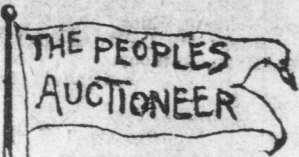

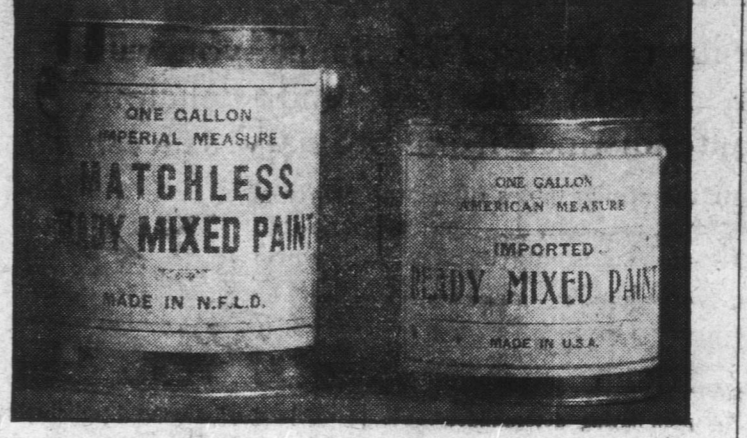

Sentenced to Death.

End of Sensational Trial of Stinnie Morrison in London.

London, March 19.—Stinnie Morrison today was found guilty of the murder of Joseph Heron and sentenced to death. The police tried to connect the tragedy with the Houndsditch anarchist burglar gang and the trial was one of the most sensational and longest drawn-out that has been held in London.

The body of Heron was found on Clapham Common in January. The police theory was that the victim was a member of the Houndsditch crowd and had been killed for treachery by his associates. The trial occupied nine days. The evidence was wholly circumstantial. Morrison who is a Russian Jew claimed that he spent the evening of the murder at a music hall and the rest of the night at his home. Most of the witnesses were from the Whitechapel district and startling assertions were made on both

sides. A sensation was caused this afternoon when the closing arguments of counsel were interrupted to admit the testimony of a policeman who declared that his colleague had sworn falsely.

Morrison gave many incriminating admissions and, under cross examination, admitted that he had been several times convicted of burglary.

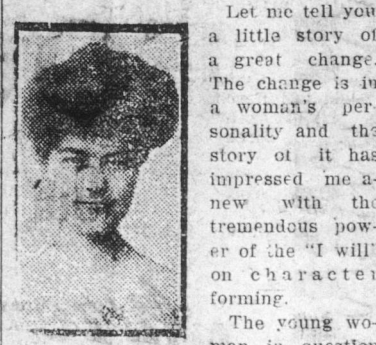

The Evening Chit-Chat

"I ought. I can. I will."

Let me tell you a little story of a great change. The change is in a woman's personality and the story of it has impressed me anew with the tremendous power of the "I will" on character forming.

The young woman in question took the training for a convalescent nurse a couple of years ago. When she made up her mind to do this, everybody prophesied failure because she did not seem at all the kind of person for this sort of work. She was impatient and nervous, inclined to quick temper and had a rather loud, unpleasant voice.

The other day I heard someone speak of her, and asked how she had succeeded.

"Wonderfully," Miss Cameron said. "I don't know. But you never saw such an improvement in anyone in all your life. She visited me a few days last week and really, she's a changed woman."

"You know how nervous she used to be and how impatient if things didn't go just as she wanted them to? Well, now she is as well poised and self-controlled as can be."

"And her voice—why you'd scarcely know it was the same person speaking, it is so pleasant and well modulated. What has happened to her? Well, I complimented her on her improvement and asked her how she did it and she just said, 'Because I had to. I realized that when I took my first position. So I did.'"

I wonder if there isn't a lesson in this for the mothers who refuse to put some responsibility upon, or require some task from, a child because "Margaret is so impatient with the younger children," or because "John is so apt to forget things when I send him on errands."

I happen to know two mothers, one of whom refused to send her daughter away to college because the girl was so helpless about taking care of herself and often showed such erratic judgment; the other who sent her daughter to college for just the same reason.

The first girl at thirty is the same erratic, inefficient person she was at eighteen.

In the other girl, the elation call of "I must" brought out the "I can" and she came back from college a well-poised woman.

I have read somewhere that the reason a man sometimes surprises himself by doing unusually brilliant work when he is half sick, is that he is making a tremendous effort and calling out all of his powers. The article states that under ordinary conditions we only use about one-quarter of our powers, and that when any obstacle like illness causes us to exert our full power, we surprise ourselves by what we can do.

Doubtless, other obstacles besides illness produce the same results. All that ought to be done and in the doing the ability will be created.

Just as exercise and the lifting of heavy weights develop muscle, so responsibility develops ability.

It seems to me Phillips Brooks must have been feeling the power of Vincent's motto, when he said:

"Oh, do not pray for easy lives. Pray to be strong men. Do not pray for tasks equal to your powers. Pray for powers equal to your tasks. Then the doing of your work shall be no miracle. But you shall be a miracle. Every day you shall wonder at yourself, at the richness of life which has come to you by the grace of God."

Household Notes.

To clean rugs, lay them straight and brush with a stiff, dry scrubbing brush. This is much better than shaking or beating them.

Though it is extravagant the substitution of cream or milk in the making of pumpkin pie will result in a most delicate dessert.

An easily-made sandwich is composed of finely chopped sardines covered with salad leaves and moistened with the box oil.

In making cranberry jelly or jam, much less sugar will be required if the sugar is not added until the fruit has been well cooked.

A good salve to use for the lips when they are inclined to crack is composed of half an ounce of lanoline and equal part of honey or glycerine.

When making aprons, especially those to be used in doing housework, do not forget a large pocket. It will save many a step in dusting in picking up.

A crust of bread is best to clean a

sticky bread or cake pan. Never use a knife or anything that will scratch the surface and invite more sticking thereafter.

A clean cloth dipped in hot water and then placed in a saucer of beer will clean white paint and not injure it. The soft bran acts like soap on the paint.

A small button of garlic in a quart of vinegar will give it a mysteriously delicious flavor, and will also improve salads or anything with which it is used.

In putting down linoleum or oil cloth have strips of moulding nailed on the edges, next to the baseboard. This prevents dust from getting under and preserves the edges.

A refreshing drink for afternoon card parties is made of equal parts of ginger ale and grape juice. Serve in straight, thin glasses, with a maraschino cherry floating on top.

Arrowroot will be found more satisfactory than corn starch for thickening fruit sauces or juices to be used with sauces. It does not change the liquid, nor does it cloud it at all.

Early Closing.

Yesterday in the House of Assembly the Bill for the further amending of the law in relation to the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors was laid before the members in the form proposed by Hon. D. Morrison. On Friday it had been read a first time before it had been given an express form. This is not an unusual course. When the printed Bill was distributed it was seen that it had several objects. The most important was to stop the sale and consumption of intoxicating liquors on licensed premises between 6 p.m. and 9 a.m. Such licensed premises as were not grocery stores were to be closed absolutely during these hours. Grocery stores, however, were permitted to open at 8 o'clock in the morning and to close at 9 o'clock at night, but were ordered not to sell or deliver intoxicating liquors between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 a.m. At the suggestion of Mr. Bennett this proposition was changed and under the final form, which the House adopted, grocery stores with retail licenses must be closed absolutely from 6 p.m. to 9 a.m. To Mr. Bennett's amendment seems rash, inconsiderate and unfair. As to the 6 o'clock limit for the sale of intoxicating liquors, there is no room for doubt that the weight of public opinion is in favor of it. The extraordinary number of signatures attached to the petitions favouring the 6 o'clock closing and the absolute absence of counter petitions settles this beyond peradventure. There was a number of other amendments to which we have had no time to give consideration, but which at the first glance appear to be declaratory of the meaning of the Act of 1906, and which on the whole seem to be fair and proper.

We cordially agree with the provision for open session of the Licensing Board and for the right of persons to appear at such sessions in opposition to any application for a license. We also agree with the provision for an appeal to the Supreme Court in case any person feels aggrieved at the granting or refusing of a license. We append a copy of the Bill in its amended form:—

A BILL
An Act to Amend the Law in Relation to the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors.
Enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—
1.—Section 2 of the Act 10 Edward VII, Cap. 5, is hereby repealed and the following is substituted therefor:
23.—All licensed houses shall be absolutely closed and no business whatever done therein and no intoxicating liquor delivered or consumed therein between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 a.m., and no intoxicating liquor shall be sold, delivered, or consumed in any licensed premises on Sunday, Christmas Day or Good Friday, under a penalty not exceeding forty dollars for the first offence, eighty dollars for the second offence, and for a third offence forfeiture of license.
2.—Section 12 of the Act 6 Edward VII, Cap. 17, is hereby repealed and the following is substituted therefor:
12.—From the 1st day of July (of the

Most of the newspaper mail is condemned, being too far gone to a pulp to be handled. There are still 13 bags of mail unrecovered. The Reid Nfld. Co. also had a message saying that the ship is in the same position and that there were poor prospects of her being re-floated. She is now with the high tide totally submerged to the rails. Her stern is resting on a reef, and the low on the low tide rocks. The Gloucester Capt. Delaney and A. D. Brown left Fort aux Basques for the wreck this morning.

Train Notes.

The local via Broad Cove arrived at St. John's at 1.30 p.m. to-day. A freight special from the west left Arnold's Cove at 7.30 a.m. with 10 cars.

At the Bruce Wreck.

Co., received a message from Lunenburg to-day saying that eight bags of mail additional were recovered yesterday, also 2 baskets of mail and 30 pieces of baggage, mattresses and a lot of other small fixtures. Capt. Delaney and Mr. A. D. Brown will arrive here this afternoon.

No Sealing News.

Neither yesterday nor to-day have any sealing news been received from the ships at the front or from the Gulf. The general belief is that the ships have got up all the young harps and are now after the hoods so that no news will be received for a while until the ships do some execution amongst the old fat. Messrs. Harvey & Coy. had instructed their commanders to wire particulars each day.

WIRE FOR INFORMATION.

The rumour having gone about to-day that the Mongolian had not left Liverpool and would not do so until Saturday, Mr. Geo. Shea telegraphed for information and found that the rumour was ill-founded.

Destruction in Its Wake

PHILADELPHIA, To-Day.
An electrical storm, accompanied by high winds, swept over the northern section of the city, leaving death and destruction in its wake. Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed, and the New York division of the Pennsylvania Railroad placed out of commission temporarily by the demolition of its tower at Holmesburg, which cut off telegraphic communication. In the Talcony section the greatest damage occurred and it was cut off from the rest of the city. As the evening squad of policemen was preparing to leave for their beats, the roof of the building was blown off and every window broken by the sudden burst of wind. At Talcony station a man was killed and a portion of a structure blown away. Many houses in this section were unroofed and completely demolished. In the manufacturing section of Kingston several factories were damaged, trolley wires are down and roofs of houses were hurled into the streets.

Sunday Services.

Rev. Mr. Matthews preached at George Street Church on Sunday morning, and was followed in the evening by the Pastor of the Church, Rev. Mr. Bartlett, with a practical address to young women, from the following text taken from the Book of Ruth: "So she gleaned in the field until even." The whole address was delivered in very forceful language and it was singularly striking and interesting. Mr. Bartlett first applied his subject to the many young women coming to this city in quest of employment. These young persons deserved great respect. They should glean not only with fidelity and industry but with due respect for the loved ones they had left at home. The young woman who employed all her leisure time in reading love stories was not gleaming what was really essential to virtuous womanhood nor was she following an ideal that would make her future life what it otherwise might be.

It had been estimated that the pulsation of the heart was sufficiently powerful, if it could be concentrated upon the hardest stone, to break it after a certain lapse of time, and the pulse of womanhood, if properly directed would be sufficiently strong to break the forces of evil and bring about the greatest moral reform that had ever yet been witnessed. Mr. B. showed that good women were usually behind great men and this was perhaps more than anything else the secret of their success. Ruth did not go out to look for a husband, but she went out to glean and in doing so she obtained a husband. Gleaning was perhaps the best way to a success of this nature. The idea that domestic service was mere drudgery and that it was humiliating was most absurd, it was ennobling and dignifying to be engaged in domestic duties. Home duties were sometimes very lightly

Questions About Canadian Baiting.

In the Legislative Council Mr. Harvey asked the following questions and received the answers appended:
The Hon. Mr. Harvey—To ask the Hon. Representative of the Government in this House if the Government has any information corroborating the statement published in the Halifax Herald to the effect that on March 10th the schr. Ronald G. Smith, from this Colony, had wrecked at Lunenburg with frozen herring and was baiting the following schooners: Carrie L. Hertie, Clertonia, Henry L. Montague.
(2) Also if the Government has any information as to whether the frozen herring caught by the schooner Junita, reported in the same paper to have arrived at Lunenburg from this Colony, was as to all or any part of it used to bait Lunenburg bankers.
(3) Also if the masters of these two vessels, and of the Canadian registered schooner Coronation, which loaded in this Colony with frozen herring for Lunenburg and put into St. Pierre in distress (subsequently leaving there for Lunenburg), signed bonds undertaking that their cargoes were to be used for food purposes only.
ANSWERS.
(1) The schooner Ronald G. Smith, a British registered vessel of Lunenburg, took a cargo of herring from Placentia Bay, consisting of 350 barrels of frozen and 50 barrels of pickled herring, clearing at Burin for Halifax on the 2nd March. The Government has no information as to what use the herring were put to.
(2) The Government are not aware that the cargo of the Junita was used to bait bankers at Lunenburg.
(3) The masters of the Coronation, Junita and Ronald G. Smith signed the usual bonds.

Sunday Landing Of Freight.

The members of the Fishermen's Protective Union in 40 settlements signed a petition which was presented in the House of Assembly yesterday asking that the landing of freight on Sundays be prohibited by statute, and that the erection of saw-mills on the Three Mile Line be prevented.

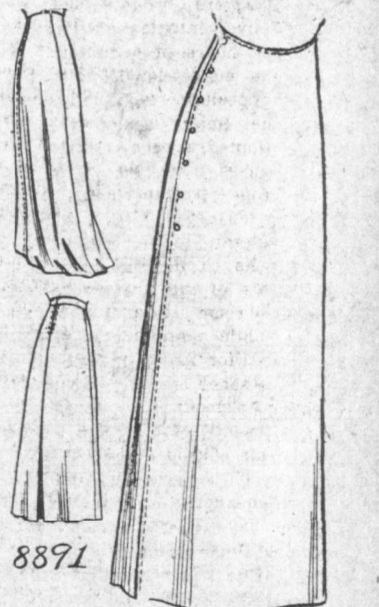

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 27. Advice from St. Petersburg announce that all danger of war between Russia and China has been averted. It is stated that China has surrendered to all the demands made in Russia's ultimatum.

Special Evening Telegram. KINGSTON, Jamaica, March 27. The papers print a report that upon the completion of the Panama Canal the Jamaican agrarian will be strengthened by the addition of a thousand British infantry. A hint of this was given during a debate in the Legislature last month. It is generally believed that the buildings destroyed in the naval yards will be rebuilt and the yard reopened.

Special to Evening Telegram. CALGARY, March 27. Plans have been completed for a strike of all miners in Alberta and British Columbia on April 1st. The railways and towns in the mining section are laying in large stocks, as business will practically cease on April 1st. This strike is the final stage in the struggle against open shops.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 27. An all-British shopping movement has been organized under the Union Jack Industries League, in order to stimulate interest in British manufactures. It will be formally opened by the Lord Mayor in the Mansion House. The movement has received the support of the King and Queen, whose coronation robes will be made of British fabrics. British silks will be used in many of Queen Mary's coronation dresses.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 27. Members of the House of Commons invited the Foreign Office to instruct Ambassador Bryce to urge upon President Taft the desirability of submitting the Mexican question to arbitration. Sir Edward Grey replied, "I don't know what the questions allude to. Relations between the United States and the Mexican Government according to most recent reports, are quite friendly."

Hints to Householders

PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS, in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said: "Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for office consulting rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had nothing else in my office for the last thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to them."

Gas fires are universally used by Medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients. The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainment, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests with gas fires, etc., in May and June 1906.

Festival of Empire.

There was a largely attended meeting of the Festival of Empire Committee at the Board of Trade room last night. The reports submitted showed that everything was progressing favorably. Yesterday about 50 tons of articles for exhibition were shipped by the S.S. Durango. The will be placed in the New Building at the Crystal Palace, London. The exhibits sent include specimens of mineral, timber, agricultural products and trophies of the chase, etc. The balance of the specimens will be sent over by the next Furness-Witby boat. Mr. J. P. Howley, F.G.S., will have charge of the exhibits and will proceed to London via New York on the Rosalind early in April.

Fleet Doing Badly.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick, of the S. S. Prospero, we learn that no work has been done for the past 10 days, all the schooners being kept in port with bad weather, while several are frozen in. There is plenty of fish on the ground, and the weather therefore entails much loss on the fisheries. Capt. W. Kennedy, of the Gertrude, had 100 quintals a few days ago in two settings of trawls, and if the weather improves the bankers expect to do good work.

MARINE NOTES.

The S. S. Morien, 53 hours from Louisiana arrived here at 5 last evening with coal for the Reid Co. She had fine weather on the run and smooth water and met very little ice. She brought 1,053 tons coal which is being discharged at the Dry Dock.

Bruce when that ship was lost on Thursday last. This is the third time within twelve months that Mr. Davis has been shipwrecked. He was one of the crew of the Iceland when that ship was lost last spring; he lost his schooner, Pleasant Times, at Labrador last summer, and now his experience in the Bruce. We wish him "pleasant times" in future.

Mr. Ralph Trappell who took the grand trip on the Antiolette for the benefit of his health, enjoys the trip very much, and finds his health much improved.

The Antiolette, Capt. George Webster, arrived in port on Saturday afternoon after a fine run of 23 days from Barbados. The second day after leaving Barbados, a colored lad about 17 or 18 years of age, who had stowed away on the ship, appeared on deck, and the only alternative was to set him to work. He proved very willing and rather liked his experience. Until he came within the region of snow and ice, which of course made him shiver a bit, not being accustomed to the friendly touch of frock frost. He says his father is dead, but he left word with a friend to acquaint his mother what he had done. He seems to be a favorite, and already has been treated very kindly by some young men of this town, who made him look quite "spruce" yesterday in a new suit.

The young woman Martha (Mattie) Lilly, who died under such sad circumstances at St. John's at St. John's last week was a native of this town, and third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Lilly, now residing here. From what appeared in the Daily News relative to this sad case, your correspondent and I might say the public generally are inclined to the belief that here was neglect somewhere. We are old by the above paper that the authorities when they were informed that the girl had contracted the disease sent word to the family with whom she was boarding, not to visit the room until they would send a nurse and the ambulance to take the patient to hospital. We are not told what time expired between the giving of that order and the arrival of the nurse, but when the nurse did arrive the poor young woman was dead. Should not some better arrangements have been made than that? Why not send at once. She was in a boarding house, in a strange city, with no relative there to tend on her or even to supply a drink, and to be found dead when the red tape of the city had been unwound. Would such an order have been sent to the home of the wealthy whose children are no more dear to them than those of the poorest in our midst. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Lilly and family in the sad and sudden death of their daughter.
