THE STABBING CASE IN SALEM—The WOUNDED MAN RECOVERING.—George Stone, the young man who was so seriously stabbed in Salem last Wednesday night by John McGowan, the hostler of the hotel at which he boarded, was now able to sit up, although very weak from loss of blood. His medical attendant fears that a portion of the hand, above which the deepest wound was received, will be useless. We understand that McGowan is still at large.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES—The anniversary of the M. E. Church, on the 6th inst., Eramosa, will be held on the 13th October. Bishop Richardson, of Toronto, will preach at 10:30 a.m., and the Rev. T. C. Brown, of Georgetown, at 3 p.m. A collection will be taken up at the close of each service. On Monday evening, the 14th, a tea meeting will be held, when the above and other speakers will address the meeting. There will be vocal and instrumental music by the Fergus choir. Doors open at 5 p.m. Tea at 6 p.m. Admission 30 cts. The proceeds to be applied in liquidating the debt on the church.

RUNAWAY—On Tuesday afternoon, at the show ground, whilst a team of black horses belonging to Alexander Johnston, of Beverly, was amongst others careering round the ring, a dog began barking, which so frightened the animals that the owner seemed to lose control over them. When rounding the north west corner of the ring, they did so sharply, which had the effect of precipitating the driver from his seat and turning the buggy completely topsy-turvy. In this condition they madly galloped round the ring till they reached the turn near the palace, when coming in contact with one of the posts they disentangled themselves from the capsize vehicle, and with the pole still attached to them went round the ring again at a furious pace, ultimately making their escape by the northern ring entrance and dashed into the crowd assembled in the vicinity of the impiments. We did not learn that they did any further damage, and we understand that the horses themselves are unhurt. We heard it stated that this span of "darkies" are not novices in the practice of unjustifiable skeddaddling. The buggy was made a complete wreck. The catastrophe did not end here, however, the runaway's collision with the horse-ring fence started off the usually quiet ponies of Mr. Wm. Stevenson, of the Guelph Nurseries, who were tied up in the vicinity, and who made the outer circuit of the horse ring with no other damage to the market wagon to which they were attached, than a broken pole, and the loss of a quantity of fruit which is to be peddled of comparatively little value to the exhibitor, as it was disgustingly ludicrous to witness the rapacious raid made by the chumping and cheeky bystanders upon the best pearls that had thus unexpectedly been cast before the herd of devouring swine.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Country Gentleman says, if coppers and saltpetre water is used around pear trees, the tree will show the effect in a large yield of fruit. He tried this on a Bartlett pear tree that had yielded no fruit for two years previous; that very year it yielded one hundred and fifty-five large, fine pears, and the following year two hundred and fifty large ones, and is still doing finely. If pear trees want iron, which most soils are deficient in, sulphate of iron, or coppers, is a good way to supply it.

It is reported that the Spanish Government has resolved to submit to the other European powers the question of the justice of its claims against the United States Government for filibustering expeditions from American ports to Cuba.

Mrs. Harriet Beecher Stowe made her first appearance as a public reader, reading from her own works, in Springfield, Mass., the other night, and her reception was very flattering.

The shareholders of the Mail Company met in Toronto to-day, and it is rumored that an important change will be made in the business management of the paper.

New York State Fair.

The New York Mayoralty.

Speech of the Solicitor General in England.

Elimin, N. Y., Oct. 1.—The State Fair was very largely attended to-day. The entries and exhibition of horses, cattle and poultry are very superior.

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—With two or three unimportant exceptions the press of this city and State are unanimous in denouncing the verdict of the Fair case as a mockery of justice.

An earthquake shook of three seconds duration was experienced here this morning.

New York, Oct. 1.—At a meeting of the municipal reform organization held this evening at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, Wm. H. Havemeyer was nominated for Mayor.

Philadelphia, Oct. 1.—About noon to-day a thirty foot cylinder boiler in Fulton & Co's Rolling Mill, Morristown, exploded with terrible force, and seriously, if not fatally, wounding a number of men.

London, Oct. 2.—The Gazette officially announces that Lord Hatherly has resigned the Chancellorship.

Miss Nellie Grant and her brother Ureese, have arrived in London.

George Jessel, Solicitor General made a speech to his constituents at Dover, last night. He dwelt at some length on the operation of the new Ballot Law. He congratulated his hearers that England was at peace with all nations, and declared that the award of the Geneva Board of Arbitration would be paid within a year, without increasing the taxes of the country.

New York, Oct. 2.—A Washington Despatch says that Mr. Morr, Japanese Charge de Affairs, explains the present reactionist movement in Japan, by saying that it is an effort of the older men in public life to counteract the progressive movements of the young men who have obtained virtual control of affairs.

Wellington County Council. The Council met on Tuesday, at 2 o'clock, pursuant to the published notice, to consider the by-law providing for the issue of debentures to the amount of \$20,000.

John Mair, Esq., Warden, in the chair. Moved by Mr. Massie, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that the by-law for the issue of \$20,000 in debentures be now read a third time, passed and numbered 208.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Darby, seconded by Mr. Johnson, that this meeting adjourn till to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock, in order that the Solicitor's opinion may be obtained first as to whether the grant to the incorporated village of Elora towards improving the road through that village connecting the county roads is a grant that this Council can legally make, said road having been made and opened for a number of years and secondly, whether this Council can legally pass a by-law to issue debentures for making roads when no by-law has been passed making grants for such roads.

The original motion was then put and carried. The yeas and nays were ordered to be taken down.

A Pic-Nic was held in the village of Dundalk on the 27th ult., in connection with Presbyterian Sabbath School in that place, in a beautiful grove on the premises of John McDougall, which was well suited for the occasion. The attendance was large beyond all expectations, notwithstanding the bad state of the woods and such wet weather. After partaking of the good things of this life so bountifully provided by the ladies, the Rev. Mr. Morrison, being the only clergyman present, gave a short but very interesting address. The Superintendent then gave a very interesting sketch of the progress of the school, which commenced on the 23rd day of June with only 29 of an attendance, but has since been augmented to 90. They have a nice library, consisting of 95 volumes of well bound books, all well adapted for sabbath reading. An election took place for a large cake. Five young ladies were chosen from among those present, and voting commenced and when all had voted the election was declared in favor of Miss Mary Jane Nixon. The proceeds of the cake, which were within a few cents of \$40, also \$7 collected, will be used for purchasing books for the library. The proceedings were enlivened by the Dundalk choir, which did admirably well considering the short time it has been organized.—Com.

IMMENSE CROWDS OF PEOPLE!

EVERYTHING GOES ON WELL.

Wednesday morning broke bright and clear, giving token of a beautiful day. At an early hour crowds of people began to stream into the Town from all parts. Every road leading into Guelph was filled with buggies, wagons, and all other kinds of vehicles, which were loaded to their utmost capacity with groups of visitors to the Exhibition. By and bye all the leading streets were filled with people hurrying to and fro, presenting a scene of bustle and life, which filled the hearts of the citizens with delight.

The early train from Berlin brought down a very large number, but that was nothing compared to the crowds which came by the other G. T. trains from the East and West later in the day. Thousands also came by the special trains on the Great Western, and all these converging towards the Fair Grounds gave one a good idea of the immense number of people which visited the Exhibition.

The Show is now at its best. The stock is all on the ground, the articles in the Palace are all in their proper places and displayed to the best advantage. The judges were all busy on Tuesday afternoon, and to-day will finish their labors, which in some cases are of no light character. We may now congratulate ourselves on the assured success of our second Central Exhibition, and should the weather keep as favorable for the remainder of the week, we may safely predict a much larger attendance than at last year's show.

SHEEP. J. Anderson, Puslinch, exhibits 14 head of Southdowns, amongst which will be found some excellent specimens of the breed, and prizetakers at Hamilton. Thos. Waters, Eramosa, is an exhibitor of sheep, having contributed some excellent animals to the Oatswold pens.

CATTLE. Mr. Peter Rennie, Garafraxa, exhibits an aged grade cow, 1st at Hamilton, a 3 year old do., and a do. heifer calf; also a 1st steer. Mr. F. W. Stone, Moriston Lodge, Guelph, exhibits an aged Durham bull, "Grand Duke of Cambridge," 2 bull calves, 2 aged cows, 1, 3 year old do., 2 year old heifers, 1 yearling do., 1 heifer do. In Herefords, Mr. Stone exhibits 21 head, 3 aged cows, 3, 3 year old do., 3 year old heifers, 3 yearling do., 3 heifers do.; also 1, 2 year old bull, 1 yearling do., and 3 bull calves. Mr. John Pipe, Guelph Township, exhibits an aged Durham bull, 2 cows and a heifer calf. Mr. J. Jardine, Hamilton, exhibits 8 head of Ayrshires, 1, 2 year old imported bull, 1 aged do., imported, 1 bull calf, 1, 3 year old imported cow with calf, 2, 3 year old do., and 1, 2 year old bred by exhibitor. Messrs. Wm. Hurd, Samuel Barber, Jas. Wright, Wm. Armstrong, Eramosa, exhibits some fine specimens of working oxen.

Deady, Joseph Featherston, Credit, who exhibits a sow bred by Her Majesty the Queen at Featherston, also a boar of the same breed, Snell & Sons, who exhibit a pair of spring pigs, bred from imported stock, an imported sow, 8 months old, bred at the Royal Agricultural College, England, and 2nd prize-taker at Hamilton, also an imported sow 2 years old, prize-taker in former years both in England and at Kingston, also an imported sow 17 months old, 1st prize at Hamilton, also an imported boar 10 months old, 2nd prize at Hamilton, an imported boar 2 years old, 2nd prize at Hamilton; J. & B. Millar exhibit 1 sow and 4 spring pigs; C. Heath shows 2 spring pigs; Dennis Coffee a sow and pigs; Allan Simpson 2 pairs of spring pigs of excellent style, from his imported boar, which we were sorry to observe was not exhibited this year, as his owner preferred not to overfeed him for exhibition purposes; R. Ford, Limehouse, shows an old and young Limerick sow; John Bayran a pair of spring pigs of Allan Simpson's stock; John Card a fat pig; M. Conway an Essex sow with 5 pigs; M. Caraher a pair of Yorkshire pigs, boar and sow.

Mr. Swartzenberger, Puslinch, exhibits a Berkshire boar, J. Tuck a fat pig (Yorkshire), J. Latta a fat Berkshire do., J. Featherston, Yorkshire sow and boar; M. Caraher, Yorkshire sow; W. Lang, Nassagawaya, do., also imported Berkshire sow; P. McGarr, do.; John Card, a pair of spring Berkshire pigs, three months old, and 1 do. sow; W. Roper, 1 do.; Jas. Main, Trafalgar, 2 Yorkshire boars, splendid animals; Thos. Easton, junr. Nassagawaya, a fine Chester white boar; Jrs. Main, 2 choice Yorkshire sows; Jas. Featherstone, 2 do. and a young do. boar; Jas. Anderson, Puslinch, 2 Essex bairs and a sow; W. Beahan, Guelph, a do., Thos. McKerrie, do., 4 do. boars, 3 do. sows, and a pair of do. pigs, six weeks old; W. Reed, Knatchbull, a Suffolk sow 7 months old, 1st prize at Rockwood, '72; Joseph Featherston, 2 Essex boars, 1 do. sow; F. W. Stone, 1 Suffolk boar, 1 do. sow and 1 Yorkshire boar; Jas. Main, 1 Suffolk boar and 4 sows; Jos. Featherston 3 do. boars and 3 do. sows; John Hunt, Nassagawaya, 2 do. boars and 1 do. sow.

The show of pigs taken throughout may fairly be called first-class, and must in most of the sections give the judges a troublesome task.

HORSES. In blood horses there is nothing special calling for remark, beyond mentioning the excellence of the only foal shown. In the class of agricultural stallions, 4 yrs and upwards, Messrs. Lyons & McKellar, Nassagawaya, exhibit their jet black stallion, which took the first prize at Hamilton in this class, and which stands a good chance of being similarly successful here. He is a French Canadian, and certainly the largest horse of his breed we have ever witnessed. Mr. Coulter, of Brampton exhibits "Defiance," a dark dappled bay, of great bone and substance, and which took the first prize in his class in Hamilton. Mr. Ferguson





of Beverley, exhibits a five year old stallion, dark bay, which took the 2nd prize at Guelph in 1871. Mr. Chas. Hefferman, of Guelph, also exhibits his famous "Nichol Champion," which took the 3rd prize last year. There were a number of really first-class stallions exhibited in this class, and called forth the remark from a highly competent judge, that selection was a better lot congregated in one ring.

In the class of 3 year old agricultural horses, we would remark on a richly dappled bay belonging to Mr. Jas. Young, of Erin, got by a Clydesdale sire, an animal of great life, power and substance; also on a neat, compact Suffolk stallion the property of F. W. Stone; Mr. Alderson, Nelson, also exhibits a fine dark bay stallion in this class.

In the class of 2 year old agricultural horses, Messrs. J. & B. McQueen, Pilkington, exhibit a very neat, tidy horse, though somewhat on the small side. E. McCaig, Puslinch, shows a large powerful animal (dark bay). R. Young, Chincagony, exhibits a very nice, keen, well built dark bay, with fine limbs. D. Fielder, County of Peel, exhibits a jet black stallion, mated somewhat by white fetlock.

J. & W. Deans, of Paris, exhibits a pair of very fine yearling agricultural fillies of Clydesdale breed, sired by the celebrated "Champion." Wm. Brown, Hespeler, exhibits a fine 3 year old gelding, of peculiar color, being a dappled roan. Jas. Cattaneau, Puslinch, exhibits a fine large roan agricultural yearling filly, also a very promising black yearling filly, which has already carried off 6 first prizes at various shows. Mr. H. Swackhammer, Erin, exhibits a carriage brood mare and filly foal, which took the first prize at Rockwood. John Tuck, Waterloo, exhibits a yearling carriage colt of considerable merit, also a filly foal in the same class, both the animals are sired by British Champion. Robt. Irwin, Pilkington, exhibits a very superior roadster stallion by Touchstone, and which was awarded the 2nd prize last year at Guelph as a 3 year old. James Keough, Guelph, exhibits a year old bright bay roadster stallion, which took the 1st prize at Guelph in 1871, and which is likely to give a good account of himself in the judges' ring to-day. John Valens, Beverley, exhibits a bright bay filly in the roadster class, which was 1st at Hamilton and 1st at Guelph in 1871, and likely to sustain her position in 1872. B. G. Porter, Grahamsville, exhibits the aged roadster and carriage stallion, "Royal George," which took the 1st prize at Hamilton; he is an exceedingly handsome horse, and commands much admiration.

John McIntosh, Guelph Township, exhibits his famous agricultural brood mare which has taken many prizes at our local shows; also a foal, a colt of much promise, sired by "Briton." Chas. Hefferman exhibits a dark bay 4 years old carriage stallion. Sheriff Davidson, Berlin, exhibits the celebrated Kentucky Blood Horse, Dr. Butler, which took the 2nd prize at Hamilton; also a 3 years old carriage stallion of dark bay color. Dan Hefferman, Guelph, exhibits the well known local blood stallion "Valparaiso." John Miller, Hornby, exhibits a pair of bay roadsters 4 years old, exceedingly well matched as to size and color. John Hoban, Guelph, exhibits one 3 years old roadster gelding, 1 three year old do filly, 1 agricultural filly 3 years old, and 1 do. one year old. Robt. Coulson, Rockwood, exhibits a bright bay 3 year old carriage stallion of great power and size, stands upwards of 15 hands, 3 inches high, also a thorough bred blood mare with foal at foot by Allendale, declared by competent judges to be one of the best colts ever seen in Canada. Jas. Cowan, Guelph, exhibits a very superior heavy draught yearling filly, bright bay in colour, and which will be remembered to an easy first in her class at Guelph in 1871; she was then the property of Mr. Thos. Dobson of Toronto Gore. B. Hannah, Pilkington, exhibits 1, 3 year old agricultural filly and 1, do 2 year old, each of whom were 1st and 2nd prize takers in Guelph in 1871. Hector McCaig, Kirkwall, Beverley, exhibits a span of very superior agricultural mares, 4 and 5 years old, and which will prove hard to beat. J. and G. Keith, Nichol, exhibit a single carriage horse, a prize taker in Guelph in 1871, and a yearling do. filly, sired by "British Champion," and which took the 2nd prize at Guelph in 1871. W. J. Oliver, Peel, exhibits a dark brown agricultural stallion, aged. Charles Austin, Guelph, shows a superior roadster brood mare with filly foal at her foot. A. Harvie, Beverley, exhibits the celebrated Clydesdale stallion, the "Champion," and the very superior three year old stallion of the same breed, which stood at the top of his class in 1871 at Guelph; also a five year old Clydesdale stallion, which took the first prize in Guelph in 1871. In the agricultural class, Charles Austin also exhibits a two year old carriage gelding and a yearling stallion, bright bay in colour, a colt of which any man may well feel proud. This colt is said to stand 15 hands high. A. McGibbon, Milton, exhibits a pretty pair of black roadsters. John Jackson, Peel County, exhibits a truly magnificent 2 year old heavy draught stallion imported from Lincolnshire in 1871, weighs 1,870 lbs., quite black, without any white feet, and took the 2nd prize at Hamilton; but are now doing business at Brantford, where they have erected a large factory, and are turning out all kinds of agricultural implements.

John Forsyth, of Dundas, exhibits a reaper. D. Campbell, Guelph, shows one of his favorite fanning mills. Wm. Eber, Perth County, exhibits his dog-power chum, which is a curiosity in its way, being propelled by dog-power. It is on the old dash principle and is worked either by hand or dog power. It is an ingenious contrivance. The dash is worked on the rotary principle.

D. Thomas, Guelph, exhibits a dash chum on the lever principle, which makes it very easy for the chummer. D. Campbell, Guelph, exhibits a dash chum on the crank principle, being easily turned by a handle. It has a hollow bottom for putting in hot or cold water as may be required. This makes it very convenient. Thos. Forfar shows a dash chum on the lever principle.

THE SHOW INSIDE.
Beginning with the south wing, we find in the centre of the wing the space allotted to carriages, and we notice that the 1st and 2nd prizes for single seated buggies goes to Galt, the makers being Gilles & Co., who also exhibit a trotting buggy, the 1st and 2nd prizes in single seated buggies, covered, the whole collection exhibiting great taste and good workmanship. W. & J. Little, Listowel, exhibit the 1st prize two horse pleasure carriage, open, a single buggy, open, neatly and substantially got up. We did not observe any in this class from Guelph makers.

SLEIGHS AND CUTTERS.
Robert Parker, Guelph, exhibits the 1st prize single pleasure sleigh, reflecting great credit on the maker's taste and workmanship; the second prize is awarded to W. Armstrong & Son, Guelph, for a very well got up, tasteful specimen.

AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS.
The agricultural machinery and implements are exhibited north-west of the Palace, and make a magnificent show. They cover a large amount of space, and in all respects the show in this important branch of farming industry is equal to that of the Provincial, at Hamilton.

Haggart Bros., of Brantford, exhibit a thrasher and reaper, combined reaper and mower, single mower, and power cutting box. Macpherson, Glasgow & Co., of Fingal, exhibit their well known vibrating thrasher and separator. The ordinary thrasher and separator, exhibit horse-power and separator, grain crusher, straw cutter, Can's & Gardner's patent root cutters, and a half dozen ploughs for various descriptions of work, among which is a subsoil plough.

Henry Carter, Aylmer, exhibits a draining plough, and a Sprague mower. L. Condit & Co., Guelph, make a very creditable show of their implements. They have among others a horse power cutting box, with straw carrier, one very cheap hand cutting box, fanning mills. The cutting box with the straw carrier is

something original and is calculated to effect a great saving in labour, as it carries away the straw after being cut, and deposits it in a heap. As a labour-saving and economizing machine it is invaluable to the farmer. They also exhibit, but not for competition, several very nicely finished and improved fanning mills and straw cutters. Apart from their high character as machines, they are good samples of superior workmanship.

G. C. McKenzie, Georgetown, shows a large horse power straw cutter. A. Whitelaw, Paris, shows an improved straw cutter and grain chopper combined capable of chopping 25 bushels an hour with four horses; a straw cutter, so geared as to cut on the long and short feed, which is at once accomplished by the shifting of a lever. It is also fitted with the improved circular knife; also a root pulper.

John Watson, Ayr, exhibits a combined self-raking reaper and mower, called the "Ayr Clipper," a light single iron mower, called the "Humming Bird," small horse power for two or four horses; wooden field roller; two Gardner's English root cutters; 1 Can's do, two chopping mills, on a recent invention; 2 large horse power cutters, 1 hand do, 1 two turnip drills, 1 scuffer and one common iron Hill, and one jointer Hill plough, 1 common nine tube grain drill, and one combination do., for sowing manures.

L. D. Sawyer & Co. have a fine collection of implements. Sprague show two seed drills, which took the first prize at the last two Provincial Shows, 1 vibrator threshing machine, which took the first prize and diploma at the late Provincial show, 2 straw cutters, sulky horse rake which took first prize and diploma at Provincial, 2 combined reapers and mowers, single reaper, single Sprague mower. This well-known firm took three first prizes at the Provincial Show last week.

Thos. Elliott & Co., of the Speed Foundry, Guelph, make a fine show with their implements. They exhibit a Johnston single reaper and mower, hand power horse power straw cutter, hand power cutter (Cummings make) cultivator, horse hoe, gang plough, iron plough, double mould do., iron plough with wood handles, wood do., pair of iron harrows, Pitt's horse power, roller and turnip sower. This firm though only a few months in existence, have turned out a collection of first class implements, which are rapidly growing in public favour. Their Johnston reaper is acknowledged to be one of the best in use.

Mr. R. G. Lambert, of Harrison, exhibits a combined cultivator and scuffer of great merit; also a straw cutter, plough and scuffer, all of which are excellent specimens of workmanship. B. Bell & Son, St. George, exhibit a combined self raking, mowing and reaping machine, the Ohio Buckeye reaper, with Dodge rakes, with large driving wheels, which make it easier for the horses; a single mowing machine, of the Ohio Buckeye pattern, with flexible cutting bar and drag bar; a farmer's horse power, for two or four horses, with double syring seat; straw cutters, horse power and hand power, with the only solid feed on the ground; two horse cultivator, with two sets of teeth, and drill for sowing two rows of turnips, with cut off for stopping rows while in motion; scuffer, turnip cutter, in two styles; plough, double jointer, all steel; double mould ploughs. This firm make a very creditable display, and well sustain their high reputation as first class implement makers.

J. P. Billington, Dundas, shows two of his improved grain drills. Thomson & Williams, Mitchell, exhibit a gang plough, on the Gray pattern, with some improvements; reaping and mowing machine; fanning mill, straw cutter, horse power; and two horse sawing machine.

McLeod & Mills, Rodgerville, show a new harrower, which can be used for ordinary mowing machine. This machine has been thoroughly tested, and is found to work well. It will reap a field of peas as quick as any ordinary mower will of grass. The peas after being cut are gathered on the table, and thrown out by a man with a fork. It is guaranteed to cut always round the field. This harrower is the invention of Mr. Robt. Mills, who is now introducing it into the country.

John Walsley, of Elmira, exhibits a reaping machine with some important improvements. The principal one is that in raking, by the use of an eccentric, one arm does the same amount of work as five arms in the old self rakers. Another feature of this machine is that it has a double set of knives, working one over the other, scissor like. The chief merit of this is, that with the two sets of knives it is done easier, and with less power than with one set, the motion being slower. The motion on the reaper is less complicated than on the ordinary machines. The reel is adjustable, and can be suited to high or low grain. This reaper appears to embody valuable improvements, and is well worth the study of the farmers. It is patented for Canada and the United States. The proprietors are prepared to sell rights to any manufacturers who are desirous of going into the business.

A. Harris, Son & Co., Brantford, exhibit the Burdick reaper, the Kirby combined mower and reaper, and Kirby's new two wheeled mower. This firm were formerly located in Beamsville, but are now doing business at Brantford, where they have erected a large factory, and are turning out all kinds of agricultural implements.

The Central Exhibition.

We are now in a position to express an opinion on the second Central Exhibition, now being held in this Town, and we rejoice to say that in all important respects it is fully equal to, if not ahead of, the one held last year. The Directors, with that forethought which has marked their management throughout, were careful to provide additional accommodation, and it has all been required, and in some instances was even short of the demand. On Tuesday there was not a very large number of visitors on the grounds, but this is not expected on the first day of the Show. To-day, however, made up for it all, for there was a splendid turn out of strangers, and to-morrow we may reasonably expect the crowd to be still greater.

In regard to the most important department of any show—that of Stock—the Exhibition this year is decidedly superior to the previous one, whether in point of numbers or in quality and condition of the animals. In horses this was particularly noticeable, and we heard more than one competent judge remark that in some classes of horses he had never at any show seen a finer display.

It is of course expected that the County of Wellington will always do credit to itself, in the show of cattle it makes at the Guelph Exhibition. Our breeders and farmers are well able of themselves to make such a display of cattle as cannot be matched in any other county in Canada. They have this year turned out their finest herds, which are moreover, supplemented by some splendid animals from a distance. We would refer, especially, to the very superior animals exhibited by Mr. Miller of Markham.

In sheep we have a magnificent show, better in all respects than that of last year. The same may be safely said of pigs, for it would be impossible to find a worthless animal in the lot. In roots and vegetables we beat the Provincial Exhibition by many degrees. Considering the peculiar nature of the late season, it is extraordinary how such a fine collection of roots and vegetables could be collected.

Inside the Palace there is a very fine display in all the classes. Perhaps in one or two classes the entries are not so numerous as they were last year; but the difference is scarcely noticeable. Every inch of space is occupied, the articles on exhibition are displayed to the best advantage, and from whatever point of the building the visitor looks the general effect is very pleasing.

We may well congratulate ourselves on the assured success of the Show, and on the many marks of improvement noticeable in comparison with that held in 1871.

The Lieutenant-Governor.

It is now arranged that the Lieutenant-Governor will arrive in Guelph to-morrow forenoon by the ten o'clock train from Toronto. He will be received by the Mayor and Corporation at the Station, and conveyed to the Council Chamber, where the civic address will be presented. On the arrival of the train the Wellington Field Battery will fire a salute. His Excellency will then proceed to the Court House, where the County Council will present their address. From that he will be conveyed to the Exhibition Ground, where he will be received by the President and Officers of the Association, and the address presented to him. He will then inspect the Exhibition, and after that the lunch will take place in the Council Chamber, which is being specially fitted up for the occasion.

STATE OF POLITICS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

Further information from New Brunswick confirms the statement made by Mr. Mackenzie, that the majority of the N. B. members will give their adhesion to the Opposition Leaders; it is also hinted that a certain member elected as a Unionist will give his vote to the Opposition, and that a certain member from Hamilton has stated that, in the event of Mr. Blake becoming leader of the Opposition in the Dominion, he will support him.

GLOOMY FOREBODING.—The correspondent of the Hamilton Times, writing from Toronto, says:—"Evidences of an impending financial crisis are apparent here. The stringency of the money market and the general mistrust existing is the chief topic of street conversation. A rumor is current here that King of the Bank of Montreal has been speculating heavily in New York and Chicago.

BASE-BALL.—The Boston Club has virtually won the championship, though the official result will not be declared until the close of the season in November. On Saturday the Atlantics played the Mutuals on the Capitoline Grounds, and for the second time this season they were victors, by a score of 9 to 5. In Philadelphia, the Baltimore and Athletic Clubs played the last game of their series together, and as the result was a drawn game, 7 to 7, they played again last Monday. The Athletics play the Bostons, in Boston, this week.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.—The Hamilton Times says that on Sunday, a carpenter named James Kirkland, aged 28 years, who for some time past has been boarding at a house on Bay street, created a little excitement in the neighborhood of Burlington Bay by attempting to "shuffle off this mortal coil." He went into the water, and dabbled about for a few minutes, then suddenly changed his mind and came on shore and hid in an old barn, where he was subsequently found by Constable McFadden, who took him to the Police Station. Kirkland told the officer that he "would have been drowned had not the Lord taken him from the water." At the Police Court next morning when asked the reason for attempting such a rash act, he replied "I'm a fool." Judging by his appearance there is truth in the remark. He was committed to jail for a few days for safe keeping, in default of giving sureties.

Prof. Tyndal has perfected a new respirator for firemen, in which the solid particles of dense smoke are arrested by films of cotton wool wetted with glycerine, and the most pungent gas by layers of charcoal. By this simple means firemen can remain within burning buildings for upwards of an hour at a time with safety and comfort, so far as their respiration is concerned.

EXTRAORDINARY SCENE IN A CHURCH.

In a fashionable Scotch church in London (the correspondent of the Dundee Advertiser writes) there has just been a "scandalous" little incident, very painful to one unfortunate man, and very amusing to many others. A gentleman, well known in society, recently deserted his wife, and she, poor creature, has since been roaming about the world in search of him. Having been informed that her husband "worshipped" pretty regularly in the church alluded to she went there in a great rage, and during the services fixed her eyes upon a highly respectable elder, who though not her husband, was amazingly like him. Immediately after the service concluded, the excited woman rushed from the gallery where she had been sitting, and without waiting to make certain whether she was right or wrong, seized the unfortunate elder by the whiskers and poured a shower of blows on his head. Before her mistake was known to her, and an explanation given, the poor elder's frontispiece was black and blue. He did not give the woman into custody, but, like a good Christian, took her home with him to dine.

SMUT IN WHEAT.—A writer in an American agricultural paper says: "I see in the April number of the Journal an article on smut in wheat, also a remedy. Now we raise any amount of wheat in this country, but never have it smutty. But we bluestone it, as it is called here. Take a box or trough about ten feet long by two wide, and two deep, put in about 500 pounds of wheat then take a pail, put in about one pound of blue vitriol; fill with hot water, and let stand until the stone be dissolved; then pour on the wheat and mix well until the wheat is well dampened with the solution; then take it out in sacks and let stand until dry before sowing. The farmers all bluestone their wheat, and are never bothered with smut.

Thad Myers, a Detroitier, lately came home intoxicated, beat his wife, kicked his children, and was finally taken to jail to cool off. While he was sobering, and paying up his jail bill, his wife sold the furniture, and drew out the \$2,000 they had in bank, left the children at a neighbour's and left the country behind her. Thad, went home, found his house in the hands of the sheriff for a beer debt, and at last accounts sat crying on the curbstone.

A BALLOON carrying Messrs. King and Holden, which ascended at Plymouth, N. H., on Thursday afternoon, landed on Friday morning in Canada, near the Gulf of St. Lawrence, having travelled 307 miles over the wilderness of Maine and Canada.





Philip and Robertson, Hamilton, show a splendid set of double carriage harness, single do.; both silver mounted, also an excellent quilted gentlemen's saddle, and plain stuffed do. Thos. Hewson, Norval, exhibits 2 sets single carriage harness of good workmanship and finish, as also does Henry Gerth, New Hamburg, one set of single do., russet color, interspersed with black. We must not omit to mention a fine collection of carriage wheels, unpainted, exhibited by J. H. Downing, Alma, and which is awarded the 1st prize.
