THE LIBERALS SUSPECT FRAUD IN THE SUNS' CASE.

New York, July 2.—It is plain that the trial of Amner Ben Ali is to be the most remarkable scientific battle on record. The testimony of the public officers, the miserable men and women who hunt the Fourth Ward dives of slight importance compared with the testimony of the microscope, of chemists and of medical scientists. One hundred slides will be placed under the microscope, each slide bearing an infinitesimal drop of blood, and each drop will be explained and analyzed by experts.

Some of these drops will be from the gapping, fatal wounds of the murdered woman, while others will be the corpuscles of blood found on the floor and furniture of room 33 in the East River Hotel, where Amner Ben Ali is said to have slept the night of the murder.


