The Trappist Order at Oka, Quebec.

BRIEF HISTORY OF MONASTICISM. A Canadian Press dispatch to-day, published in another column, reports the damage by fire of the Church and Presbytery at Oka, Quebec, the buildings being part of the Trappist settlement at that place. Following we give a brief history of that great monastic order.

The Trappist order, observing the rule of St. Benedict, was a very long history. After the French Revolution the order was threatened with extinction, when the Monastery of La Trappe was confiscated by the Government. It was due to Dom Augustin de Lestang, vicar-general of the Archdiocese of Vienna, who had joined the order in 1780 and was elected Superior, that with 24 religious a monastery was established at Val-Saint-Canton of Fribourg, Switzerland, in April, 1791. Many were attracted to the order, and in 1793 several new monasteries were founded, one in Spain, a second in England at Lulworth, a third at Westmalle, Belgium, and a fourth at Mont-Benoit in Piedmont (1794).

China Pays. PEKING, Dec. 6. China and Japan last night completed a settlement of Shantung controversy, as outlined by the terms of the Washington Treaty, China agreeing to pay Japan forty million yen for Shantung railroad, and sixteen million yen for all public properties in Kiaochow district.

CANADIAN APPOINTMENTS. OTTAWA, Dec. 6. It is announced from Government House that owing to the resignation of Capt. Balfour, the Governor General's Secretary, the following appointments are to take effect on Jan. 1st: To be Governor General's Secretary, A. F. Sladen, Esq., C.M.G., V.O.; Private Secretary, Major P. K. Hodgson, O.B.E.

THE NIGGER IN THE FENCE. LAUSANNE, Dec. 6. Both Turkey and the inviting powers, Great Britain, France and Italy, are to-day expected to make clear plans for a settlement of the Dardanelles problem. Powers are in accord on agreement that the Straits must be under international control, open to merchantmen and warships in war or peace. The Russian delegation is vigorously attacking such a program, maintaining Turkey's right to absolute control.

KEEP YOUR TRIP TILL THEN. SOUTHAMPTON, Dec. 6. The Cunard Line Mauretania will go into dry dock for overhauling, and will not resume Transatlantic operations until the New Year.

HUNGARIAN STATESMAN ON TRIAL. BUDAPEST, Dec. 6. The trial of Count Michael Karolyi, former President of the Hungarian National Council, charged with high treason in delivering Hungary to Bolshevism has begun here.

ABSOLUTE PROHIBITION. CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 6. Beginning to-day, no alcohol will be permitted to enter Turkey, under a ruling recently made by Nationalist authorities, and present stocks must be consumed within two months or they will be destroyed.

NEW TRADE COMMISSIONER. MONTREAL, Dec. 6. Notification has been received at the British Trade Commissioners Office, here, that R. W. Dalton, former British Trade Commissioner in Newfoundland, has been appointed to succeed G. T. Milne as His Majesty's Senior Trade Commissioner in Canada and Newfoundland with an office in this city.

Labrador Gold Claims. OFFICIAL REPORTS SOUGHT. The Crown Lands Department is receiving frequent enquiries from people abroad concerning the recent gold discoveries on Labrador. The department is not in possession of any official information of the nature of that most desired, as a geological survey and report of the areas have not yet been made. Much interest is being aroused in the eastern provinces of Canada over the discoveries, and from letters received, a big rush to Labrador will take place in the spring. Recently the Canadian holder of a number of claims on Big Brook, Stag Bay, visited the city with a view to establishing his headquarters here. It may be of interest to note that the presence of gold in the neighbourhood of the recent discoveries was suspected over 30 years ago by the well known old sealing master Capt. Peter Kent. He operated a fishing premises on Labrador for a number of years, and brought up samples of his find, but where he located the dust he did not disclose, and as far as is known the secret died with him.

Married Women Fight to Retain Positions.

LONDON.—The fight against married women acting as school teachers in the public schools of England, which has been going on for some time, reached a climax when sixty-four married women teachers were discharged from their duties in one of the London suburbs. During the war married women were practically the only persons available for teaching, and since then they have kept their jobs despite the efforts of many veterans associations to have them expelled in order to allow ex-service men and nurses to resume their positions. An attempt was made recently to exclude married women from teaching in the schools of Middlesex County but they were able to take the case to Chancery Court, asking for an injunction against the school authorities. The case still is pending. Efforts to have the married women excluded from the schools under the jurisdiction of the London County Council, however, have failed, and the Council has refused to pass a motion to this effect.

Women in London Greatly Outnumber Men.

LONDON.—A record increase in the number of females, as compared with males, in the City of London during the last year is shown in the census figures. In the interval between the census of 1911 and that of 1921 the female excess in London rose from 1,177 to 1,468 as compared with 1,000 in actual figures the female excess in London is 341,365, an increase in ten years of 72,362. The effect of the war on the female population is shown by the fact that nearly 26,000 of this increase, or about 36 percent, is accounted for by widows. While the enumerated population of London fell nearly one per cent. during this period, widows increased in number to 12 per cent. Although there was a considerable increase in the number of persons between the ages of ninety-five and one hundred in this period, the centenarians fell from twenty-five males and fifteen females, to six males and ten females.

Caviar Comes Back Again in ussia.

PETROGRAD.—Russia this fall is enjoying the greatest caviar feast in many years. War, revolution, famine and lack of rail transportation interfered greatly with the caviar industry, but it is now going again, as in the old days, and the delicacy is on sale in many shops in the cities, and in the village stores as well, even in the famine areas. In Paris, London and Berlin caviar continues to be a great luxury, costing a dollar or so a smack, here it is doled out to all comers for about a dollar, or its equivalent in Bolshevik roubles, a pound, for the freshest and best. Pressed caviar may be had for forty cents a pound, and even less, and is very popular with the workers.

As The North Sees It.

(Twillingate Sun.) THE KING ISSUES A DECREE. Mr. Coaker's speech at the 14th Annual Convention just closed at Port Union, appears on the face of it, to be a production from an intelligent mind when viewed with caution and studied from a present day condition, the promise contained in that lengthy lecture to his disciples, give one to think that manifestoes will soon be floating in the air and that election is dawning. Of course promises are about all we seem to acquire, even after the elected are gone to four years rest, well-earned, maybe through the hardships and sore rebuffs of a few months' campaign. It's funny though, that the Hon. R. A. Squires had to be asked to have the export tax on codfish removed, tho' that Advocate editorial and the F.P.U. leader's address gives the praise to the Ministry of Fisheries, after that Department refusing to grant the remission of the tax. Of course should there be any benefits found for the fishermen, the only one to be praised is a head of the government at Port Union. Mr. Coaker says his resignation has been in the hands of the Prime Minister—or the printed sheet says—for over a year, but was not yet accepted. That is the portfolio of Minister of Marine and Fisheries. He agrees that the forfeiture of the Departments of Militia and Shipping, saving, he says, not more than \$20,000, while the Education Department is useful and good to maintain \$7,000 a year. We wonder if this pays the Inspectors even. The speech also touched on the Humber Deal, but does not give details regarding the financial aspects of the proposition, but dwells on the resources and the advantages and the many avenues of employment it will afford to our people. The President is again elected President and also seems bent on entering another election campaign when the time comes. He promises taxation reduction and other reforms and it remains one of the many planks in the political platform of 1919 election. It seems by reading between the lines, when going through the messages from Port Union to the Advocate, that were published, that some delegates from the four quarters were not at all pleased with the speech from the holder of the Sun, Cuique scopre. Probably the Goose that laid the golden egg was found dead. THE POLITICAL SITUATION. The political situation seems perplexing and although an election is in the far distance, yet according to the present stir up, it appears that some movement is on foot to upset the present government, but who the Opposition leader will be, or now is, is not made public. Many are of the opinion that Mr. Morine would not be suitable for leadership, and fears are entertained that, should he win the Government, he may again send out the order to "migrate or stow," meaning that he may again sell the valuable assets, which belong to the Colony, to wealth reapers, and those who seek inland territory. Mr. Morine, however, knows how to handle the reins of Government but whether the country would be safe in his hands in future, remains to be seen, should he gain power. It is probable that owing to the present movements he may aim to better conditions than heretofore, otherwise he would risk inciting revolution and rebellion, so that, seeing the outcome, he may as a Statesman prove to the country, to what is attributed to his past political life and give fair play to the inhabitants. However there is uneasiness among many and a more popular leader, we think, would be advisable to stay the oncoming tides of the electorate. Personally we take no active part in party politics and will only voice the present sentiment of the northern people, or people of this District, until a fight comes and we can choose in that time whom we will serve. Party politics should be held aloof when the back bone of the country is trying to have present day conditions made more applicable to their needs, and should the present government meet the requirements even now it would not satisfy, when it comes to parliament, if election time only gives the desired results. Why not try at least to carry out promises as stated in manifestoes as former governments have done and not when the four year term is expiring. DOING THE RIGHT THING. 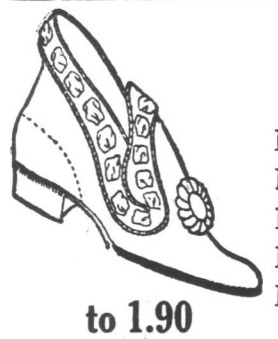

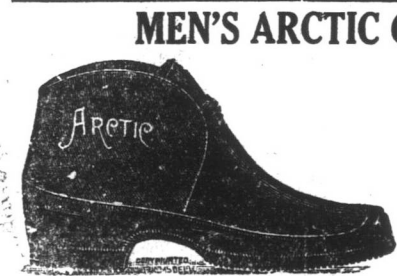

Great Turf Frauds.

PRINTING A PAPER FOR THE SAKE OF ONE ADVERTISEMENT.

Nothing in the curiosities of crime is more extraordinary than the case where a clever swindler printed a whole bogus newspaper for the express purpose of drawing the attention of "mugs" to one small advertisement in it.

Harwood, alias Benson, alias the Count de Montague, was an international crook, a "swell mobster." As the gallant count, he ruffed it on the Continent, swindling here, swindling there, till at last an unfortunate mistake led him to the inside of an English prison.

On release at the end of his sentence he naturally sought congenial company, and found it in the person of another rogue, Medway, alias Kerr. Mr. Kerr also had a certain reputation in the higher criminal circles. Fraudulent bookmaking was his speciality, with a distinct leaning towards Continental clients, who, naturally, didn't know with whom they were dealing, and couldn't trace him if they did.

The Bogus Bank.

On these happy terms the ingenious Mr. Kerr had instituted his "Royal Bank" with whose cheques he paid his lucky clients. It was true that there was no such bank, and that there was therefore no money. But the cheques looked admirable, and the very title inspired confidence.

It was at this juncture that the Kerr and Benson partnership began. When two clever rogues join forces, the trade of knavery gets busy. First the precious pair operated as Archer & Co. Then Archer & Co. disappeared, only to start again as an ingenious "Society for Insurance Against Losses on the Turf." This admirable and philanthropic scheme found a good deal of support, principally on the Continent.

"Sworn Bookmaker!"

The whole affair suggested respectability and confidence. The gang—there were two others in it—had a decorous office of the Strand; the nominal head of the "company" was "T. Allerton, Sworn Bookmaker."

Innocent French and Belgian backers were especially impressed by the "sworn bookmaker"—an invention of which Kerr was particularly proud—and money began to pour in. At last the time seemed ripe for one final swindle on a big scale—to be the last.

An entire "newspaper" was printed, complete with editorial, leading articles, theatrical notices, and advertisements. It was numbered 1713, which gave the impression of a venerable and respectable age. Obviously one of the oldest established English papers!

Then the Bubble Burst.

Its entire object lay in the advertisement of a Mr. Montgomery, chartered bookmaker. So estimable was the character of this gentleman that the editor felt compelled to insert a tiny paragraph of official praise of his high personality, upright dealings, and prompt payments.

Testimony from such a source was high praise indeed.

"This 'paper' was sent abroad by the thousand. It attracted, amongst others, a Madame de Goncourt, an old French lady with a foolish taste for betting with strangers. From first to last, ten thousand pounds was what she contributed to the coffers of the worthy Montgomery.

Then the bubble burst. Friends of madame began to make inquiries, and the firm thought it desirable to go abroad.

The police followed, and in Rotterdam the swindlers were arrested. So ended one of the most remarkable incidents of the world of roguery in modern times.—Pearson's Weekly.

Russia Imports Cotton.

RUSSIA—The Russian textile industry is just now passing through a crisis, in order to save 120,000 workmen from unemployment, the government has permitted the state cotton committee and the textile syndicate to import 2,000,000 pods or 35,000 tons of cotton, assigning for this purpose a six month's loan of 29,000,000 gold roubles. The new economic policy of the Soviet government has given rise to a number of combined state trusts in the textile industry, and many factories which have been idle for the last four years are now running. But the revolution ruined the cotton industry in Turkestan and the Caucasus, and no fresh supply of raw material was forthcoming. Thus the factories had to use up their small funds of cotton left over from pre-war days, but this, together with the expected harvest of this year, will hardly last them until next February. Working at the rate of one-fifth of the pre-war production, the requirements of the Russian textile industry for the next year is estimated at 4,500,000 pods of raw material for 1,500,000 spindles. This year's harvest of cotton is estimated at 7,000,000 pods, while the remainder of the amount necessary for production will have to be purchased abroad, chiefly in Bukhara, Persia and Khiva.

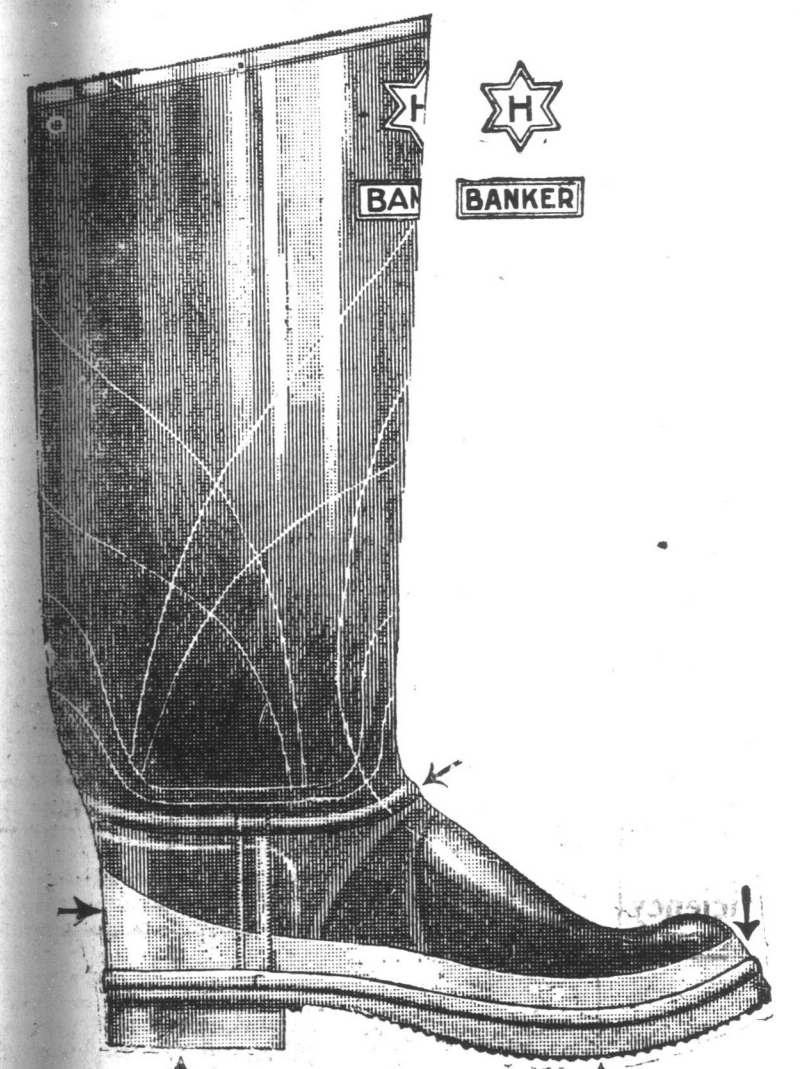

Buildings in London Need Constant Care.

A wood-boring grub is beginning to destroy many of the architectural wonders of London. The grub first made its appearance in large numbers some ten years ago, and had done much damage to sections of historic buildings before its presence was discovered. The insects had eaten into the supports of old Westminster Abbey, which dates from the time of William Rufus, and royal architects and engineers were at once set to work to remove the decayed parts and substitute iron work. The work was extremely tedious, and though it was carried on throughout the war, it has just been completed. It was necessary to remove the wood and many of the stones of the famous building. The work was next found to have made considerable progress in Westminster Abbey, but this structure is now successfully repaired. The work has also been at work in the House of Parliament, the Guildhall and St. Paul's Cathedral, which also are undergoing repairs.

Everything About Cuticura Soap Suggests Efficiency

Efforts are being made here to revive the Western Asia trade of the days before the war. There were the cattle kings and the nomadic tribes who possessed as high as 30,000 head of cows, steers, horses and sheep. The entire country was given over to raising and the production of wool. But to-day these herds have been reduced to a few hundred head, and the owner who once considered the Orak tanner as the old days, used to turn out thousands of hides annually, but this industry is at a standstill because of the lack of wool. As a result there is unemployment in the district, and hardly enough grain on hand to feed the people half through the year. A good dinner deserves a good drink, a bad dinner needs a drink.

Seweden Preparing Interesting Legislation

STOCKHOLM.—The Swedish Riksdag in 1923 will deal with a number of new bills of national importance, according to a public announcement by a member of the present cabinet, K. J. Schlyter, minister without portfolio. Among the significant proposals to be submitted is a bill calling for extensive agrarian grants and reforms. This bill deals with ways and means of apportioning arable crown lands as homesteads to individuals, with safeguarded property rights, for an unlimited period of time. It provides also for more extensive colonization of public domains by small farmers, and for the expropriation of privately owned land, especially parts of the holdings of large companies and mismanaged agricultural estates. Among the other issues to be considered next year is the eight-hour law, which will be disposed of in one of three ways either abolished, continued as a provisional measure, or enacted into a statutory law; a bill proposing that the police force in the cities and the provinces be reorganized; a new forestry conservation law designed to give the small timber owner greater privileges of cutting for personal use as well as for the market, and a new bill providing for the important reforms in the rent regulation law, aimed especially at abolishing rent profiteering. Laws giving women greater opportunities

for holding public offices also are expected.

"Pidgin" English?

This is the name given to the jargon used in the Far East as a means of communication between English readers and their Chinese servants. It is mainly founded on English, but pronounced in the Chinese way, with a few words taken from the Portuguese and Dutch, who were the first Europeans to trade there. This curious "language" employs very few words and no grammar at all, compensating for these deficiencies by a wealth of description by comparison. So a saw becomes "one piece push him he go, pull him he come." "Pins and needles" in the hand has been translated into "My hand, he belongs all-same lemonade, fizz, fizz," with a little thought the meaning is obvious. "Pidgin" is a corruption of bigness, the Chinese attempt at business. We also speak of "pidgin English" as meaning other jargons of English and native tongues, as for instance those used on the African coast.

Game Sanctuary in Africa.

MAY SHELTER PREHISTORIC ANIMALS. LONDON.—An untouched Eden in the mouth of a burned-out volcano in the heart of Africa, providing a refuge for thousands of animals, many of them possibly extinct in other parts of the world, is to be explored by scientists. The land forming the mouth of the volcano has been purchased by an Englishman who will

organize an expedition to probe the secrets of the crater. The volcano is the giant Ngoro-Ngoro, the largest crater on this planet. The mouth is ten miles across, and a veritable paradise for wild animals. The Germans knew of it before the war, but kept its existence a secret. There is a wild range of possibilities as to what a thorough exploration of the crater may bring forth. Prehistoric animals believed to have perished from the earth thousands of years ago, may inhabit its caves and scientists hope to find live creatures of which only

the skeletons have been discovered in other parts of the world. The explorer photographer, T. A. Burns, and Mrs. Frederick Dalziel, both of New York, were members of a party which recently made an expedition of the crater. They estimate that 75,000 animals inhabit this strange land. The crater, in fact, is a city of animals which have lived there for centuries, safe from attack. The steep sides of the volcano make a natural barrier against the outside world and there are few men, white or black, who have dared to penetrate the surrounding forests even to look into this paradise of animals.

Followers of Zapata Cared For in Mexico.

MEXICO CITY.—The Federal Government has just purchased for 250,000 pesos a tract of land in the state of Morelos that will be given to former followers of Emiliano Zapata, the dead rebel leader of that state, for an agricultural colony. General Pedro Saavedra, one of Zapata's aides, will head the colony in which 150 of former Zapatistas and their families will live.

France to Teach Farming by Movies.

PARIS.—A project to secure better instruction in farming for the peasants of France by the use of motion pictures has been approved by the cabinet. An annual appropriation of 500,000 francs is available to buy the picture machines for agricultural schools and community centres where the farmers will see the application of scientific methods to their work. The money will be taken from the receipts of the parimutuel betting machines operated under Government concession at horse races.

Canada and Britain Stand Together.

Sir Henry Thornton's Last Message on Leaving England.

Sir Henry Thornton, who has been General Manager of the Great Eastern Railway since 1914, is leaving for Southampton for Canada tomorrow (Wednesday 22nd) to take up his new duties as President of the Canadian National Railways. In response to a request for a message before leaving England, Sir Henry informed a press representative that he had one and the same piece of advice for Canadians and for the people in this country, and that was that they should trade together more and work in harmony with each other. "The Great War," he said, "did much to dispel our insularity, and every day it becomes more evident that the commercial in-

terests of Britain and the Dominions lie in the same direction. It is incumbent on all of us to recognize the vital necessity of turning the spirit of brotherhood and patriotism into practical use. We must avoid these internal dissensions that have brought about the downfall of great Empires in the past. This applies to political and commercial affairs alike. "Canada and the United Kingdom have commercial interests in common. The more we trade amongst each other, the more we shall promote our national wealth, although this should by no means exclude the intensive but profitable business with other nations. Let us at first build up as much trade

as we can for ourselves, within our own Empire, and as much more as possible with the foreigner.
LASTING RESULTS EXPECTED.

"The British Empire Exhibition offers an admirable opportunity for the manufacturers and business people of the Empire to become acquainted with the products produced by each member of the Commonwealth, and the opportunities for trade. Missions of representative traders from every country usually and unfortunately begin and end in dinners and after-dinner speeches, but the exhibits and demonstrations which will be actually shown at Wembley should produce a lasting result. Woman Suffrage Mexico Makes Slow Progress.

MEXICO CITY—The woman's suffrage movement is making some progress in Mexico, but high government officials are inclined to believe that the time is not yet ripe to grant the franchise to women. For several years a desultory propaganda to this end has been conducted here, but the movement received its greatest impetus recently when Rafael Nieto, governor of the state of San Luis Potosi and former Secretary of the Treasury, submitted a project to his state legislature providing for women suffrage. Governor Nieto's action provoked much discussion in the press which believes that it will fail of passage. Secretary of Interior Calles stated recently to newspapermen that, although he strongly favors women's suffrage, he is of the opinion that a great deal of educational work must be done before it can be accomplished. The state of Yucatan extended the vote to women several years ago but reports from that state say it has not been generally used.

Denmark Will Continue Eight Hour Day.

COPENHAGEN—The eight-hour day law in Denmark will be extended for the years 1924 and 1925 as a result of a report made recently by the Board of Social Welfare. This law, which was granted a year ago and remains in force until the end of 1923, has been attacked by many interests as being responsible for the increases in the cost of living, but efforts to have it rescinded have failed. The Board, in its report, stated it believed the law was responsible for much of this increase, but that it contained many advantages for the workmen which more than offset this disadvantage.

Radical Leaders of Mexico Interested in Russia.

MEXICO CITY—Felipe Carrillo Puerto, Governor of Yucatan and a recognized radical, has just been granted a leave of absence by his legislature to permit him to visit Russia and study Bolshevism at first hand, according to the newspaper Excelsior. Yucatan has been frequently described as a "miniature Russia" and Governor Carrillo Puerto is also on leave from his duties as governor of Puebla, recently returned to Mexico from an extended visit to Russia and other European countries. General Carrillo Puerto has been granted an "unlimited leave" by his legislature, because of his radical tendencies.

German Teachers Rebel at Wages.

COLOGNE—Objecting to a wage of twenty-three marks an hour, the teachers in Cologne's continuation schools have struck for more pay. Similar action already had been taken by the faculties of vocational institutions at Duisburg and Essen. The Cologne staffs include teachers from the public gradeschools, engineers, and expert handworkers. Some time ago they were conceded sixty-three marks an hour, but their union alleges no actual payments were made at this rate. At the prevailing rate of exchange, twenty-three marks hourly means a wage of less than five cents for an eight-hour day.

Railroad Makes Secret of Record Run.

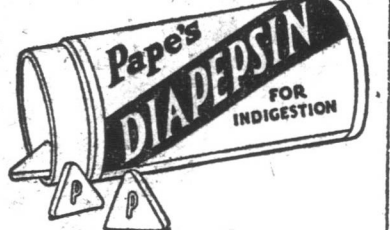
LONDON—A record railway train run in England is described in a document kept secret for nearly 20 years, but now published in the Great Western Railway magazine. On May 28, 1904, one of the Great Western's best specials from Plymouth to London attained an overall speed, exclusive of stops, of over 66 miles an hour, and at times during the journey exceeded 102 miles an hour. The speed was officially recorded, but the company, for some reason not given, decided not to announce the accomplishment.

Nelson's Flagship May Travel by Land.

LONDON—An effort is being made in England to raise \$500,000 for the preservation of the Victory, Nelson's flagship in the Battle of Trafalgar. The famous vessel is at present at Portsmouth, in a very bad state of repair. So far she has deteriorated that, if it is decided to bring her to London, she will have to come overland; she could not undergo the journey by water.

MEXICO CITY—President Obregon is not a stay-at-home. Contrary to the custom of his predecessor, President Carranza, who scarcely ever left the capital, the present executive travels extensively and during his administration he has "gone visiting" on an average of once a month. He never journeys more than a day's ride from Mexico City, but there is never a day of festa in any of the towns within that radius that is not attended by the President. His private car is stocked for travel at all times and, according to his aides, they are always prepared to go on a jaunt. The President will take a swing through Northern Mexico next December, going first to Tampico and then through Nuevo Leon, Coahuila and Chihuahua to his native state, Sonora, where he will spend the Christmas holidays.

Young American
RELEASED FROM RUSSIAN NAVY.
MOSCOW—Henry P. DuBelle, Jr., of New Orleans, La., 20 years old, who was conscripted into the Russian navy in 1919 because he could not show papers proving anti-Russian citizenship, has been permitted to leave Russia upon representations made by the American Relief Administration. When DuBelle eventually found his identification papers, he managed to get a statement from Soviet authorities acknowledging his American citizenship, but the naval commanders at first refused to recognize these as entitling him to release from naval duty. The intervention of the American Relief Administration then was successful. DuBelle has gone to Paris to join his father.
