When mixing/blue in hard water it is a good plan to add a cupful of milk to a tub of blue water. This will prevent the linen from blueing

unevenly and becoming streaky. Delicate China can be cleaned best with warm water to which a little Fuller's earth has been added. No soap will then be needed, and this does not remove gilding as does a strong soap.

A fruit salad should be made some time before it is needed, so that the juices and fruits may blend thor-

When cleaning paint use a sponge instead of a cloth. Cheap ones will be hard enough for the purpose, and with care will last quite a long time-so it is real economy to invest in one.

Stains in silk will generally give way to a treatment of French chalk and lavender water mixed to a paste, and rubbed in with the fingers. Iron through blotting paper, with a hot iron and then brush off the chalk. Piano keys are apt to turn yellow in a very short time. 


