We do not think any need apportion war resulting from the... The danger of such an event is most remote, judging from every standpoint. One powerful factor is that the United States is not in position to cope with such a powerful nation as the English. The New York Tribune has been running up every minute to the disadvantage of the republic. First, the Americans have only three really serviceable ships, and these are not fully armed, and could do but little to resist such men-of-war as the Thunderer and the Invincible. These latter ships are as many others in the English navy are armed with guns that will throw a distance of ten, twelve or even fifteen miles, and could level all the American cities on the sea-board to the ground and run but little risk.

The Americans possess considerable faith in their recently patented dynamite guns, but the Telegram says: "The dynamite gun for short range is the most effective weapon of war ever devised, but its one great failing seems to be its short range. It cannot be used effectively at a distance of over two miles, and a party outgunning for a foreign warship, with a dynamite gun would furnish an excellent target for the gunners handling a gun with a range of eight or ten miles. It is for this reason that the naval officers are of the opinion until the dynamite gun can be so perfected as to give a range of more than ten miles, it can be used to advantage only on the land."

In fact, to sum up the whole matter, the Americans have no effective guns, or ships, or forts worthy of the name, and in spite of their large surplus there is no money voted with which to put them in proper condition, and if there were it would take months of the most active work to accomplish anything tangible. Let the timid-minded calm themselves. Even if the United States were in the best fighting trim, there is small fear that the two countries would plunge into a tremendous and costly war for the sake of a few codfish. They serve a very useful purpose at the present stage of American politics, and that is about all.

"Save our Forests." "The success of the Joggan raft experiment, cheapening enormously, as the method of likely to be the transportation of round timber, is likely to stimulate the work of wholesale devastation in the maritime provinces, unless some effective means of restraint are adopted," says the Toronto Week, and we are largely disposed to agree with our contemporary that the prospect is not one to be contemplated without strong misgivings for the future of our forests. The question is what sort of restraint is to be employed. We do not believe in export duties, but we think it is possible to apply some laws which will not interfere too much with a great and important industry, have the effect of saving our forests from wholesale destruction. We save our lobster fisheries from exhaustion by legislative restriction, and why may not forests be kept alive by the same process? It is a matter of self preservation and should be of as much greater interest to those directly engaged in the business of lumbering as to the general public. It is not good policy to kill the goose that is laying the golden egg, but that is practically what is being done by those who are cutting the timber of our forests, while nothing is being done towards their renewal. -Halifax Chronicle.

We are glad to see the press generally are becoming more and more sensible of the results that will surely ensue if some means are not adopted whereby this cutting down our forests by the sale of saw timber, while we have tremendous tracts of timber land, and in fact they may be said to be inexhaustible, the timber is being cut down within accessible distance of transportation can, by no means, come under that category, and it behooves us to adopt measures to prevent that supply from becoming exhausted. The opposition to the timber raft has been very reasonable. If such means of transportation are allowed, it will be a heavy loss to the coasting trade, and the lumber with which the logs can be got into the United States markets, and consequent profits, will lead many operators in the business, which will inevitably prove disastrous to our timber trade in the future. Our aim should be to manufacture the lumber product as much as possible and then sell, and not export it first and buy it back manufactured.

Some of the papers have been reporting that a close season of three years for moose, dating from the 1st of April last, has been declared in force in the Province of Nova Scotia, and in the paragraph referring to New Brunswick and similar laws should be put on here. It is time this noble game was protected, or we will soon have none to protect.

Notes by the Way.

I resumed my rambles after the lapse of two months during the heated season, and now expand a few notes taken during the past two or three weeks, and first let us speak of a...

In Lower Granville, on the Winchester wharf so called may to this day be seen the fragments of an old weapon of war - an iron mortar, the history of which is, in part as follows: Some time during the latter part of last century a Mr. Delap, of the place named, found from a box of iron, a mass of iron which had once formed a part of the weapon named. He succeeded in disengaging it from the ring to which it was attached, and by means of his boat transferred it to his schooner then anchored in the stream and took it to the wharf. It was an object, and it was consequently brought back to Granville, when it finally found a resting place in its present position. It found it to be a diameter of 2 1/2 inches with a bore of 1 1/2 inches, and 8 inches in thickness of solid iron surrounding the bore. It had not been in use into nearly equal parts and was probably one of those used in the attack by Nicholson in 1710. The one of those used by the French in its defence, and from the remnants of the old fort it was afterwards conveyed to the wharf, where it was finally found a lodging near the site of the first fort erected in the Dominion.

During my rambles through this beautiful section of the country I had occasion to examine the sites of the first dwellings built by the early European settlers, including those of the Thores, Croscups, Bogarts and others, and I was much struck with the ruins exhibited in those sections of the country. There were no highways in those far-off days, and so they placed their huts on points or ledges of rock, where the best upward views could be commanded, and whence the clearings and dwellings of the early settlers could be seen. But to return to more living matters.
