tended to. All parts wherewith the hogs have been in contact, the scantling and posts of the styes, or inclosures, as well as the troughs, the walls of the piggery, or sheds, etc., all should be scraped off or scrubbed with boiling hot water, and thereafter be given a good coating of white-wash. The floor of the pens should be sprinkled once a week or oftener with plenty of ashes. It will be necessary, in order to insure a successful eradiction of the vernin. to repeat one of the remedies mentioned once weekly, in three successive weeks at least. When once lice in numbers have infested hogs, nothing but persistent warfare and cleanliness will rid them of these vermin. The hog-pens ought to be whitewashed
