inst. at the meeting of the convention to-day. The President opened the convention with a stirring and practical speech, pointing forcibly to the duty of the electors and fully setting forth the purpose of the meeting, viz, the selection of a candidate to contest the coming election for the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. The following gentlemen were proposed: Armstrong, Mosgrove, Whitechurch; James Perkins, Gorrin; B. Garry, of Brantford; E. Hays, of McKillop; H. W. C. Meyer, of Wingham.

After expressing themselves fluently on the political issues before the public, resolutions were tendered, and the field to Mr. Mosgrove, who accepted the nomination amid loud applause from all present. The nomination was fully confirmed by a motion made and carried by a large majority. Mr. Mosgrove, on coming forward, was received with a shout of approval, and he then pledged himself to support any party or leader in any measure which he considered to be in the best interests of the country. He spoke at considerable length on the various politics of the Mowat Government, and commending them generally. Moved by John Scarlett, seconded by James Perkins.

That we, the Liberal Conservatives of East Huron in convention assembled, express our continued confidence in W. R. Meredith, Esq., leader of the Conservative party in this province, and are fully persuaded that the course pursued by him and his followers, will be productive of much good to the province, and do elect a supporter at the next general election.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. T. K. Body, seconded by Jos. Leebch.
That this convention entirely commends the policy of the Mowat Government in regard to their management of the resources of the province in the timber limits, believing them to be utilized to a considerable extent for party purposes; and are fully convinced that their management of provincial affairs has been of a pandering nature, with a view to party patronage.

Mr. Mosgrove is a young man, about 34 years of age, was born in the township of Pickering, but has spent his lifetime in East Huron with the exception of two years with the people and interests of East Huron, and has attained a full knowledge of provincial politics and the constitution of the province and of the constitution of the province and of the best interests of the province.

DIED BY HIS OWN HAND.
Suicide at Butte, Montana, of N. W. Wilson, a Canadian.

BUTTE, MONT., Oct. 26.—This city was shocked to-day by the sensational suicide of N. W. Wilson, ticket agent of the Northern Pacific Railway office here. Wilson was a very popular young man in both business and social circles. He was a Canadian. In November, 1886, Wilson came to Montana at the instance of Major J. E. McCaig, of the Montana Central. Before coming here, Wilson was Grand Trunk ticket agent at Windsor, Ont. He has also occupied a position as ticket agent and station-master at Woodstock and Ingersoll, Ont. For years he was relieving agent along the line of the Great Western before he amalgamated with the Grand Trunk. He was a man of unusual ability, and until recently a very correct habit, but he fell a prey to prevailing habits in this city. Wilson had been drinking for the past three days heavily, and while doing so had gambled at different places in the city. He had the entire confidence of General Agent McCaig, and it was his habit to take the ticket receipts from the office each day and buy drafts at St. Paul to remit to the Northern Pacific at St. Paul. Wilson made his appearance at the office every morning in his usual condition, and McCaig suspected nothing. He discovered this morning, however, that for the last three days Wilson had not remitted as usual. Last night Wilson played faro and lost about \$300. He had played in the house before, and his cheques were accepted. This morning Wilson went to the Northern Pacific office as usual, and was at his desk when Mr. McCaig came in. Shortly after the arrival of McCaig at the office a representative of the First National Bank came in and told Mr. McCaig that a number of cheques had come in signed by Wilson in favor of gambler Dowd, and they had been thrown out. Wilson heard the remark and turned pale. Mr. McCaig called Wilson's attention to the fact, and Wilson said he would go out and buy the drafts at once. This occurred at ten o'clock. Mr. McCaig knew Wilson had no money to buy the drafts, so he went and informed Wilson's friends of the deficit, and they readily agreed to surrender his notes, amounting to \$150 with the company. P. L. Foster, who roomed with Wilson, heard of his trouble and went to his room about seven o'clock. The door was locked, and Wilson inside. Wilson evidently thought the officers were coming to arrest him. He swallowed four ounces of chloroform, and shot himself through the head, and died in twenty minutes. The jury returned a verdict of suicide. The remains will be sent to Chatham for burial.

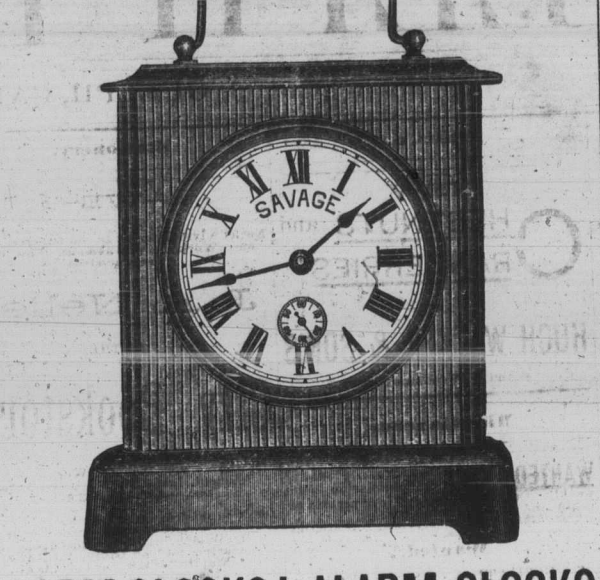
