

My manhood's prime to age is wed, And oftentimes I feel with dread, Death's winter stealing on.

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
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Each morn has less of golden light,

is thy name and what thy occupation? David—I am David the Shepherd Boy.


Chorus—A Thousand Men.

TRIO-But that Alas.





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
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

Thy presence and thy glory like a mountain wall, Shall ever more encompass me. 3:5



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
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
