



How It May Be Easily and Quickly Made in the Home.

When one understands the possibilities of sour milk on the farm, where it may be used in satisfying quantity, the secret of many healthful and ap-petizing dishes will be solved. In the form of "cottage cheese" many dell-clous desserts and side dishes will give a pleasing variety to the daily bill of fare.

Plain cottage cheese "without the trimmings" is well worth considering. It may also be made to serve as the foundation for various other dishes. To serve it at its best there are two points to keep in mind. The sour milk, or "clabber," should never be allowed to reach boiling point in separating the curd from the whey, and care in draining the curd is equally important

When the sour milk first forms a smooth "clabber" and before it has had time to separate is the best time for starting the cheese. Set the pan

The Trajectory of a Thing.

The Trajectory of a Thing. The trajectory of a thing is the path of a bullet or anything else passing through the air from the gun to the place where it strikes. Gen-erally the word is applied only to bul-lets and cannon balls. In shooting at an object near at hand you aim point blank, because the bullet prac-tically reaches the target before it falls at all, but when you fire at a dis-tant object you must aim above it, so that the bullet may have room to fall and yet hit the object. The desire of every marksman is to get a trajectory as fat as possible, so that the bullet shall have no need of fall-ing very far. A flat trajectory is ob-tained by increasing the speed of the bullets, by diminishing their size and increasing the powder charge.

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

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
