Octave Mousseau, former member of the assembly, and Achille Bergevin and L. P. Berard, former members of the legislative council, have been fully proved.

Alberto Fuentes, chief of staff for Gen. Pablo Gonzalez, the rebel commander.

DIRECT CHARGES OF CONSPIRACY ARE LACKING

N. T. R. Report Shows How Contractors Preyed Upon Incompetence of Commissioners, But Recovery of Money or Prosecutions Unlikely — More Revelations:

(Special to The Toronto World) OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—The report of Messrs. Guelius and Lynch-Staunton upon the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway between Winnipeg and Moncton, officially confirms a condition of affairs which has long been suspected by the house, but is devoid of those direct charges of conspiracy and corruption which might have been anticipated. That four men, utterly unacquainted with engineering on railway construction suddenly charged with the duty of building a great railway — thru the wilderness, should have spent many millions of dollars more than would have been expended by a thoroughly trained and experienced railway builder and engineer, is not to be wondered at.

FORTY MILLIONS WASTED ON N.T.R. CONTRACTORS SECURED HUGE SUMS AS "RAKE-OFFS" ON WORK SUB-LET

TRAIL OF GRAFT AND BUNGLING RUNS THRU N. T. R. CONSTRUCTION

Late C. M. Hays' Strong Protest Ignored by Former Government—Many Millions Wasted to Help Party Cause in New Brunswick—Total Cost Staggering.

Among the findings of the National Transcontinental Railway investigators are: At least forty million dollars was wasted, exclusive of unnecessary outlay east of the St. Lawrence River. Economy was discouraged in the whole process of construction. Hon. S. H. Parent, former chairman, accused of engineering pretended purchase of a lease to cover election expenses of a Liberal candidate in Quebec.

Former Commission, Wholly Ignorant of Railroad Operations, Easy Prey for Construction Companies—New Brunswick Section Already in Decay—Serious Charge Against Parent.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—(Special)—"We find that the Transcontinental Railway Commission, the Grand Trunk Railway and those having charge of the construction of the railway did not consider it desirable or necessary to practice or encourage economy in the construction of this road." "We find that without including the money which was unnecessarily expended in building the railway east of the St. Lawrence River, forty million dollars at least was needlessly expended in the building of the road."

EARLS COURT FIRE BURNED TWO BUILDINGS

Hardware Store and Cottage Adjoining Destroyed at a Loss of Seven Thousand Dollars — Hydrants Froze and Firemen Were Delayed Nearly Half an Hour.

Starting from an overheated furnace, fire did \$7000 damage to Blackmore's frame hardware store and an adjoining cottage at the corner of Heathbury and Enderdale road, Earls Court, at 11:30 last evening. The hardware store and all its contents were totally destroyed, while the cottage of J. J. Frank, next door, was partly burned. Frank's furniture was saved by the neighbors. It was thought last evening that insurance would fully cover the damage to both buildings.

MEXICAN REBELS BLEW UP TRAIN

Escort Slain and Many Passengers Killed—Oil Supply Cut Off.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The rebels today again cut off the oil supply from Tampico over the railroad into San Luis Potosi, this time emphasizing their work by the total destruction of a passenger train, wiping out the military escort and killing and wounding many passengers. At Las Canoas, 25 miles south of Cardenas, dynamite mines were exploded beneath a passenger train from Tampico. A battle between the federal escort of fifty and the rebels ensued, in which all the federals were killed.

BANK VICTIMS TO GET RELIEF

Perley Gives Assurance That Pledge to Farmers' Bank Depositors Will Be Kept. OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—(Special)—In the house today, A. K. Maclean of Halifax asked Hon. George H. Perley, who was putting thru some estimates for the finance department, whether it was the intention of the government to bring in a bill for the relief of the depositors of the Farmers' Bank.

Postmaster-General's Reply to Question Concerning Minister's Trip to Orient Nettled Lemieux — "More Honest Than Gouin, Lemieux and Berard Combined," Answered Pelletier.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.—(Special)—A listless day passed by the house in committee of supply on routine estimates was enlivened by a brief passage at arms between Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Postmaster-General Pelletier. As a counter play to enquiries from the opposition respecting the cost of recent ministerial travels, Conservative members have been enquiring about the various trips taken by members of the government when the Liberals were in power.

SHARE PROFITS FROM TIMBER

Advanced Public Policy Decried Upon by Government of British Columbia. VICTORIA, Feb. 12.—An entirely new bill in public policy is embodied in a bill presented today by Hon. Wm. R. Ross, minister of India, in the British Columbia Legislature providing for the adjustment of all timber royalties. It introduces the principle of profit-sharing by people in industries which utilize the natural resources.

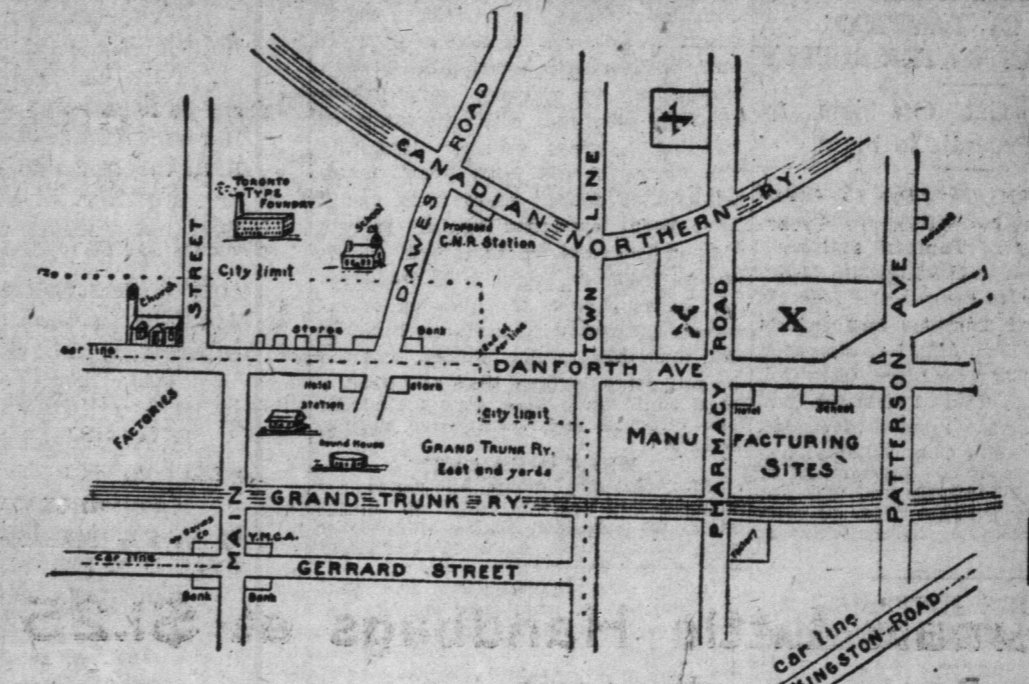

Sweeping and Dusting

There is a proper way of sweeping and dusting a room that it is a fine art to acquire, for these duties form a large part of our housework and heavily tax our time and strength.

Use an oiled dust cloth for the furniture. These cloths are of cheese cloth squares dipped lightly into paraffin oil or raw linseed oil.

Use the brush for the carpet. Dip the brush in water and wring it out. Then sweep over the carpet with it as if its fine brush will gather up many particles missed by the coarse broom.

A room does not need such a thorough sweeping as this very often and there should not be much dust from it.

Dust the woodwork with a soft dry cloth; the door handles should be washed with ammonia water, and the windows sponged off and dried with polishing cloth.

The only use we have for the feather duster is when cleaning behind the pictures, here it shakes the dust out and down splendidly, anywhere else it only scatters the dust and makes all one's work to be done over again.

The Study of Water Gardens

Oreantum Aquaticum Sagittaria La. Uvella. Oreantum aquaticum or golden club, is a lovely water-side plant with beautiful velvety leaves of the darkest green.

The inflorescence is a tall club-like spike of deep golden yellow, that comes shooting up in the very early spring, from the thick masses of dark clumped leaves.

The true stalk of the inflorescence is almost a pure pearly, gleaming white, and shows startlingly clear against the dark leaves.

The long dark leaves, from 6 to 12 inches in length, are constant to lie floating calmly upon the bosom of the still waters, or stand proudly erect as a foil against which the golden club may lean.

The plant grows native from Florida to the northern states, and with care cultivated, with great success in our own Ontario water gardens.

The roots will have to be purchased from a reliable dealer, and dealt with as described in the general discussion; to mitigate latifolia, or the arrow-head, is so well known here among our own swamps that only a word of description will be necessary.

The leaves are from 6 to 10 inches long, and exactly like an arrow-head, and a very bright shining waxy green.

The flowers come in successive whorls of three, borne on an elongated spike. They are rather small, individually with yellowish centres, and exhale a faint sickly, sweetish odor, not unlike the odor given off from the Chinese sacred lilies; as a rule, the spike of inflorescence does not over-reach the upstanding, arrow-headed leaves.

At an aquatic the greatest beauty of the plant lies in its shining characteristic leaves, which catch and hold the eye almost at once.

Half Million More Men Than Women, Say Cold Figures.

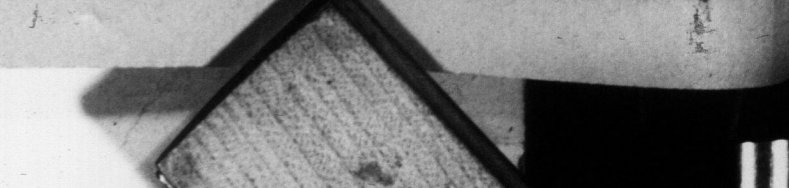
