If it is desired to have a veil a little stiff after it is washed, it can be accomplished by having a tiny bit of sugar in the rinsing water. Then stretch the veil in a doorway where it can dry in a free current of air.

### Household Notes.

If the cake flavoring has been forgotten when making the batter try sprinkling the required amount over the cake as it stands in the pan before baking.

For hurts or scalds nothing is more soothing than the white of egg which may be poured over the wound. It is softer as a varnish for a burn than colloidion.

It is very easy to make a new parasol of an old one by carefully slipping off the old cloth and using it as a pattern to cut a new one, which may be made either of cretonne or English chintz.

A common horseshoe magnet, that costs but a few cents, should always be kept in the sewing machine, as it is useful to pick out needles from the machine drawers.

To clean gilt, try touching it up a little at a time with a camel's hair brush wet in alcohol. Don't let it dry, but rub off with a flannel, which should be changed frequently.

Fancy work laid away for the winter should be rinsed in very blue water and dried, but not ironed. If the pieces are placed in black or blue wrapping paper they will not turn yellow.

Clothes will not dry out so quickly if sprinkled and packed in a tin boiler the night before ironing day. They should be packed as tight as possible and the top placed on the boiler.

After washing lace curtains, lay a blanket on the floor of an empty room, spread the curtains on the blanket, stretching them carefully, and they will keep in place without fastening until dry.

After washing woolen socks, dry them on frames to prevent them shrinking. They should be washed in warm suds of white soap, with a little borax added, but should not be rubbed on a board.

It is well when bleaching a piece of lace or linen to place it in soapy water and set it out of doors where it may get strong sunlight. It should be covered with a piece of glass to keep the dust out of the bowl.

To remove kerosene from the carpet, apply buckwheat flour, let it remain for a few hours and then make a second application, which, after a few hours more, should be brushed off. The spot will have disappeared.

To fix a "loose" knife handle to the blade, fill the hole in the handle two-thirds full of mixed rosin and brick-dust. Then heat the shaft of the knife and while hot press into place. Hold it there until quite firmly set.

For a dainty and easily made dessert try slicing oranges and sprinkling a layer of the fruit with grated or shredded fresh coconut. Let it stand half an hour before serving. Sugar may be added if the oranges are not sweet.

Straits News.

The S. S. Home arrived at Bay of Islands from Labrador at 4.30 this morning. Capt. Keen sent this report to the Reid Nfld. Co.—

"Left Bay of Islands on Thursday at 6 a.m. and arrived at Battle Harbour at 8 a.m. on Sunday. Had fine weather the whole trip, but very cold on Friday and Saturday. The thermometer registered 1 below on Labrador. All the harbors are frozen over which made it difficult to land freight; five hours butting ice in getting into the wharf at Hawke's Bay; large quantity of slob ice in the Straits."

Showman Slain.

"Lord" George Sanger, the English Barnum, Victim of Insane Man.

Herbert Cooper, who murdered "Lord" George Sanger, the well known circus owner recently at East Finchley, a suburb of London, committed suicide on the railway two miles from the scene of the crime. Lord George Sanger had no connection with the peccage. His father, who in his day was the head of a family that had been in the circus business for many years, had several sons, and gave to each as his first name "Lord." It was an ingenious and effective advertising device and many thousands of those who saw the Sanger shows, which travelled all over the country, believed the handsome manager and ring master was the son of a duke or a marquis. Lord George Sanger became the best known of the brothers, who all adopted the family calling. At Margate they had a "castle" that was an imitation of the medieval article.

A Curious Sense of Humor.

New York, Nov. 28.—The miscarriage of a 'crude practical joke' caused the death of Alice Tristram, said to be the daughter of Canon Tristram, of Trinity Church, Dublin, in the opinion of Coroner Shogout, who announced yesterday that several men who were with her when she took poison would be summoned to explain what they know of the case. Miss Tristram died on Saturday night in an hospital ambulance from the effects of carbolic acid, drunk in the restaurant of the Golf Club House in Van Cartlandt Park. It was thought then that she had deliberately taken her own life.

The bottle containing this acid, the coroner now believes was labelled 'vermouth' and placed beside the Miss Tristram's plate in a spirit of fun. There were at least five persons, some of them prosperous business men, the coroner believes, in the party with her, and none suspected that she would drink the contents of the bottle. Subpoenas will be issued later to-day, the coroner declared, requiring her companions to testify at the inquest to-day.

The Newest in Fakes.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Harry Malcolm Graham, aged 25, of Trenton, claiming to be a member of the firm of Graham & Mann, electrical engineers, was arrested here last night on charges of fraud. Graham came here several days ago, and announced his intention of continuing to Orillia a survey of a railway from Port Hope to Lindsay already made by responsible capitalists. He advertised for men and engaged a number to assist him. Police Chief Chilton made inquiries of the promoters of the railway, who repudiated Graham, and the latter's arrest followed. He admitted that he was an impostor and that his purpose was to run his fake survey into a farmer's house or barn, and then accept a monetary consideration for changing it. He had no money or documents when arrested. The total liabilities will be about \$1,000, including \$650 for wages due his employees, or money borrowed from them, and a hotel bill of \$102 at Omenee. Chief Chilton will inquire into his previous record.






## Sidewalk Sketches.




