Farm Training for Children

London, April 25.—Not a few difficulties attend emigration schemes as a means of relieving unemployment and distress. It is found that the men and women whom the colonies want, and who are likely to succeed there, are just the very men and women who are needed at home.

A new society, formed through the efforts of Mr. Kingsley Fairbridge, of Exeter college, Oxford, a Rhodes scholar, hopes to overcome these difficulties by means of a scheme combining emigration and education.

Children have, of course, often been enabled to emigrate by philanthropic agencies, and in some cases by guardians, and have been "adopted" into farmer families.

On the conclusion of their stay, some of the pupils may be able to take up farming on their own account but the majority will, of course, begin as the employes of farmers, while the girls will be well trained for places where a knowledge of dairy work, poultry farming, dressmaking, and so on are necessary.

Duke of Connaught For Governor-General of Canada

The Story is Revived that King Edward's Brother Will Succeed Earl Grey.

London, May 9.—The Daily Express is authority for the statement that Earl Grey will be succeeded as Governor General of Canada by the Duke of Connaught, brother of the late King Edward.

It is added that it was the particular wish of King Edward that the Duke should take the position and that the Government agreed to appoint him.

According to the Express, it is unlikely that there will be any change in the programme, and the announcement of the appointment will be made shortly.

If prediction proves true, it will be the first time in history for a Royal Prince to govern an overseas Dominion of Great Britain.

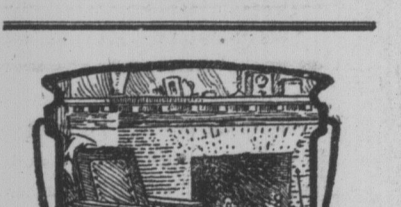

CORRESPONDENCE.

Editor of Monitor-Sentinel:

Kindly per-mit me to call the attention of your readers and the farmers of Annapolis County to the Brown Tail moth situation.

The moth is now nearly confined to Middleton. It is unfortunate that so many nests have been found in the county this year. Where there are so many found there is always greater danger that some will be missed. Yet if every person will take an interest in the work and look over his trees and those growing on adjacent waste lands, these moths could be controlled here as well as in Digby County.

When first discussed the region from St. Mary's Bay to Doucetteville was the worst infested in the province. This year we could not find a single nest there. Had Annapolis County done as well the moth would have been practically exterminated.

The farmers do their duty much better than the citizens of towns and villages. The person with only a few trees in his yard or an old neglected orchard or the owner of some waste lands is the greatest offender.

We have picked what nests we could, but it is the business of each person to see that the pest is destroyed. Not alone is the fruit grower responsible, for every citizen whether he owns a tree or not will suffer if this is neglected.

At this season the caterpillars have left their nests and are not as easily distinguished from other caterpillars. They are rusty brown hairy caterpillars with two coral red spots in the back. The Tussocks and some others possess these red spots but are lighter, or gray in color. Every caterpillar should be destroyed so that when in doubt it is best to kill a caterpillar.

Spraying with Paris green, lead arsenate or lime arsenite is the most efficient remedy. Bordeaux and Lime Sulphur are of no service in KILLING CATERPILLARS. They are used for scab and other fungus diseases.

The caterpillars can be picked off but there is danger from their hairs which cause a rash. If picking is attempted a cloth should be spread under the tree as these caterpillars drop to the ground when disturbed.

Allow me to urge every citizen in the county to cooperate in an effort to terminate or at least reduce these pests to the lowest possible number this year.

In his letter the Earl gives an interesting report of the observance of this national festival last year throughout the Empire in which "some 35,000 schools with an attendance of 7,500,000 scholars came under the influence of the movement, while more than seven thousand "sermons were delivered on Empire "Sunday (May 23) on the higher "aims of the movement—making it "probable that over sixteen millions "of British subjects were reminded of "the serious duties that lie before "them."

As Canadians we are justly proud of our free institutions,—of the boundless possibilities and unlimited resources of this fair Dominion,—our royal heritage, handed down to us by those who wrought and fought for liberty and life, in the early days of the country's story.

Let us not forget that we are sons and daughters of the Empire—proud of our citizenship of this great Empire on which "the sun never sets" closely bound up with its destiny by the strongest ties of blood and kindred. With it we must stand or fall.

British soldiers planted the flag of England on the heights and guarded the fruitful valleys in the early days of the country's need, and Heaven forbid that we should fall to "abide by our mother's house," or fail to send forth strong and brave spirits in quick response to the call of the king to rally around the old flag.

The world seems to be in a state of disquietude and unrest. It is predicted by friend and foe, that there are stormy seas through which the ship of Empire must direct her course in the coming future.

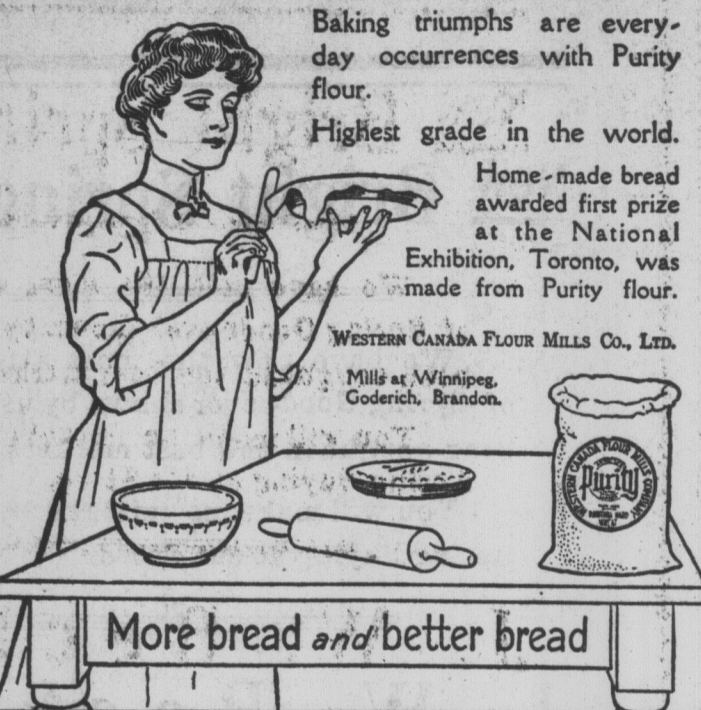

The July packet did not reach Halifax until the morning of the 17th August—thirty-nine days from Falmouth.

Flowers of the Farm

Beautiful Your Home Surroundings. Arrange to Have a Few of More Common Annuals Grow in Vacant Corners Near and Around the House.

Where will you have your flowers this year? Haven't you sometimes thought annually somewhat disappointing in the front yard during the busy season? If so, make arrangements this year for at least a few field grown cut flowers. Many women have a flower crop in the strawberry patch or vegetable garden or even on the end of side of the cornfield or other open crop ground. It is anywhere near the house. By keeping the flowers in rows to correspond to the rest of the crop, the cultivation may be carried on exactly as if the whole product were for useful purposes, and the time is scarcely missed.

Much nicer flowers can be raised in this way than in the average ornamental bed which had better be devoted to shrubs or perennials. In some localities a neat profit may be made from a well kept flower garden, especially if there are summer hotels nearby. Or surplus plants may be sold to the neighbor in the summer cottages who arrives too late in the season to plant seed. A few choice standard varieties in assorted colors would probably be more satisfactory than any mixture. Sweet peas, asters, pasturiums and verbenas are a few of the more popular annuals which thrive with field culture. Gladioli, too give large returns in cut flowers from a small bit of ground. Novelities of any kind are a pleasant luxury in a garden, but when they are a few you are looking for cash profits on your expenditure.

Another caution, be sure to keep all seed pods down or you may have some of Nature's gardening another year. Mignonette especially is one of the favorites which as the old lady said, "grows very willing" and matures seed before you know it.

Cutworms are the chief enemy of small plants in the field. One way to outwit them when one has only a few plants is to surround each little plant with a bottomless strawberry box when transplanting.

Sink the box in the ground so that a little rim of about an inch or less is exposed. As the cutworm works just on the surface it never burrows below, and never gets over the top of your miniature fence. Should a worm accidentally be included with the enclosure, it stays there until dug up and disposed of, instead of snipping off a dozen more plants.

RULERS OF EIGHT KINGDOMS
London, May 11 (Special)—It is now known that seven kings beside George V. will attend the funeral of Edward VII. They are: William, of Germany, and King of Prussia; Frederick VIII. of Denmark; Haakon VIII. of Norway; Alfonso XIII. of Spain; King Manuel III., of Portugal; King Albert, of Belgium, and King George I., of Greece.

Other mourners will be the Queen of Norway, Archduke Ferdinand, representing the Emperor of Austria; the Dowager Empress Marie Fedoro and Grand Duke Michael, representing the Czar, and the Duke of Aosta, who will represent the King of Italy.

KING GEORGE FIXED DATE.
The official Gazette publishes the proclamation appointing May 20th, the day of King Edward's funeral, as a day of general mourning throughout the United Kingdom.

The London Lancet published an authorized statement confirming the cause of King Edward's death as "Cardiac failure following bronchitis." The statement adds: "The last hours were absolutely peaceful and painless."

Let it be the serious duty of every man and woman, especially of all parents, teachers, and those interested in the rising generation, to instruct and set forth the duty and responsibility resting upon us as citizens of so great an Empire—that we may be prepared with strong hands and clear trained minds, to stand firm in the day of our country's need,—to assist in guiding the ship of state on her destined course to a yet higher, grander, greater future than she has yet accomplished.

To this end may we not reasonably hope that from the pulpits all over the land clergymen of all denominations will call attention to the higher aims of the movement,—duty, responsibility, sympathy, self-sacrifice, shall assist in a general awakening to the seriousness of our duties, first to Almighty God, who is ever all and above all "King of Kings," and secondly to the King who is at the head of it,—and may we not hope that we shall be able to save the King?"
