Examination of School, Section No.

Examination of School, Section No. 7, Eramosa.

A public examination of the above school was held at the school house, on Thursday last, 3rd inst. The day being fine, the attendance of pupils was respectable. The examination was kept up, with only 20 minutes' interruption, until 4-30 octock, p. m., after all, leaving several branches of daily study untouched. The correct and ready answering of the children elicited the admiration of all present, while the order and discipline of the school have formed a good model for many schools placed in more favoured localities. Mr. Lowry's long experience as a teacher has given him the art of controlling children in a manner peculiar to himself—his constant aim being to induce the pupils under his care to do what is right, because it is right. The classifying of the children appears to be well attended to in this school. The equal status of the pupils in their several classes making it difficult to assign a distinction to any particular one. Were every teacher to adopt the plan here pursued, it would be well, viz: making sure that the children thoroughly understand one book before promoting to another. Too many people are pleased with the mername of their children being in a book of a lower figure or not. Mr. Lowry fights against the currency of this failing, and labors to make the pupils masters of one book before promoting to another. Thos plan should be adopted by every teacher. Although this is a bush' section, the manners, habits and progress of the children have been very decidedly improved since the present teacher entered upon the management of the school. I cannot help noticing a ground of regret, that so few parents availed themselves of the privilege of witnessing the examination. Indeed, on this occasion, the Trustees seemed to forget their duty. In the discharge of public trust, attendance upon public examinations is certainly a duty imposed upon School Trustees. Their attendance as well as that of parents acts as an encouragement to both children and teachers
