

How High Do Birds Fly?

Flocks Seen Two Miles Up.

Some birds, such as larks, finches, buntings, starlings, and thrushes, fly in flocks from one part of the country to another in their partial migrations, and one sometimes sees a great crowd crossing the sea no higher above the level of the water than the rigging of a ship, and looking like a cloud of smoke.

But this is not the way with the majority of migratory birds; most of them fly fairly high. Even wild geese, whose flying phalanx we see so plainly, and hear as well, go north-

ward at a considerable height. Some astronomers have seen birds at night crossing between their telescopes and the moon's disc, and have estimated their elevation at nearly two miles.

The best observations in the past have pointed to the conclusion that it is very unusual for birds to migrate at altitudes greater than 3,000ft., and that they tend to keep below the lowest clouds.

Kestrels in East Africa.

It is not obvious why they should seek to go higher, into levels where it is colder and where it is more difficult to breathe.

Some new evidence has been submitted by Colonel R. Meinertzhagen, D.S.O., as to the altitude of migratory night. He obtained much information from pilots of aircraft.

On one occasion, when he was himself flying over the southern slopes of Kilimanjaro, in East Africa, he encountered a large, scattered flock of lesser kestrels and bee-eaters making their way north 6,200ft. above the slopes of the hill.

The most striking general result of observation both in the air and from the ground is that flight at anything like 5,000ft. is very unusual, and that the bulk of migratory birds fly below 5,000ft. by day and by night.

There are high-fliers, like lapwings, geese, cranes, and rooks, and there are low fliers, like swallows and wag-tails, but when the weather is bad, especially when it is cloudy, all birds fly low.

Why Discriminate?

The members of the newly formed organization known as the Postal Association, comprised of Post Office Officials only, have a very genuine grievance, and one that they are going to take every opportunity of ventilating. It appears that the reduction axe was applied to their salaries, while those of the Telegraph department of the postal service were not cut. The Postal Telegraph Service may be said to be interdependent, not independent, hence the employees of the Postal branch have good reason to be peeved because of discrimination in favor of their colleagues of the Telegraph branch. Up to the past year or so the employees of the Postal Service were amongst the most poorly paid servants of the Crown in Newfoundland, and even to-day none of them receive salaries in proportion to the importance and scope of their work. An out-port postmaster in receipt of the munificent salary of Twenty dollars per year is not likely to save enough to keep him beyond the reach of want, yet this same individual has been mulcted of Two dollars per annum by the application of the percentage reduction, as have all Postal officials in the island. The Salaries Reduction Act provided that all persons in the public service of the colony should come under its terms, yet we are given to understand that in the case of the Postal Telegraph department, only such persons as were connected with the Postal branch were affected, the employees of the Telegraph section not being touched, and therefore are in receipt of such salaries as are provided in the 1921-22 Estimates.

There is no reason to doubt the authenticity of the information supplied us on this head. The action of the Postal Association holding a meeting on Monday night last, for the purpose of protesting against the reduction in their salaries is sufficient evidence that there has been discrimination, because had all been treated alike, the Postal officials would have been obliged to grin and bear it, as had those of other public departments. Whether the cut, under the circumstances now existing, was justifiable or not, it should at least have been followed, according to the preamble of the Bill submitted to a Committee of the whole House, which distinctly declares that all persons in the public service of the Colony shall have their salaries reduced according to the succeeding schedule. To have made invidious distinctions, is manifestly unfair to officials who have given the best years of their life to improvements in the Postal System, for long before the Telegraphs were thought of the Postal was. It is also said that the officials employed in the Agriculture and Mines Department were similarly favored with those of the Telegraph, and were exempt from the application of the axe. This is indeed a distinction with a vengeance, and it is no wonder that the Postal men have formed themselves into an Association to look out for and demand equal

rights. We have faith enough in Hon. W. W. Halfyard, Minister of Posts and Telegraphs to believe that he will see justice done to a hard worked and capable body of officials of whose zeal in the service employing them, he has had ample proof. "Fair play is a jewel" is an old saying, and as it is only fair play and British fair play at that, which is being sought by the Postal Association, our faith in the Ministerial head that he will see justice done is all the more sincere, since he is such an exponent of fair play himself.

Bleeding to Death.

The prediction regarding the financial plight of the Colony made by Sir Michael Cashin in his speech on the Budget which was published a few days ago is being speedily confirmed. Last week, we understand, the Customs Revenue for St. John's was only \$85,000 against \$111,000 for the same week in 1920. This showed a shortage of \$26,000, a very serious matter in itself. But it becomes positively alarming when we remember that this shortage occurred in spite of the Super Tax of twenty-five per cent. on existing duties, and the Sales Tax of five per cent. on duties, freight, etc., which were imposed by the Budget of Premier Squires on May 26th. According to his calculations it would require all the Revenue of the Custom House last year, and forty per cent. additional which the new taxes were designed to bring into the Treasury, to make up to last year's total. We are informed that for the three months since the Premier's Budget Speech was delivered, there has been a shortage of over \$320,000 which is at the rate of \$110,000 a month. If this condition continues there will be an actual shortage of Customs Revenue for St. John's alone, as compared with last year, of about \$1,200,000 and there will be no forty per cent. additional or the two million dollars which it was supposed to bring into being. Under these circumstances it is hardly too much to claim that the country is rapidly bleeding to death, and that it is now facing the almost certain condition that it will be unable to meet its obligations at the end of December next.

A Reformatory Needed.

The matter of a reformatory has for some time been mooted at intervals in the local press, but for a considerable period I have seen no mention of it. It has, however, been brought vividly to my mind by the report of a Police Court case in Tuesday's Telegram, when an unfortunate girl was sent down to the Penitentiary for what was, perhaps, no fault of her own. That a town the size of St. John's, in these advanced times should be without a reformatory is disgraceful. That young boys and girls, most of whom have not been influenced by parental control, should for trivial offences be sent to the Penitentiary is a standing disgrace to the community. It is more, it is against all the laws of civilization. Take the instance of the girl in the above mentioned case. Here is one who was probably, at an early age, thrown upon her own resources. Left to drift about the streets without any means of making a living; probably weak-willed, she was compelled to resort to means which under other conditions would never have entered her head. Once fallen, her reputation once gone, few people would be found who would care to have her about their houses. She therefore has to go on living her degenerate life, not because she wants to, but because she must do so or starve. It is not a pleasant alternative. Now, crazed with dope, she is brought before the Magistrate and sentenced to serve a term in the Penitentiary. The Magistrate has no other course open to him. There is it not evident that it is up to the Government to act. It matters little how pressing is the need for economy. To do without a reformatory is, in any case, a false economy. This case is not the only one of its kind. But there are also cases of a different nature. I recall that some time ago a young boy was sentenced to three months imprisonment for stealing a few cents' worth of fish. This boy had to serve that term amongst hardened criminals. The effects on him can easily be imagined. At an age when first impressions count most, brought into contact with the worst characters in the community, what else could be expected but that that boy should lead a life of crime for want of knowing better. This is not a case for charity, it is the one in which the Government should act, and they should act at once. By instituting a reformatory where children who have broken the law through no fault of their own, but rather through their upbringing, can be taught some useful trade, they will at least have accomplished something which will cause them to be remembered for many years to come.

Campbell sang eighteen songs, and each was delightfully rendered and was loudly applauded. Moreover, at the end of each part of the programme he had to respond to an encore. The song which proved most popular was "The Sweepers." The recitations of Mr. T. H. O'Neill were indeed excellent. "King Robert of Sicily" to a musical accompaniment being greatly appreciated. The new version of "David and Goliath" also caught the popular fancy. Mr. F. R. Emerson at the piano, excelled himself. The accompaniment to two of the songs sung by Capt. Campbell were composed by Mr. Emerson.

Supreme Court.

(Before Mr. Justice Kent.) In the matter of the petition of Ralph Murfin of St. John's East, Newfoundland, alleging that he is insolvent and praying that he may so be declared. Thos. P. Halley for petitioner, states the facts of the petition. Ralph Murfin, sworn and examined by Mr. Halley, John G. Higgins, and John Hayse, creditors. It is ordered that there be no destruction of the assets of the petitioner. The Registrar be confirmed as trustee. No costs were allowed.

Sagona's Report.

PROSPECTS OF AVERAGE FISHERY According to passengers by S. S. Sagona, which recently arrived from Labrador, the fishery up north is, up to the present, a poor one. Prospects are good for an average catch. The hook and liners are now doing well, and the weather is very good. The weather is very bad for making fish. At Emily and Horse Harbors, Cape Harrison and Helton good catches were made. There is no shortage of salt now, all necessities for the present having been met. As far as is known there is no destruction amongst the fishermen. Several icebergs were seen by the Sagona, but not any more than are common at this time of the year. The weather both coming and going was very bad and dense fog was experienced along the coast.

Distinguished Visitors.

Messrs. John Elliott, President of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chamber of Commerce, and H. P. Ketchum, Mayor of the City of Belleville and Vice-President of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce, are present in St. John's and will leave by S. S. Sagona, sailing on Wednesday. The gentlemen are gathering information about the city and the country's trade and will represent the city at the annual meeting of Associated Boards held in Brantford on November next.

Cricket Revival.

The first cricket match of the season will be played on St. George's Field on Saturday between the Nonde-scrips, captained by Rev. J. Brinton, and the Palladians under the leadership of Mr. H. Hayward. The proceeds will go towards the Grand Falls football excursion. Quite a number of well known visitors of the field will take part in the match, and rumor has it that in one team there is a "goody" bowler whom no batsman will be able to withstand. TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

AGITATORS MAKING TROUBLE. BOMBAY, INDIA, Aug. 24. A grave situation has arisen in Malabar district, on the west coast of British India, where sedulous agitators have been working on the religious fanaticism of ignorant natives. Their activities have resulted in serious mass rioting, bloodshed and destruction of property. Military forces have fired upon the rioters, causing many casualties. Railway lines have been cut, postoffices have been robbed, and mob law is almost supreme in several small towns. A proclamation has been issued by the British officer commanding troops in the Malabar area. It refers to "open rebellion prevailing in the district of North Penani," thirty eight miles south east of Calicut.

SCHOONER RETURN.

HALIFAX, Aug. 24. The Tern schooner Bernice B. owned by M. J. Paris and others, of Lahave, N. S., has been returned to its owner after having been destroyed by fire, while en route to Campbellton N. A FEASIBLE THEORY.

What they say they are unable to understand, is how it was possible that a gas leak sufficient to make an explosion possible, could have occurred without it having been discovered through the pressure gauge fitted to each bag.

the St. John's office, and not a few in the outport branches, and this I know that all of those men are giving good service, each of them is competent, and none of them are sufficiently paid for the work they do.

I trust the new Postal Association will win out in their present claim, and that claim is certainly a just one. They resent the discrimination made in the department when one branch of the service (the Postal Telegraphs) was made exempt from the late "cut" and the other members of the same employ received the full force of the retrenchment. This is certainly far from fair, and it is to be hoped that something will be done to equalize matters.

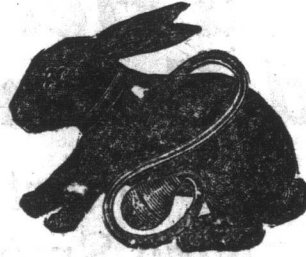

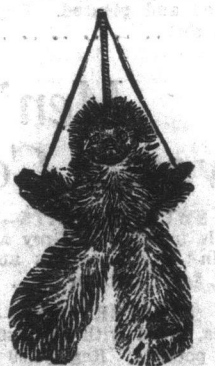

The Labor Situation.

SEEMS TO BE A DEADLOCK.

At the meeting of the L.S.P.U. which was held in the Union Hall on Tuesday, the matter of the new wage scale was discussed at length, but no decision was arrived at. A communication was read from the Employers' Association in which they set forth their view of the situation. The proposed new scale brings the men back to 1919 wages, or a reduction from 55 cents to 50 cents per hour for steam-hoist men, and from 35 cents to 29 cents for fish handlers, and general work. Discussing why it is imperative that a wage reduction should take place, the employers state that wages and cost of living throughout the world are being reduced, and that unless there is a reduction in wages here they will not be able to compete in the European markets in the sale of fish. They further say that unless a settlement is made, many of the firms will be compelled to reduce their permanent staffs, and already several firms had done so. The Longshoremen's Union on the other hand contend that the cost of living has not declined since the reduction in May, 20 any extent, and that they are justified in not accepting the decrease now proposed. The Union will hold a further meeting on Friday night, when it is hoped some solution will be reached.

Buoy Removed.

VESSEL STRIKES ROCK.

Writing from Catalina, a correspondent states that for some unknown reason the buoy on Charlton Rock, entrance to Catalina Harbor, was removed about a year ago, by order of the Marine and Fisheries Department, and placed in another position, where it is by no means an aid to navigation. The schooner Saladin whilst making Catalina on Monday evening, 15th, during a strong S. W. breeze, ran upon Charlton Rock and was considerably damaged. The vessel was coal laden from Sydney and sprung heavily, causing considerable leakage and necessitating three days' extra delay at Catalina to effect repairs. A lookout was kept for the buoy when going through the entrance, but the captain did not know it had been taken away, hence the accident. The action of the Marine and Fisheries Department in removing this buoy is very autocratic, and there being now no mark on this rock it is constantly a menace to shipping entering port. It is quite possible that Capt. Turk of the Saladin will seek to recover damages by legal process against the Marine and Fisheries Department, for delay and damage, for which that department, by the removal of the Charlton Rock buoy, is responsible.

K. of C. Memorial School

The beautiful Memorial School erected by the Terra Nova Council, K. of C. with the aid of Ladies' Auxiliary of that body, is fast nearing completion. The interior furnishings are being rushed to permit of its being ready for occupation at the re-opening of the Academy which has been deferred till September 12th. The formal opening will take place on the 12th of October. After school re-opens some time will be spent in classification of the pupils according to their different grades, as the four large classrooms on the top story are to be occupied by pupils in the four grades of High School. Elaborate preparations are being made by Sisters and pupils to celebrate the formal opening in a manner befitting the occasion.

The new school, when completed, will be one of the most up-to-date of its kind. It will be steam heated throughout, equipped with an auditorium and gymnasium where athletic exercises, callisthenics and general physical training will be practised, and with a modern domestic science school. The teaching of domestic science is a new feature in school management in the Academy. Classes will be held daily, enabling the Institution to serve hot luncheons to the pupils at a very moderate cost. Parents who wish their children to take advantage of this will find it a great convenience, particularly to those whom distance prevents from going home at noon. Many parents will be glad to hear of this innovation which the domestic science room will render feasible.

The Academy of Our Lady of Mercy, Military Road, needs no commendation from us. The excellent educational advantages afforded by the good Sisters are well known and widely appreciated, and have proved an inestimable boon to the country. We look forward to the accomplishment of even greater things with the added facilities which the present modern equipment affords.

There has been such an influx of pupils during recent years that accommodation was entirely inadequate, and when the Knights of Columbus undertook the erection of a memorial to the fallen heroes of that body, nothing was more fitting than that it should take the form of an educational institution to meet the growing needs of the Catholic girls of the city. His Grace the Archbishop, to whom primarily the credit of this idea must be given, made known to the Council the necessity of greater school accommodation to remedy the congested conditions which prevailed at the Military Road Academy and the K. of C. intimated a desire on their part to meet his wishes. The result is the present K. of C. Memorial School erected at the rear of the Mercy Con-

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vent where it commands a splendid view of the city and suburbs, and which will be not only an adornment to the group of buildings surrounding the great Cathedral, but a practical and imperishable monument.

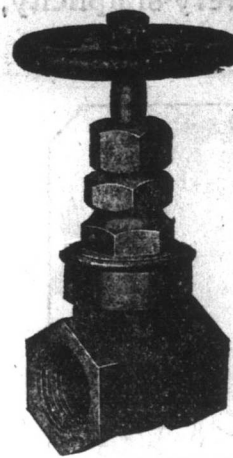

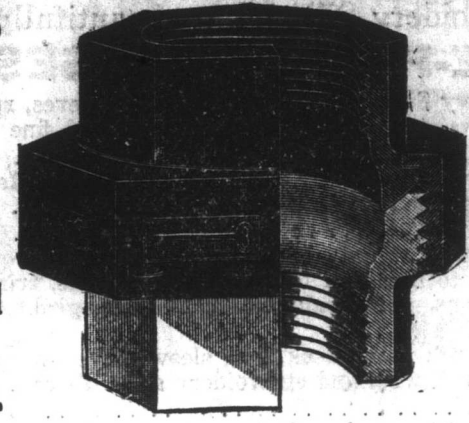

The New Governor-General.

(From the Toronto Star.)

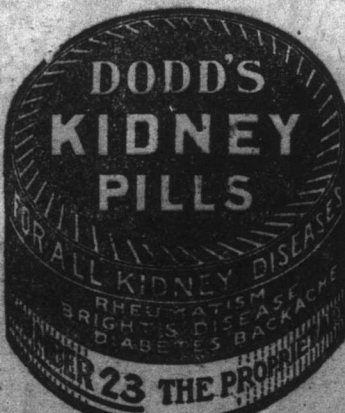
Lord Byng of Vimy is heartily welcomed throughout Canada on his arrival as successor to the Duke of Devonshire in the office of Governor-General. It is understood that the new Governor-General was selected by His Majesty with the approval, not only of the British, but of the Canadian Government as well. In this country Lord Byng is highly thought of because of his achievements in the war, and scattered everywhere throughout the Dominion are men who fought under him in victorious campaigns. There is, therefore, something new and not quite measurable as to its effects in the coming of Lord Byng to Rideau Hall. He is not like the Duke of Connaught, born to adorn such an office, nor is he like Earl Grey and the Duke of Devonshire, seasoned in constitutional usage. But he is a man of ability and character who has made a success of whatever he has undertaken, and he has, in Canada, to an unusual degree the hearty approval of the country. There is not in the sky a cloud except one about the size of a man's hand. It is an excellent thing that the new Governor-General should be an old soldier high in the esteem of the Canadian forces that fought in the war. He may exert a useful influence, but it is not unlikely that among our returned men there may be many who will expect of him, and urge upon him, courses quite beyond his constitutional range. They may expect of him the impossible. His arrival does not mean a changed administration. He adds grace and symmetry to the form of monarchical government which is ours. In all this Lord Byng is thoroughly versed, and the only risk to which he is exposed is that returned soldiers throughout the country may press upon him from all directions to take courses other than those favored by his constitutional and only advisers. It is for them to know that this cannot be done. But he can exert a potent good-will within limits.

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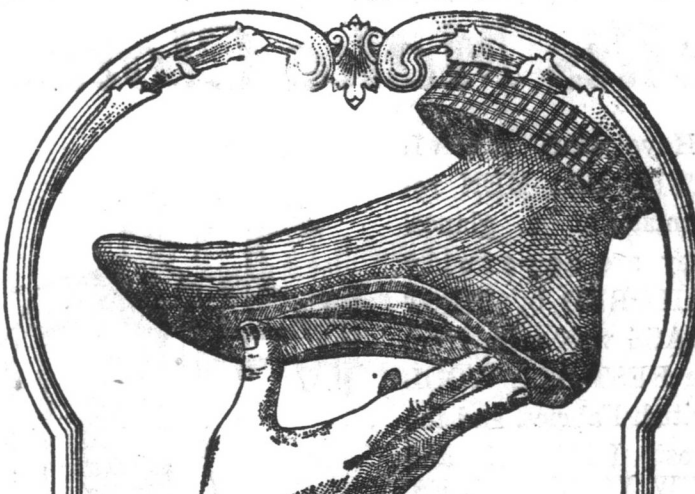

Household Notes.

Steel wool will remove spatters of paint on window panes. Thicken sponge cake batter with rolled oats, drop on baking time and bake. Lima beans are good baked with tomatoes and a little bacon. Violin strings are excellent for stringing large, heavy bacon. A quarter teaspoonful of salt will improve any cake batter. Good coffee is excellent served with sweetened whipped cream. It is an excellent idea to plan the meals for the week on Monday.

Two teaspoonfuls of blackberry juice will color frosting lavender. Never melt or warm butter for a cake. Beat it to a smooth cream. Thicken sponge cake batter with rolled oats, drop on baking time and bake. Hard sauce flavored with lemon extract is good with apple brown betty. Before baking braided bread sprinkle a little sugar and cinnamon over it. When canning plums or strawberries save the surplus juice and use for jelly.

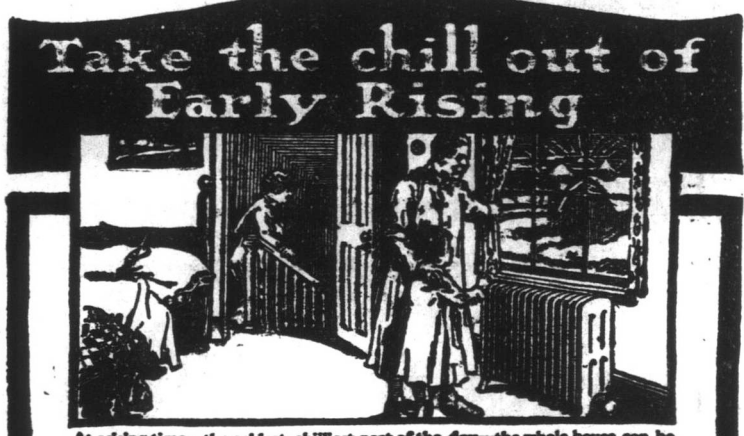

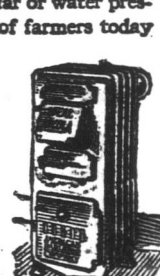

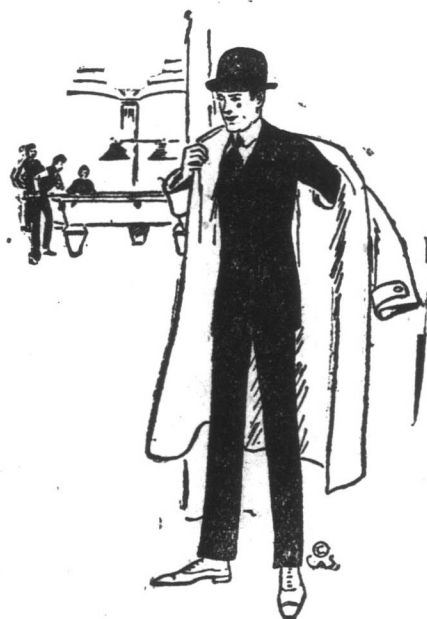

Chatterton, the Misguided Genius.

Thomas Chatterton, "the marvellous boy who perished in his bride," was born on November 20, 1752, at Bristol, where for 200 years his ancestors had been sextons of the church of St. Mary Redcliffe. When he went to school he was regarded as an absolute dunce, but being attracted by the bright colours of an illuminated manuscript he learned his letters from it, and afterwards read anything he could get hold of. As he had access to a large number of ancient documents, he became familiar from an early age with the antique style of spelling and handwriting. At the age of eight he was sent to Colston's Hospital, the blue-coat school of Bristol, and at twelve he wrote poems which appeared in the local newspapers. He adopted an ancient system of spelling, and could thus easily write poems which appeared to be several hundred years old. His next feat was to forge a pedigree for one Burgum, a pewterer, showing his descent from the De Bergshams, who came over with the Conqueror. In 1767 he was apprenticed to John Lambert, attorney of Bristol, but in this situation he was very unhappy, although he had much leisure to fabricate his poems. These he alleged to be the work of one Rowley, a monk, and that he found them in the muniment room of St. Mary Redcliffe. He sent some of them to literary men in London, and they occasioned the greatest controversy, many eminent men of letters maintaining that they were genuine and others that they were forgeries. He was discharged by his employer for threatening suicide, and went to London on April 24, 1770, where he took lodgings in Shore-ditch. He interviewed booksellers and wrote for magazines, but the remuneration he received was not sufficient to live on and he was too proud to accept invitations to dinner. When nearly starved to death he took poison, and died in his garret on August 25, 1770.

What Two Subalterns Did.

Two young British subalterns and half-a-dozen sepoy actually "confined to barracks" a Georgian "army of liberation" which came to the Batum Province, then occupied by British troops. "Soon they went outside, and discovered a Georgian force of some three hundred men drawn up in battle order. There was a front line, bringing flat all round the bungalow, then a reserve line, machine-guns, and so on, and, at the back, the stretcher-bearers. The subalterns stepped through this martial array and ordered the Georgian officer to house his troops in some empty buildings a little farther up the hill-side. The Georgians, bewildered at their reception, retired into the houses, and the British subalterns issued orders that they were to stay there and not to come outside. The Punjabs were posted as sentries over them. At this point the Georgian commander, who, in expectation of a scrap, had taken up a strategic position some miles in the rear, arrived and blankly acquiesced in the arrangements.

"Hill 60" Sold to Brewery.

The Echo du Nord says: "Hill 60. Everyone remembers the famous hill to the southeast of Ypres, where furious fights took place. On this account it ought to have remained a sacred place. Now this hill has just been sold to a British brewery, for the purpose of erecting a large hotel. Could not the memory of the heroes of Hill 60 be commemorated in a more fitting fashion?"
"A brewery, you will notice!" exclaims the Glasgow Forward. "The fine, delicate capitalists, who urged us out to fight against 'materialism' and for things great and spiritual, stick a booze factory upon Hill 60."

When the Sea Bulges.

The rise and fall of large bodies of water—a phenomenon to which we have applied the name of tides—is the result of the influence exerted upon the earth by the moon and sun.

Both pull or attract the earth in varying degrees, the power of the moon being about two and a quarter times as great as that of the sun. This attraction is most evident in the fluid portion of the earth's surface—the oceans and larger lakes, which are so affected that they bulge outward, forming a rising of the water on the side of the earth nearest the moon, and also on the opposite side, with corresponding low water between.

The reason for extreme high tides at the times of the new and full moon is because the moon is then in a line with the sun, and the water reacts to the combined pulls of both bodies. At the time of the first and third quarters of the moon this influence is divided—the single-unit pull of the sun acting at right angles to the two and a quarter unit pull of the moon, thus diminishing materially the attraction exerted upon the earth and producing tides that do not rise nearly as high as the ones occurring during the times of the full or new moon.

As the moon appears to revolve about the earth once every twenty-four hours and forty-eight minutes, two tidal waves continually sweep around beneath her, causing two high tides and two low tides in each approximately day.

Indeed, we are very badly placed in the matter of moons. Our solitary one (so far as we know at present) is trifling compared with the ten of Saturn, the nine of Jupiter, and the four of Uranus.

Halifax Team Selected

CHAMPIONSHIP SPORTS WERE GREAT SUCCESS.

A meeting of the Newfoundland Athletic Association held last night after the Championship Sports, Newfoundland team which would compete at the athletic meet at Halifax, was selected. The sports were a great success, fully 2000 spectators in appearance. Although the weather was anything but pleasant as a consequence of the occasion, the falls of the times in the various events were not so good as they have been the turf being in a slippery condition. The programme opened with a parade of competitors to the centre of the grandstand where were the guests, amongst whom were included the Mayor and Commissioners, officers of the various clubs and associations and representatives of the city Brigades. Competitors halted before the grandstand and were addressed by Mayor Morris, who in laudatory terms of Mr. Ayre the work he had accomplished in organizing the A.A.A. When the parade had been put in condition for the present movement towards the forwarding of the medals in this country would be then declared the sports. Mr. G. W. B. Ayre, President of A.A.A. expressed his thanks to Mayor Morris and called for cheers from the Civic Commission. The sports programme was then begun. Great care had been taken in the course for each race. Measurements had been made by the staff of the Crown Lands office and were verified before the race began by him and Mr. White-McNelly. Mr. C. O'N. Conroy, who for many years absent from affairs of this kind, carried the duties of Field Captain in an efficient manner for which he had been awarded a complete set of medals of yesterday's meet. The presence of the C.L. staff under Capt. A. Morris added to the enjoyment of the afternoon.

THE SPORTS.

There were a very large number of spectators for the 100 yards dash and the 200 yards dash, and both these races were very keenly contested, but the conditions of the turf was conducive to running. The 5 Mile Turf Race was most exciting and was won by the 14 mins. 11 secs. O'Toole ran a champion close for the first few yards and ended about 1 1/4 laps before Taylor was the third man to the tape.

Victor Hedorum medal was won by Phelan, who obtained the greater number of points. The results were:

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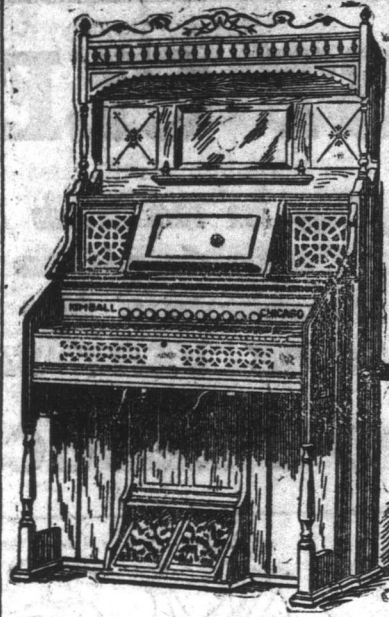
