



They cover a large amount of space, and in all respects the show in this important branch of farming industry is equal to that of the Provincial, at Hamilton. Haggert Bros., of Brampton, exhibit a thresher and separator, combined reaper and mower, single mower, and power cutting box.

Macpherson, Glasgow & Co., of Fin. AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS...
