

Victoria, B. C., August 20 .- Yesterday saw the great question of the length of the pastoral term discussed in the general conference. The report of the committee on itineracy and transfers was the first to be presented at the afternoon session. It recommended that the pastors of mission churches, ministers engaged in teaching in colleges or in universities, general conference officers and certain others be not subject to the limit term. All were agreed on this. The storm broke, however, when the report recommended that by a twothird's vote of a quarterly board a minister might be allowed to remain in one church for any time up to a limit of eight years. Immediately on the reading of this clause there came the hottest discussion that has as yet occurred. Prominent among the speakers in favor of the retaining of the old system were: Mr. Fortner, of Toronto: Dr. Hearts, of Nova Scotia: Judge McLaren, of Toronto, and Joseph Gibson, of Ingersoll. 

Passing Strange.

Dear Sir,-A paragraph appears in the "Daily News" giving us another example of how the average mortal delights to be "gulled"-as the old Roman philosophers tersely puts it: 'The people wish to be deceived," The article is headed

It goes on to tell how Dr. Grenfell's mission ship warned the C. G. S. Stanley by a Marconigram of the presence of a dangerous iceberg in the Straits of Belle Isle, "South by west eighteen miles from Point Amour!"

The first sensation of the ordinary reader is a burst of enthusiasm for the wondrous knowledge, observation, philanthrophy, charity, etc., etc., ct the noble minded missioners who have so recently "discovered" Labra-How few there are who will even think of questioning the truth or even the probability of the statement! Yet a moment's thought ought to show how absurd it is.

In the first place, as a general rule, there are not one only but dozens of icebergs about the Strtaits at this time of the year, and all vessels keep a sharp look out for them. Any information by Marconigram would be absolutely useless. The Straits at this point are only twelve miles wide. and if an iceberg is there it will not require a Marconigram to find it out; especially as the tide is rushing in and out there at a rate of nearly twelve miles an hour, so that an iceberg located at a certain point by one ship will have moved some miles away before the next ship arrives.

But the humour of the whole thing lies in the fact that the precise spot so minutely and accurately located by the clever navigators of the "Strathcona." viz.. "Eighteen miles south by west from Point Amour"-happens to be on the top of the Long Range mountains on the Petit Nord Peninsula of Newfoundland!

The Newfoundland Agricultural Board has ascertained that certain plots of potatoes in the neighbourhood of St. John's are affected by the dreaded

"Potato Canker" Disease.

This is the same disease that was first detected at Red Island, in Placentia Bay, about a year ago, and is so fatal in its effects that if not immediately checked the absolute impossibility of growing potatoes in Newfoundland for years to come, is sure to result.

The Agricultural Board therefore requests that all potato growers who may observe indications of disease in their crop will at once notify the Secretary of the Agricultural Board at the office of the Department of Agriculture and Mines.

The Agricultural Board recognizing the incalculable injury that must accrue to the country if this disease be not immediately stamped out earnestly requests all persons to aid the efforts now about to be made to effect this.

In February last the Agricultural Board issued an illustrated pamphlet from a special report by Professor A White one at 70c., 90c. and \$1.00. Gussow on this disease. Some thousands of copies were sent to Outport Magistrates and Glergymen, and the Board now requests that potato growers in any affected Districts will procure a copy of this report and be guided by its
