MANITOWA WHEAT.—Mr. Alexander Adams informs the *Manitoba* that he cut this season for Thomas and Wm. Lang near Point du Chene eight acres of wheat and club wheat which he regards the best he has seen in nineteen years experience in Ontario. It will yield not less than three bushels to the acre, and is not withstanding the frosty weather, the wheat was put in early, thus almost escaping damage from this pest.

FRANCE EGGS.—"The English," says the *Journal de Rouen*, "continue to remain tributary to France for eggs, having in 1873 imported more than five hundred millions. In spite of all their efforts to get the good being sent to the north, they have not succeeded. The Re-Arrangement of Constituencies.

The Elora Express of this week has a well considered article on the above subject, and partly in answer to the objections urged by the Mail for any re-arrangement of the constituencies. We quite agree with the reasons it presents, in the following extract, for a change, and think the present Provincial Government would be fully justified in framing a measure to have these anomalies in our representation remedied:—

"A glance at the manner in which our constituencies are formed will convince the most conservative minds that change is not only desirable but necessary to secure anything like a fair distribution of electoral power. Absolute equality in the number of voters in each constituency may not be possible, but an approach to it is regarded as a cardinal principle upon this continent, and has been recognized, in the past, in our federal constitution. The representation of each Province in the Dominion Parliament is based upon population because all parties admitted the justice of the principle. While this is admitted in the lump it is practically disregarded in detail, and if our Ontario Ministry has resolved to remove the anomaly in this Province, all consistent men will cheer on the work, and extend to it such moral support as may be necessary to enable it to carry out its intentions. Electoral districts need not necessarily be confined to municipal boundaries, and if any approach to equal representation is to be had, they will have to be disregarded in some instances; while they may be respected, in so far as possible, in all. An examination of a few figures will show the unfairness of existing divisions which appear to have been based nearly entirely upon municipal arrangements. At the last Ontario General Election the voting power of the Province was set down at 249,867 souls or an average of 3047 to each of the 82 constituencies; 32 members now represent 68,774 of these electors, or 1 to 2133; 22 represent 67,573, or 1 to 3074, and the remaining 28 represent 113,599, or 1 to every 4015. While 49 members represent 139,389 electors, or 1 to every 2661, 28 represent 113,599, or 1 to every 4017. One member sits for Niagara with 781 votes, while another represents 5885, or more than seven times as many. Five members represent 6193 votes, or 1 for every 12387 voters; 9 represent 17,281 or 1 for every 1920; 18 represent 45,019 or 1 for every 2501; 22 represent 67,573, or 1 for every 3069; 34 represent 113,599, or 1 for every 3342. The members from the 11th and 12th seats have 17,281 souls, or more than three times as many; or to put it simply, for every 1000 souls represented by one member, the next member represents 3000, or three times as many. It is not only the number of souls, but the quality of the souls, which is the consideration before the mind of the legislator. It will be plain to all that the present arrangement is not only unfair, but it is also unjust.

The Credit Valley Railway.
 On Monday morning a party of gentlemen started from Toronto in carriages, on a tour for the inspection of the work that has been so far completed on this railway. The party comprised Hon. Attorney-General Mowat, an invited guest, Geo. Laidlaw, President of the Road, the Directors, and several prominent business men from the Queen City. Starting from Toronto the road runs parallel, at varying distances, with Dundas Street, passing through Lambton Mills at the Humber, thence to Cooksville, and on to Streetsville. Here the road runs both northward and westward, the original design having been to build a narrow gauge road along the valley of the Credit river. This plan, however, has given way to a more extensive one, and the narrow gauge has been abandoned for the regulation gauge of 4 feet 8 1/2 inches.

The inspecting party stopped first at the Humber, across which the road will run over a bridge which is said to be the finest in America. The spans are built on the Howe-truss principle, on a 115 feet, one 138 feet, and three of 105 feet each, making a distance of 508 feet of truss, at a height of 95 feet above the level of the river. There are 700,000 feet of timber, about 118,000 lbs. of iron, in the bridge, and 3,186 yards of solid masonry in the piers supporting the spans. The Mimico bridge is an imposing structure, built in a similar manner. At Pallett's Creek and Cooksville are also pieces of trestle-work, the latter not quite finished. The Streetsville bridge is composed of three spans of Howe truss, 105 feet each, and about 100 feet of trestle-work. The height from the water level is 30 feet. The piers which form the foundation of these bridges are built in the most substantial manner, and the whole work gives evidence of the very best engineering skill. Near Milton the construction of the work elicited the most favorable comments. The cutting and filling around the mountain, has been accomplished at any one place of 1 to the 100. The fine scenery along the mountain side and away down the ravines is an attractive feature of this portion of the road. In the mountain there are unlimited quantities of lime, and an excellent sort of building stone, which, when the Credit Valley Railway is in operation, will be of great value.

The work on the road has employed during the summer between 600 and 700 men. At the present time there are about fifty or sixty miles of the road graded. No contracts have been let for the work, the Company doing it themselves. Two circumstances have favored the Company this season—the cheapness of iron, and the cheapness of timber. It is supposed quite probable that the iron will be laid on a considerable portion of the track next season, and in the meantime the winter will be employed in pushing preparations for next summer.

The management consists of Geo. Laidlaw, President; J. G. Conlin, Secretary; J. C. Bailey, Chief Engineer; John McCollman, Resident Engineer on the main line; D. McKenzie, Resident Engineer on the Peel and Wellington Branch. Mr. Brothers and E. A. Walsh are officials under Mr. McCollman. Mr. Thos. Watts is Superintendent of Bridges.

THE MEMORIAL TABLET AT RIDGEWAY.
—On Wednesday afternoon, 30th Sept., at three o'clock, the tablet—which we fully described several weeks ago—was erected with due ceremonies to the memorials of the Heroes of 1866. There was a large attendance of people from all parts of the Peninsula and Toronto. Members of the Queen's Own and the 13th Regiment were present, while Capt. Beam's Company, 44th Battalion, Hamilton, took part in the ceremonial. An excellent luncheon was provided by the ladies of Ridgeway, after which the procession was formed, and while the Band played the "Dead March" in *Saul*, marched into the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Campbell, opened the exercises by leading in prayer, when the curtain, which was concealing the tablet, was withdrawn, and the memorial duly unveiled. The tablet having been inaugurated, speeches suitable to the occasion were made by Rev. Messrs. Baxter and Shaw; Mr. W. A. Thomson, M. P.; Lieut-Colonel Otter, Queen's Own; Major Horny and Captain Treble, 44th Batt.; Capt. Nimmo, Wolland Field Battery; Ensign Crockett, 13th Batt.; the Rev. of Bertie, and others. The speakers pronounced high eulogiums upon the deceased, and by stirring words, thrilled many a bosom present with patriotic feelings. The virtues of the deceased were painted in glowing terms, and their noble traits of character were not forgotten. These most interesting proceedings were not concluded until a late hour in the afternoon, when they were brought to a close by the National Anthem, which seemed, on this occasion, to be inspired with more than usual heartiness and loyalty—permeated too, we fancy, by the awe which must entrance one when standing in presence of those who have so nobly died for their Queen and Country.
