ending the 30th of June, '44, 635 tons of ore, paying into the Customs therefor \$3,470.25.

During the year mentioned the United States exported into Canada 1,662,611 tons of coal, on which the duty for home consumption at 50 cts. per ton on bituminous and 50 cts. on anthracite amounted to \$847,727. In the same period Canada sent to the other side only 302,903 tons of coal. The American duty in 75 cents a ton, making the amount \$237,229. The Hamilton Tribune says:—

"We want a market for our iron ore and they want a market for their coal; we want their coal, they want our iron. On the other side the manufacturers will be benefited at first hand, with us the small as well as large consumers should pay coal cheaper for the treaty. We hope it will be impossible for the retail dealers to bind us with a 'ring' that will prevent us from enjoying the rebate of duty. The policy of the treaty is, in effect, consistent with sound protectionist principles as taught by our schools. For, if there are any such things as raw material, coal and iron, they would seem to come under the head of our industries. It is not having lumber and salt added to the list there is no doubt they will be accommodated. In the event of such an arrangement coming into effect we shall feel like repeating a late warning given in these columns concerning the tariff. The result would sell too rapidly the forests of our country. The treaty proposed is, in our estimation, a step for both countries in its immediate and prospective results. It might give to trade the impetus needed for spring activity, and would possibly be the spring wedge for a broader and more advantageous reciprocal trade."

Our enterprising farmers, P. M. Chipman, T. Jones, and John Morse, of Nictaux, have opened three silos, and find they answer every better than was expected. Last year was not a good year for the corn crop, owing to the dry weather and the late season.
