A JAPANESE LOAN.

POWDER MILLS EXPLODE.

Newport, Ind., May 4.—A powder mill owned by the Northwestern Powder Company, three miles from Newport, was blown up today. Four men were killed and eight were injured. Ten thousand pounds of powder exploded and the bodies of two of the men were blown into small pieces that they could not be picked up. The other bodies were not badly mangled. The injured men will recover. The loss on the plant was \$7,000.
